ACC sues CPA official, wife

Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) filed a case against a Chittagong Port Authority (CPA) official and his wife yesterday on charges of amassing Tk 1,09,53,377 beyond known sources of income.

Moreover, CPA Deputy Traffic Manager (Admin) Moshirul Rahman Begh and his wife Nilufra Akhter allegedly concealed in their wealth statements Tk 73,28,356 they had in their possession.

ACC Chittagong Deputy Assistant Director Shahidul Alam Sarkar, who filed the case with Double Mooring Police Station, said they started their investigations after an allegation was filed with them in 2007.

Moshirul, a former terminal manager of the port, pleaded guilty to corruption at the Truth Commission which was formed in the immediate past caretaker government regime.

Scouts' expedition to clinch award

Their expedition will end on April 26.


2 jailed for selling dead chicken

Two people were arrested and jailed by a mobile court yesterday morning for collecting and selling dead chicken in the capital's Karwan Bazar. Some 131 dead chickens were seized from their possession.

Md Golam Hossain, 39, and Md Shah Alam, 28, would serve 18 months in Dhaka Central Jail, said Anwar Pasha, an executive magistrate of Dhaka district who led the court.

Rapid Action Battalion-2 assisted the drive at a wholesale chicken market near Tejgaon Railway Station, he said.

BDR CARNAGE CASE

DAD Touhid kept aloof fearing attack on him

Deputy assistant director (DAD) of erstwhile Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) Touhidul Alam, who proclaimed himself as BDR director general, was kept aloof yesterday fearing possible attack on him by some accused.

Since the trial began, more than 800 accused of the case were kept together in the dock. But DAD Touhid, also the prime accused of the Pilkhana carnage case, was kept alone between dock and Ejlash from the beginning of the court proceedings yesterday.

Quoting the prosecution, a defence counsel wishing to be unnamed told The Daily Star that some BDR jawans, who were found aggrieved over DAD Touhid, might kill him.

The soldiers became angry as

DAD Touhid did not return with a gazetted copy of general amnesty after negotiation with the government during the BDR mutiny. If such gazette was published on the day they would not have to face the trial, he added.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina announced a general amnesty to the mutineers of Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) on February 25, 2009 to end the mutiny at BDR headquarters.

The announcement came after two hours of negotiations between a 14-member BDR delegation led by DAD Touhid and the prime minister-led government side at the prime minister's residence Jamuna.

Prosecutor Mosharaf Hossain Kajol said he heard about it but did not know in detail.

He, however, admitted that the security measures were tightened at the court.

An on-duty police officer said he got instruction from the high-ups to beef up the security measures and kept DAD Touhid separate from other accused.

Mohammad Ramjan Khan, a counsel of DAD Touhid, said his client and DAD Jalil are kept separate in a cell of the jail.

Seven witnesses yesterday gave depositions at the Metropolitan Session Judge's Court and were cross-examined by the defence lawyers.

A total of 74 people, including 57 army officers, were killed in the mutiny at the BDR (now Border Guard Bangladesh-BGB) headquarters in Pilkhana on February 25-26, 2009.

IMPORT UNDER FALSE DECLARATION

Contraband liquor worth Tk 10cr seized in Ctg

Customs officials yesterday found huge quantity of contraband liquor after opening the second container under the same import consignment that was seized in Chittagong port on Tuesday.

From the two containers, the officials recovered 2,983 cartons of foreign liquor of different brands with each carton containing 12 to 24 bottles of liquor.

The officials also found 98 cartons of Benson & Hedges cigarette, 40 cartons of Easy brand cigarette and five 70" LCD televisions of Sharp brand in the two containers imported under the declaration of capital machinery.

Deputy Commissioner of Chittagong Customs House claimed the price of only the seized liquor could be worth Tk 10 crore.

He said liquor could not be imported without license.

Customs authority is preparing to start taking legal steps against the importer through sending show cause notice to it, he said.

Customs officials seized the two containers, each 40-foot equivalent unit, on Tuesday and found the illegal items imported under false declaration.

The customs officials identified the consignment for doing physical examination two weeks ago as they became suspicious finding an unknown name as importer of the consignment in the import document, said Omar Faruk, superintendent of Audit Investigation and Revenue (AIR) branch of Chittagong Customs.

One PIM MFG & Co with an address as Polashpur, Rajabari, Keraniganj, Dhaka was the importer of the consignment, according to Chittagong Customs House sources.

The consignment was imported over a month back while the importer declared to import 8 units of capital machineries, the sources said.

The officials opened the first container on Tuesday to find foreign liquor, cigarette and four televisions in it while they opened the other container yesterday.

INT'L FORUM FOR SECULAR BANGLADESH

Pakistan chapter launched to promote peace

Pakistan's civil society members yesterday launched the Pakistan chapter of International Forum for Secular Bangladesh & Trial of War Criminals of 1971, aiming to promote peace and resist terrorism in the name of religion.

The chapter's 31-member executive committee will comprise Pakistan's human and social rights activists, journalists and academics and be led by Pakistan's former attorney general and federal minister Barrister Sayed Iqbal Haider.

"The initiative will help promote better understanding between the people of our two countries (Bangladesh and Pakistan) as well as create a positive image of Pakistan abroad," said journalist Shahriar Kabir, executive president of the forum's central committee.

Addressing a press conference at Karachi Press Club, he said secular humanists of the world should come forward and unite to resist terrorism in the name of religion to ensure peace, justice and humane values.

Syed Iqbal lauded Bangladesh's fundamental reforms towards secular and democratic values, says a press statement of the forum.

"Like a vast majority of the Muslim countries, the prefix 'Islamic' was omitted from the name of Bangladesh," he said, adding that such policies created religious harmony and saved all sects of Muslims from being branded as 'Kaafir'.

A senior journalist of Pakistan, Munazza Siddiqui, also the chapter's general secretary, said while militant and Islamic extremist forces around the world are connected to each other, secular forces remain unaware of each other's presence and activities.

The chapter wants to build links with secular humanist movements worldwide to support the Pakistan government in creating awareness on social tolerance, improve Pakistan's global image and fight militancy by reviving the traditional Sufi culture, he said.

Kazi Mukul, secretary of the forum's central committee in Dhaka, said the forum now has 14 chapters across the globe and this new chapter will add value to its movement.
