Aware people of preventing lightning losses

Say speakers

Speakers at a seminar yesterday stressed the need to create awareness on ways to avoid the loss of hundreds of lives and property each year due to incidents of lightning.

The seminar, "Lightning: Reasons and Prevention", was organised by Centre for Development Dialogue (CDD) in the capital's Bangladesh Institute of Journalism and Electronic Media auditorium.

CDD Chairperson Mirza Tarequl Quader said the majority of the loss of lives occur in rural areas.

"But it is very regrettable that the government is yet to declare lightning as a disaster and take necessary steps to aware people in minimising losses," he said.

Tariqul, a researcher of CDD, urged people to switch off electronic devices, including televisions, telephones and refrigerators, during lightning and thunderstorms to avoid losses.

He also urged people to avoid taking shelter under big trees or by electricity poles during such times.

The speakers demanded formation of a separate cell comprising experts under the ministries of food and disaster management and science and technology to effectively tackle losses.

State Minister for Science and Technology Engineer Yeafesh Osman addressed the programme as the chief guest. CDD Secretary General Dr SM Morshed also spoke at the programme.

Forest officer confesses 'irregularity', not graft

Godagari Upazila Forest Officer M Mozammel Haque yesterday confessed that he distributed 32,258 free saplings for afforestation under Bangladesh Climate Change Trust Fund without the local lawmaker's recommendation. He arrived at the monthly development coordination

meeting of Godagari Upazila Parishad and, with hands clasped, asked to be forgiven and promised not to indulge in such irregularities ever again, said the upazila Vice Chairman Zahidul Islam. However, lawmaker Omar Faruk Chowdhury, at the

monthly meeting on February 19, alleged that Bangladesh Forest Department (BFD) officials distributed only 21,742 seedlings out of 54,000 allocated for him. The officials had gone to him ahead of the meeting to get

the related documents, showing all the seedlings distributed, signed, Faruk told The Daily Star. Under the "Seedling Raising for Massive Afforestation

throughout the country to face adverse effect of climate change" project, an MP can distribute any amount between 40,000 and 54,000 seedlings. But before that can be done, BFD, according to govern-

ment rules, must have the local lawmaker's recommendation for distribution of any seedling.

Mozammel justified his actions in a letter he placed at the meeting, saying that "they were understaffed and hence could not attain the lawmaker's recommendation on time." "If the 32,258 saplings were not distributed within the

rainy season, it would have hampered the government's activities," he added.

He also promised to return the 32,258 saplings within six months if given the chance.

However, the meeting decided that his explanation was "not satisfactory", said Dr Julia Moyeen, upazila nirbahi officer and the meeting's member secretary.

Lawmaker Faruk, present at the meeting, asked for punitive action to be taken against Mozammel as per government rules. "We will now write to the high ups of Bangladesh Forest Department to take necessary steps in this regard," she said.

Faruk asked the government officials present at the meeting to remain careful while utilising the government's limited funds and ensure proper development of the neglected Barind region.



'Cases against missing Ilias mysterious'

BNPVice-Chairman Shamsher Mobin Chowdhury Bir Bikram said filing of two cases against the 'missing' BNP Sylhet Division Organising Secretary Ilias Ali was mysterious.

The cases were lodged with Biswanath Police Station under Ilias's constituency in the district just in hours after he went missing in the capital.

"The government may produce him at any time in those cases, we are afraid," he added.

Mobin was addressing a view exchange meeting with journalists at Malancha Community Centre at Kumarpara in the city yesterday.

With the number of missing and killing incidents went up recently like the post '72 regime, people were in great trouble. Although neither the Rakkhi Bahini nor BAKSAL existed now, the nation was experiencing the same unusual situa-

tion across the country, he said. Marking the missing of Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) activist Iftekhar Ahmed Dinar since April 3, he said such incidents were on the rise but the government had remained indifferent to the issue, adding that it was clear that the gov-

ernment was involved in those. Mobin further said the government had failed to unearth the mystery of Saudi embassy official killing. Similarly, investigation of the journalist couple Sagor-Runi killing remained in 'mystery' due to unknown reasons.

RCC introduces modern machine to clean streets

Rajshahi City Corporation (RCC) introduced machine based system yesterday shaving off the 140-year-old system to clean the city streets with brooms.

The city mayor AHM Khairuzzaman Liton opened the

system by running the new Road Sweeping Vehicle at Shaheb Bazar Zero point in the afternoon. RCC Chief Engineer Ashraful Haque said the LGED buying

the vehicle at a cost of Tk 1 crore under the ADB funded project of Secondary Towns Integrated Flood Protection (Phase -2) had donated it to RCC following a government directive. It was learnt that machine would sweep garbage from 10 to 15 kilometres of the main city streets per hour and it was
