The body of a contractor was found at Kamalapur Rail Station in the capital yesterday afternoon after 50 days of his missing.

Nurul Amin, 55, was a contractor of several organisations, including Dhaka Wasa and owner of Faria Engineers Ltd.

On information, Kamalapur railway police (GRP) recovered the body from inside the station platform around 4:30pm. The body was sent to Dhaka Medical College morgue for an autopsy.

Sub-inspector (SI) Sujan Kanti Barua of Kamalapur GRP told The Daily Star no mark of injuries was found on the body.

Nurul's younger brother Saiful Amin Bhuiyan said he went missing from in front of Wasa Bhaban at Karwan Bazar on March 5.

He said Nurul had a dispute with one person over getting a contract. He suspects that some rival might have feed him something to drive him insane.

Amin lived at Shiddhirganj in Narayanganj. Nurul used to supply motors to Dhaka

ACCREDITATION COUNCIL FOR PRIVATE UNIVERSITIES

Draft rules approved in principle

Pvt universities assoc demand such council for public universities

The government yesterday approved in principle draft rules of Accreditation Council for Private Universities of Bangladesh (ACPUB) to ensure quality and standard of education of private universities.

The education ministry approved the draft rules at its meeting chaired by Education Minister Nurul Islam Nahid. Section 38 of The Private University

Act, 2010 stipulates formation of national and independent accreditation council to ensure quality and standard of higher education. After the law came into effect, the education ministry asked the University Grants Commission (UGC) to formulate rules and outlines of the council and sent it to the ministry.

According to the draft rules, the ACPUB would motivate private universities to undertake self-assessment and critical review of their academic programmes.

The council would urge the private universities to seek evaluation of their academic programmes through peer review teams to be formed by ACPUB. The result of the peer review team will be made public so that students, guardians, and employers can know about the status of different universities, said the draft rules.

The ACPUB would consist of a general council, an executive committee, several programme committees for each broad discipline or area of the study, and the peer review teams.

The general council would consist of 21 members, including a chairperson. The chairperson, having a high academic and administrative calibre, would be nominated by the chancellor for a period of two years, it said.

The executive committee would consist of a chairperson and eight members of the general council. The executive committee would be responsible for appointing peer review teams.

The draft said that each approved private university will have to get membership of ACPUB within three months from the rules coming into force by filling in the application form and paying fees for membership as determined by the council.

It also said the new private universities will have to get the council's membership within six months of receiving permission from the government.

Each university must submit a filled-in self-assessment questionnaire prescribed by ACPUB within six months of becoming members of the council, it said.

The peer review teams would visit institutions, verify and review information provided in the questionnaire to make recommendations to the executive committee.

If any university appears to fail to comply with the condition of the council it may be graded as "unsatisfactory" and will be allowed a specific timeframe to make up deficiencies identified by the peer review team.

About funding of the council, the draft rules said the government would allocate an initial endowment fund of Tk 50 crore for the accreditation coun-

The education ministry received opinions on the draft rules from different ministries and organisations after sending it to 19 ministries, individuals and organisations, including Association of Private Universities of Bangladesh (APUB).

Prof M Alimullah Miyan, general secretary of APUB, in his opinion said there should be an Accreditation Council for both public and private universities.

The information, communication and technology ministry in its opinion said an amendment can be brought to the rules so that standard of both private and public universities can be measured. They suggested that the name of the council should be "Accreditation Council for Universities of Bangladesh."

"The accreditation council is only for the private universities. Establishing an accreditation council for private universities was mentioned in the National Education Policy 2010,' Education Secretary Dr Kamal Abdul Naser Chowdhury told The Daily Star.

He said the ministry would finalise the draft rules after consultation with the stakeholders concerned including the representatives of private universities and educationists as soon as possible.

As her in-laws did not give consent to the marriage, they unleashed their grudge on the bride from the very next day of the wedding,

Her husband and his family also used to

restrict her from visiting her parents and abuse her both physically and verbally, she said. "I saw horrible blade cuts in

her arms when Tania came over and borrowed Tk 100 from me last Friday," said Halima. Police recovered the body

from her house around 11:30pm on Sunday and sent it to Dhaka Medical College morgue for an autopsy. The morgue authorities cleared the case as suicide. Tania's family alleged that

Rana's family might have killed her and hung the body to the ceiling fan to make it appear as a case of suicide.

Bhasantek Police registered an unnatural death case in this connection.

8 brick kiln owners fined Tk 25 lakh

TIB says whitening black money unconstitutional, immoral

Providing the opportunity to whiten black money in national budget is unconstitutional, immoral and discriminatory, said Executive Director of Transparency International Bangladesh (TIB) Iftekharuzzaman yesterday.

"The finance minister and the finance secretary in their (Sunday's) speeches spontaneously identified remittance and profit motive as the reasons behind the growing corruption...this is irrational," he said in a statement. The remark of Finance Secretary Mohammad Tareque that black money has no link with corruption is also irrational and irresponsible, he underlined.

Tareque on Sunday said black money has no link with corruption. "Black money is the money which has not been disclosed," he said.

Iftekharuzzaman said as he is hold-

ing a responsible post, Tareque should clarify his statement and he has to disclose who are getting the advantage of whitening black money and how much black money is whitened by expatriates.

The TIB executive director said the Article 20 (2) of the country's constitution strongly stands against the illegal income. The government in its election manifesto in 2008 too stood against the illegal income and black money.

Amid an immense pressure by a vested quarter, the government gave the opportunity to whiten black money in the capital market in the name of stimulus package in the last fiscal, Iftekharuzzaman said adding that such step promotes corruption and creates scope for the corrupts to control the capital market.

Quoting Finance Minister AMA Muhith as saying that black money cannot be controlled with political consideration, the anti-graft body official said, "This is also an example of political defeat against corruption."

Muhith on Sunday said he was personally against giving any chance to whiten black money. "But democracy is ... the art of compromise," he told a prebudget meeting with the Economic Reporters Forum (ERF) at the confer-

ence room of his ministry. The minister said it was not easy to put plug on the source of black money. "It'll continue for many days as the remittance is the main source of black money. When people remit money from abroad through the banking channel, we allow those without questioning about its source," he said.

Iftekharuzzaman voiced deep concern over the government's stand of whitening black money in the budget for fiscal 2012-12 and urged the government not to give such scope any more as it would go against its election pledge.

MARITIME BOUNDARY

'Verdict to help extract more mineral resources'

Speakers at a seminar yesterday said the "historic victory" in the legal fight with Myanmar on the maritime boundary will help the country extract more mineral resources.

The seminar was organised by University Swadhinata Shikkhak Parishad (teachers' council) at the Teacher-Student Centre (TSC) auditorium at Dhaka University.

Prime minister's Adviser Dr Alauddin Ahmed said the government will move ahead to "explore and extract the mineral resources from our maritime territory." He urged all to work together to make use of the maritime boundary victory. Additional Foreign Secretary Rear Admiral (retd) M

Khursid Alam gave a presentation on the verdict handed down by the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea.

The present government first took the initiative to "conduct a seismic survey in our maritime boundary and this survey played a major role in gaining the victory over Myanmar on equitable basis," he said.

Agriculturist and Awami League leader Bahauddin Nasim, Prof Nazrul Islam, Dr Sharif Enamul Haque and Pretrobangla Chairman Dr Hussain Monsur addressed the seminar, chaired by Prof AKM Saidul Haque Chowdhury.

The International Crimes Tribunal-1 yesterday 'reluctantly' adjourned case proceedings against Jamaat-e-Islami leader Delawar Hossain Sayedee until today as the key defence were absent due to countrywide shutdown.

The tribunal -- the first of two courts formed to deal with crimes committed during the Liberation War -- fixed the new date following an adjournment petition by the accused. Deposition of last prosecution witness

Mohammad Helal Uddin, also the investigation officer, was scheduled for recording yesterday. Sayedee, who is among four Jamaat and

one BNP leaders facing charges of crimes against humanity committed during the War at this tribunal, was produced before the court yesterday. Sayedee is facing 20 charges of crimes against humanity.

The tribunal headed by Justice Md Nizamul Huq started proceedings around

11:15am with two members as the third member AKM Zaheer Ahmed could not come due to the shutdown.

Although the prosecution was present for the proceedings the defence were absent except for two junior colleagues of the key counsels. As the court was about to begin, Sayedee,

who was at the dock, appealed for adjournment as his counsels were not present. "I do not understand law. None of my sion.

lawyers is present here. Who will hear and say on my behalf?" said Sayedee. "The tribunal will work as your lawyers

today. We will keep it in mind that your lawyers are absent. But your lawyers should have been present," replied the tribunal chairman. Abu Bakar Siddique, a junior colleague of Tanvir Ahmed Al Amin, one of Sayedee's

counsels, appealed that the proceedings be at least adjourned until 2:00pm. As he assured that the key defence counsels would arrive at 2:00pm, the tribunal

adjourned the proceedings until 1:30pm.

Earlier, Muhammad Tarikul Islam, another junior member of the defence, had addressed the court in inappropriate clothing complaining that the law enforcers had misbehaved with him and Sayedee's son as they tried to talk to the accused on the ground floor of the court. The tribunal said it was aware of the matter

and reminded him that it was inappropriate to talk to Sayedee without the court's permis-When the tribunal resumed at 1:30pm,

Hasanul Banna Shohag, a junior colleague of Mizanul Islam, who is a counsel of Sayedee, told the tribunal two of the three key defence counsels were out of the city. Despite several attempts, the other coun-

sels could not come to the court because of

the shutdown, Shohag said.

"The accused would be prejudiced if the proceeding goes on in absence of the defence counsels," he added.

the tribunal.

"I have submitted a handwritten adjournment petition before the tribunal as my counsels could not come. Kindly adjourn the court proceeding for today," he said.

"We will adjourn the proceeding if any law point comes before the tribunal," said Justice Nizamul Huq.

"With due respect to your words, I appeal for adjournment as my senior counsels are not present," Sayedee said in response.

"But the tribunal wanted to get some work done today," said the chairman. At this stage, Prosecutor Syed Haider Ali

took to the podium and said it would be better if the accused had faith on the tribunal's assurance. "I have complete faith in [tribunal] chair-

man and fully utilise your time tomorrow," said Sayedee. "Some work has been done today. Besides, I have never requested anything from the tribunal before."

The court then passed an order adjourning Hearing this, Sayedee was up in the dock once again and appealed to say something to the court proceedings at 1:45pm.
