## Land deal too to take time

Pranab tells editors of constitutional hurdles before ratification; assures govt of Teesta deal, says river-linking won't hurt Bangladesh; India to convert \$200m loan into grant

Exchange of adversely possessed lands and 162 enclaves, and demarcation of boundary with India will be delayed indefinitely, as the Congress-led Indian ruling coalition lacks the required majority in the Lok Sabha to ratify the land boundary protocol with Bangladesh.

Indian Finance Minister Pranab Mukherjee pointed this out while meeting editors of newspapers and

electronic media at Sonargaon Hotel in Dhaka yesterday.

He also claimed the controversial river-linking project in his country would not affect Bangladesh since the rivers originating from the Himalayas are not going to be linked. The rivers flowing only within India would come under this project.

Pranab said it requires special majority, meaning a constitutional amendment, for ratifying SEE PAGE 19 COL 5

## Experts stay concerned

Find Pranab's assurance far from reality

Indian Finance Minister Pranab Mukherjee yesterday reassured that India's river-linking project will not harm Bangladesh as it does not include any Himalayan river that flows down to Bangladesh.

Many Bangladeshi analysts contest his view and say the project has already affected Bangladesh with India diverting Teesta water to Mechi River in Bihar through the Mahananda.

India has been diverting water from the Teesta to the Ganges basin though the water was supposed to feed the Brahmaputra river in Bangladesh, said Engineer M Inamul Haque, former director general of Water Resources Planning Organisation (Warpo).
