Gilani urges new era in trade with India

AFP, Lahore

Pakistan yesterday called for a "new era" in economic collaboration with arch-rival India, as business leaders from the two countries met for a trade conference.


Prime Minister Yousuf Raza Gilani said the population of Pakistan's giant neighbour offered his country's exporters a "billion-plus market", adding normal trade relations were vital to Pakistan achieving its economic potential.

Relations between the countries have been fraught since independence in 1947 and trade has been hampered by restrictions and tariffs -- even now, direct cross-border traffic accounts for less than one percent of their global com-

The nuclear-armed neighbours have fought three wars and both spend heavily on their military while millions of their people languish in poverty.

But Gilani said: "We want to start a new era of economic collaboration with India... so that we leave behind a legacy of peace and prosperity for our future generations."

He told delegates there were many areas and sectors with huge trade potential, from information technology to engineering, education and health.



Pakistan has decided to grant India "most favoured nation" trading status by the end of the year, ending strict curbs on what New Delhi can export across their border.

At present, Pakistan maintains a list of 1,945 items allowed to run from India to Pakistan -- but only 108 can be transported directly by road through the Wagah crossing in Punjab.

India now also says it is ready to end a ban on investment from Pakistan and the countries are planning to allow multiple-entry business visas to spur exchanges -- a key demand by company executives. Last year India exported goods worth \$2.33 billion to

Pakistan, while its imports from its neighbour were worth \$330 million. But Adi Godrej, the Confederation of Indian Industry president who is leading the Indian delegation, said: "By 2015, we should be able to achieve the target of \$10 billion

Israel court rejects hunger strikers' appeal

Israel's Supreme Court yesterday rejected an appeal by two Palestinian prisoners who have been on hunger strike for 69 days in protest at being held without charge, their lawyer told AFP.

"The Supreme Court refused both appeals," Jamil Khatib said of the move by Bilal Diab, 27, and Thaer Halahla, 34, who had appealed to Israel's highest court on Thursday to end the administrative detention orders under which they are being held.

The Israeli courts administration confirmed their appeal had been rejected.

"They will continue their

strike till the end," Khatib said. "Israeli courts do not

handle administrative detention in a positive way. It shows that the intelligence services have the final word."

Afghan govt slams Taliban offensive

The Afghan government yesterday condemned the recent Taliban announcement of the start of their annual "spring offensive," calling it cowardly and un-Islamic and saying the country's forces would thwart any attacks.

The Taliban's offensive begins every year as snows melt and the weather warms across Afghanistan, making both travel and fighting easier. It normally leads to a surge of militant attacks throughout the country as the Taliban attempt to retake lost territory and intimidate the government.

Meanwhile, the US Embassy in Kabul acknowledged a two-year, rarely used program to release detainees from a military prison run by the American military near the capital, saying it meant to bolster reconciliation between the Afghan government and the Taliban.

But the Taliban announcement last week was another sign of the difficulty of reconciling with a group that has been fighting the US-led coalition and Afghan forces for more than a decade. The Taliban said they would

target anyone - from government workers to tribal leaders - who works against them and helps foreigners in their "occupation" of Afghanistan.

Yesterday, the Ministry of Interior said that "while again declaring war against the Afghan people, their government and constitution, the Taliban insurgents also abuse their religious values in the name of a cause opposed to the basic Islamic principles of peace, education and kindness."

It said the Taliban use propaganda and "twist holy religious values to justify their criminal activities," which have killed thousands of innocent people.

Last year was the deadliest on record for civilians in the Afghan war, with 3,021 killed, according to the United Nations. Talibanaffiliated militants were responsible for more than three-quarters of those deaths.

The Taliban have launched several largescale attacks in recent weeks, including coordinated attacks on Kabul and three other cities that left 11 people and 36 insurgents dead, and a strike on a compound used by foreigners in the Afghan capital that killed seven.

Magnetic bacteria may build bio-PCs

Magnet-making bacteria may be building biological computers of the future, researchers have said.

A team from the UK's University of Leeds and Japan's Tokyo University of Agriculture and Technology have used microbes that eat iron.

As they ingest the iron, the microbes create tiny magnets inside themselves, similar to those in PC hard drives.

The research may lead to the creation of much faster hard drives, the team of scientists say.

As technology progresses and computer components get smaller and smaller, it becomes harder to produce electronics on a nano-scale.

So researchers are now turning to nature - and get microbes involved.

Magnetic bacteria

In the current study, the scientists used the bacterium Magnetospirilllum magneticum.

These naturally magnetic microorganisms usually live in aquatic environments such as ponds and lakes, below the surface where oxygen is scarce.

They swim only up and down following the Earth's magnetic field lines, aligning in the magnetic field like compass needles, in search of preferred oxygen concentrations.

When the bacteria ingest iron, proteins inside their bodies interact with it to produce tiny crystals of the mineral magnetite, the most magnetic mineral on Earth.

The pass percentage of female students was 80.76 in 2011, 77.95 in 2010, 68.41 in 2009, 70.45 in 2008, and 55.47 in 2007.

The male students also dominated in securing the highest grades (GPA-5) under all education boards. A total of 48,915 boys achieved the top grade against 33,297 girls. The girls in science group,

however, are a bit ahead of the boys with an average 95.80 percent pass rate in eight general education boards as a fewer number of females took the exams in this group. The pass rate for the boys is 94.27 percent.

Militants behead 2 Pak soldiers

were killed including two who were beheaded after being captured during fighting with Islamist militants in North Waziristan, officials said yesterday.

Gunmen armed with rockets attacked a military convoy on Sunday, sparking gun battles near Miranshah, the main town in North Waziristan -- an al-Qaeda and Taliban stronghold on Pakistan's border with Afghanistan.

The military said nine soldiers were killed in the clashes over several hours and claimed that "heavy casualties" were inflicted on the militants.

The heads of a further two soldiers were later found dumped without their bodies -- one hanging from a barbed wire fence in the neighbourhood of Makane Bagh and the other in Zafar Town, local officials said.

Three worshippers were also killed and 15 wounded when a shell hit a mosque near Miranshah on Sunday, security officials and residents told AFP.

The EC Secretariat yesterday afternoon issued a gazette notification to this effect, a senior EC official said.

In the polls Mahmudul

conceded defeat to Kashem but opted for legal battle, filing an election petition with the High Court claiming that Kashem was a loan and bill defaulter. Mahmudul in his petition

said Kashem was a defaulter of Tk 15.44 crore loan with the Sonali Bank's Bangabandhu Avenue branch in Dhaka and also defaulter of telephone bill of Tk 32,000 till November 30,2008.

As per the Representation of the People's Order, Kashem's candidacy was supposed to be cancelled, he argued.

The HC on December 15, 2009 voided Kashem's parliamentary membership and declared his election candidacy illegal as Mahmudul's claims were substantiated during trial. The court also asked the

EC to declare Mahmudul elected, as he got second highest votes in the December 29 polls. Kashem filed an appeal

with the Appellate Division, challenging the HC's verdict. But he lost as the Appellate Division on February 14 this year upheld the HC verdict. After a meeting earlier in

the day, Election Commissioner Mohammad Shahnewaz said they took the decision to implement the apex court's verdict.

EC officials termed the incident first-ever in the recent parliamentary election history. "I did not witness such an incident in my entire career with the EC Secretariat in the last 25 years," said a senior official asking not to be identified.

Earlier on October 18, 2009, the Supreme Court declared illegal the parliament membership of Maj (retd) Jasim Uddin, who was elected on Awami League ticket from the Bhola-3

constituency. The SC handed down the ruling, as Jasim took part in the December 29 election before five years had passed since his retirement from the

military. Later, the EC held a byelection to that constitu-

ency, Bhola-3. Following an SC verdict, the EC last year scrapped AL leader Mohiuddin Khan Alamgir's candidature in the December 29 parliamentary polls as he was disqualified from contesting the general elections for his conviction in a corrup-
