As a bus pulled over to drop passengers at the GEC circle stop in Chittagong city, Ujjal ran to it and got on board, he had only a few minutes to sell some newspapers before the bus departed.

A couple of people handed him Tk 4 and bought newspapers.

He hurriedly got off, as the bus started to pull out. With a bundle of newspapers under his arm, and one in his hand that he was waving and yelling out to pedestrians, "Paper, paper, for just four taka you will get all the fresh

Ujjal Hossain, an eight-year-old boy, sells newspapers on the streets from morning to till early afternoon in the port city Chittagong, and then he goes to an afternoon school run by a nongovernment organisation.

"Everyday I come out from home around 6:30am and collect newspapers from my uncle at Jhawtala. Then I go through different points of the city and sell those newspapers. Sometimes I sell newspapers on the Chittagong

University shuttle train also." "I can sell about 50 to 60 copies in a day. But the number decreases on holidays because many people do not come out from their houses on those

days."

"With one taka commission for selling a copy of newspaper, I earn around fifty taka to sixty taka daily. I give all the money to my mother," he said.

Ujjal said he lives in Jhawtala slum with his parents and his brother and two sisters. His father is a vegetable seller who is unable to meet the expenses of the family with his income, so Ujjal has to help out with the earn-

The boy, also a student of class II, said he can read newspapers now, and dreams to be a police officer.

Like Ujjal, there are many other children who sell newspapers on the streets risking accidents in the port city. According to Chittagong Newspaper

Hawkers Multipurpose Co-Operative General Secretary Delwar Hossain around 30 to 40 boys sell newspapers by collecting them privately from some hawkers. He, however, claimed that there is no member in the association city. aged below 15. Mohammad Hossain, a newspaper

hawker in Kadamtoli area, said some six boys take newspapers from him and sell those at different areas in the Chittagong city. "The boys can help their family by

selling the papers, and I also get some money," he said. Talking to some boys who sell news-

Masud, doing his masters in Islamic history and culture, is a BCL joint convener of Shaheed Habibur Rahman Hall while Rubel, doing his masters in accounting and information system, is BCL joint convener of Shaheed Ziaur Rahman Hall. After one hour, some 100

BCL activists staged demonstrations on the campus demanding arrest and punishment to the attackers, whom they believe are Shibir activists.

Masked men | TK 92 LAKH 'FRAUDULENCE' Pvt company office ransacked

Agitated employees ransacked and locked up the office of a Dhaka-based company in Barisal city Thursday evening, alleging that it has defrauded them of around Tk 92.16 lakh.

Famous Bangla Welfare Society, which used to operate partly as an MLM company, opened its branch at a rented building in Zia Sarak area last November. It collected different sums of money from more than 100

employees as security deposit before their recruitment, offering salary ranging from Tk 7,200 to Tk 15,000. The company, however, stopped paying after disbursing

the first month's salary this January. Against the backdrop, the agitated staff besieged the

company office Thursday evening and demanded refund of their security money. Though the officials escaped the wrath, the agitators

looted stored products from the office. Arif Hossain Apu, an assistant manager of Famous

Bangla, told the correspondent over phone that the looted and damaged goods were worth Tk 10 lakh. He reasoned that salaries became irregular due to tempo-

rary problem of sanctioning fund. The company will sue those who looted the office, he said. Kotwali police brought the situation under control.

On April 12, Famous Bangla was forced to pay back Tk 6.34 lakh to its employees alongside handing over two motorcycles and a cheque for Tk 5 lakh.


upazila yesterday evening, killing him instantly.
