Enrique quits Roma

Luis Enrique has quit as manager of AS Roma, putting an end to a troubled reign in charge of the Serie A side, the club's general director confirmed on Friday.

"His work was good. At a certain point it wore him out and he felt the need to stop," general director Franco Baldini told Sky. "He won't be training anywhere next season.

"We invited him to take all the time he needed to decide, hoping right until the end that he would stay."

Italian media had reported Luis Enrique's departure on Thursday, after a video surfaced of him apparently saying to goodbye to the players at the club's training ground, but neither Roma, nor the coach himself, confirmed the news.

The season has been a tough one for Roma, whose new owners, led by American Thomas DiBenedetto, put the Spaniard in charge of a long-term project that they hoped would make the club as successful as the big three of AC Milan, Juventus and Inter Milan.

However, the club have suffered 14 defeats, are seventh in the league with one game to play and may not qualify for Europe next season.

The club remained publicly supportive of Luis Enrique but it was clear that pressure from fans and the local media irritated him.

Baldini said the club was committed to a flamboyant style of play which would continue under the new manager.

"The project hasn't failed we want to carry on playing a certain type of football, and from league statistics Roma is the team that has had more possession than any other, and is third behind Juve and Milan for territorial dominance and pass completion.

"This says a lot about the quality of play. The failure has been how our league campaign went, but the style of play was want we wanted from the beginning.

Former Roma striker Vincenzo Montella, who coached the club in the second half of last season after Claudio Ranieri's departure, has been tipped to take Luis Enrique's place but Baldini said the club had not yet lined up anyone.

Blatter's message to Juve

FIFA president Joseph Blatter has all but settled the debate over Juventus's number of Serie A titles by sending an official letter of congratulation to club president Andrea Agnelli.

Juve have officially won 28 titles due to having been stripped of their 2005 and 2006 successes for match-fixing.

The club refused to acknowledge the punishment and insist that they have won 30, but Blatter is having none of that.

"Congratulations for the 28th title, after nine years you are once again the best in Serie A. Well done," said Blatter in a letter intercepted by Italian media.

Juve claim they will put a third star on their shirts next season to mark 30 scudetto successes -- in Italy teams put a star on their shirts for every 10 titles won.

Having been stripped of their previous two, Juve's last official title was in 2003, nine years ago.

The Spanish league season reaches its climax on Sunday and, while Real Madrid have already wrapped up the title, there is plenty still to play for at both ends of

Madrid ended Barcelona's run of three consecutive championships by clinching the 32nd Liga crown of their history with three rounds of games remaining, but Jose Mourinho's side will still have plenty of motivation for their final game of the season at home to Mallorca.

If they win on Sunday, they will break a new Spanish

league record in reaching the 100-point mark - Barcelona holding the record of 99 set in 2009/10.

Meanwhile Barcelona go to Betis on Saturday with Lionel Messi looking to take the 'pichichi' award as La Liga's top scorer -currently on 50, he is five ahead of Cristiano

Valencia will finish third and are guaranteed Champions League football again next season, but the remaining European places are still up for grabs.

Two points clear in fourth, Malaga can seal Spain's final Champions League berth by beating Sporting Gijon at a sold-out La Rosaleda.

The southern side have never featured in Europe's elite club competition before and defender Jesus Gamez is clear what the objective is.

"We need those 3 points that will give us glory, everyone involved at this club has dreamed about this moment, the time has come and now we have a fantastic opportunity to get into the Champions League," he said.

Waiting for any slip-ups will be fifthplaced Atletico Madrid, who are fresh from beating Athletic Bilbao 3-0 to win the Europa League in midweek.

However, unless they win at Villarreal and Malaga fail to win, the capital club will have to settle for defending their trophy in the Europa League next season.

Barca defend 'Confidence is high' Messi

Barcelona staunchly defended Lionel Messi over a claim he racially abused a black Real Madrid player several seasons ago, calling it "well wide of the mark."

Dutch midfielder Royston Drenthe, on loan to Everton, was quoted in a Dutch magazine as saying he was taunted by the threetime FIFA player of the year during several of their Spanish league encounters.

"The player has always shown a maximum respect and sportsmanship towards his rivals, something which has been recognized by his fellow professionals many times, and we are sure that any accusations to the contrary are well wide of the mark," Barcelona said in a statement Thursday. "His behavior throughout his career has always been exemplary."

Chelsea have nothing to fear when they face Bayern Munich in the Champions League final next week as their semifinal win over Barcelona proved they can

beat the best in Europe, caretaker boss Roberto Di Matteo said.

Chelsea are the underdogs going into the final at Munich's Allianz Arena as they bid to become European champions for the first

But Di Matteo, who has turned the club's fortunes around since taking over from Andre Villas Boas in March, said his players were brimming with confidence. Speaking at the club's Player of the Year

awards night he said: "If you manage to go through two legs against Barcelona, I think then you can beat anybody in European football. "They're supposed to be the best team

and I think we have a fantastic group of players with tremendous quality and belief. "The confidence is very high. The spirit is very high."

Chelsea know that if they do not beat Bayern they will not take part in next season's Champions League as they cannot

finish higher than sixth in the English Premier League.

Disappointment in the league, where they will finish outside the top four for the first time since 2002, has been tempered by their FA Cup final win last week and they now stand poised for a cup double and their greatest triumph.

"We've enjoyed a good eight, nine weeks. The players have been fantastic with me," he said. "They've performed at the highest level possible and we've found ourselves in a great position now to win the biggest trophy in European football."

Chelsea will be without suspended skipper John Terry as well as Branislav Ivanovic, Ramires and Raul Meireles against the Germans.

Terry said missing their biggest game was hard to swallow. "For myself and the guys who are going to

be suspended, obviously we're bitterly disappointed," he said. "But we'll be there to support the players as we always are. We've got a fantastic group of players.

"Big nights need big players and we've certainly got loads of them."

Spaniard Juan Mata was named Chelsea's Player of the Year after his first season at the club.

Terry still to hear from Hodgson AFP, London

Chelsea captain John Terry said Thursday he is still to hear from new England manager Roy Hodgson regarding his possible participation at Euro 2012.

Hodgson is set to end the guessing game over whether Terry and Manchester United's Rio Ferdinand, long regarded as England's premier central defensive pairing, will play together at the European Championships in June when he names his squad for the tournament in Poland and Ukraine next week.

Terry faces a court case in July over allegations he racially abused Ferdinand's younger brother Anton during a Premier League match against Queens Park Rangers in October. Terry denies the charges. Speaking at his appoint-

ment last week, Hodgson said he planned to hold faceto-face talks with Terry and Ferdinand to gauge whether the two could still feature in the same squad. "I've not had any call yet

but I'm focusing on the league and Chelsea at the moment," Terry said at Chelsea's Player of the Year awards on Thursday.

"Hopefully, I get the call and I'm in the squad - and that goes for many of us here. "I'll always be there for

In 2010 Jose Mourinho the selfproclaimed 'Special One' was handed his toughest assignment yet when he took over the reins of Real Madrid, the biggest club in Spain if not the world. much work lay ahead to challenge for the league title in the following season.

The 2011-2012 has probably been one of the finest seasons in Jose Mourinho's career as a manager. Real were the early pace-setters in the league and were probably the best team in the Champions League (unfortunate not to win it). Unimaginably Barcelona struggled to keep up with Real Madrid and at one point Real opened up a ten-point lead.

Barca clawed their way back but the knock-out blow came at the Nou Camp as Real ran away 2-1 winners. Thus

> Mourinho fulfilled his obligation as Real lifted their 32th La Liga title and ended Barcelona's three year reign. The better team won the league.

In the Champions League Mourinho was unlucky as Real Madrid lost out to Bayern Munich in the tiebreaker. Mourinho failed to cross the semifinal hurdle again but he would be satisfied to see arch-rivals Barcelona crash out at the same stage to Chelsea.

The last time Real Madrid won the Champions League was back in 2002. It has been a decade since then. Barcelona have won it three times during this period.

As Jose Mourinho enters his third year at the helm more success is anticipated. His next difficult task would be to win the ultimate prize and break the Champions League jinx for Real Madrid. After all, impossible is nothing for the Special One.
