

Chittagong, Somnath Ghosh, and Premier University Vice-Chancellor, Dr. Anupam Sen, spoke on the occasion

In his speech Somnath said Tagore's thoughts and philosophy are still relevant. "His works are eternal," he said adding, "Through his work Tagore made the point that to comprehend a human being, his/her inner beauty is more important.

Anupam Sen said, Tagore's "Chitrangada" shows that human actions and contributions are more precious than physical beauty. "Physical beauty exists for a definite time but human's actions and contributions are everlasting," he added.

At the beginning, artistes of the Parishad rendered Tagore songs. Later, dance-drama "Chitrangada", choreographed by artiste Proma

Obonti, was staged Based on a story from the epic

"Mahabharata", the dance-drama narrates the tale of Chitrangada, princess of Manipur, who falls in love with Arjun, the warrior prince. To win the love of Arjun, Chitrangada was trans formed into an attractive woman by the god of love. The dance-drama ended with focusing on the truth that the real spirit of a woman lays beyond her physical beauty.

Proma Abanti and Kanta Dey enacted the roles of Chitrangada (Surupa and Kurupa). Swapan Barua and Prabir Paul performed the roles of Arjun and Madan respectively

IMMORTALITY THROUGH MUSIC

Kamol Dasgupta birth centenary celebration

A show that starts around 40minute late, has already dampened the mood. Picking up from there, and not only appeasing the audience but also leaving them wanting more, is a Herculean task. Kamol Dasgupta birth centenary celebration at Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy in Dhaka, on May 12, did just that. The event was arranged by Kamol Dasgupta Foundation and sponsored by ACI Limited; ETV was the media

For those who are not familiar with Kamol Dasgupta, he was the Kaalboishakhi who created a bold identity in the sphere of Bangla music during the Rabindra-Nazrul hangover (1930 and '40s). Dasgupta not only managed to dominate the contemporary Bangla music scene but also made a breakthrough a an uber-popular composer of Urdu/Hindi geet and ghazal.

Still lost? Surely, you've heard or hummed "Ami Bonophool Go or "Toofan Mail", or "Prithibi Amare Chaye", or "Du'ti Pakhi Du'ti Teerey"; all Dasgupta cre-Speaking on Dasgupta, music

exponent Mohammad Asafuddowla said, "Dasgupta had composed tunes of 8,500 songs, or which 400 were written by National Poet Kazi Nazrul Islam. Nazrul and Dasgupta were disciples of the same music teacher, Ustad Zamiruddin Khan. Nazrul had such blind faith on Dasgupta's abilities that he gave the composer wholehearted consent to create the melodies of his songs that haven't been

tuned yet." Reminiscing further, Asafuddowla said, "I once asked him: 'The raag used in your com positions can't be detected. Why?' His response was: 'Com-

posing a song based on a certain raag is easy, but an ideal song demands its own identity.'

Dasgupta's contribution to music came in other areas also. He devised a shorthand method for writing shorolipi (notations); sadly the practice stopped with "Under Dasgupta's able super-


regrettable that an artistemusician-composer of Dasgupta's stature is not being celebrated nationally by the state and not much has been done to preserve and promote his work. A musical homage was the highlight of the event. A-list singers, under Shujeo Shyam's competent direction and accompanied by a brilliant orchestra, resurrected Dasgupta's classic tunes.

Seasoned artiste Syed Abdul Hadi started off the music session with "Tumi Ki Ekhon Dekhichho Shopon" and "Prithibi Amare

After a rather slow start, Shakila Zafar's vivacious renditions of "Ami Bonophool Go" and "Toofan Mail" (made famous by the inimitable Kanan Debi) picked up the pace. Fatema Tuj Zohra seemed to

have forgotten the lyrics of "Jibon-er Du'ti Raati", but that created an impromptu duet between her and Shafin Ahmed (Dasgupta's son). Zohra also presented a memorable cover of "E Bhora Badol-e Hiya Doley Re".

Shafin Ahmed, better known as one of the founder members of Miles, paid tribute to his father with his covers of "Konthhe Amar Nishidin" and "Eshechhilo

Asafuddowla brought to stage Dasgupta's ghazal and Urdu geet -- "Ghum-er Chhaya" and "Tasveer Teri Dil Mera Behla Na Sakegi" (originally recorded by Talat Mahmood).

Ferdous Ara breathed life in "Bhuli Nai Bhuli Nai." Rounds of applause greeted Sabina Yasmin who conjured a nostalgia-induced monsoon ambiance with "Emoni Borosha Chhilo Shedin".

Subir Nandi sang the ever familiar "Du'ti Pakhi Du'ti Teerev" and "Menechhi Go Haar Menechhi" -- the latter, a submission to love's all-conquering

The best was, without a doubt,

saved for last, as the octogenarian songstress Feroza Begum took the stage. She needed help to get on the stage, but proved her voca abilities were anything but feeble through immaculate renditions of "Shotek Borosh-o Porey Tumi Aar Ami" and an apt closing note, "Ei Ki Go Shesh Daan".

Though the common grievance is that Dasgupta's memories have not been given proper rever ence, at that moment I reckoned, the legendary composer would survive another 100 years or as long as anyone -- knowingly or unknowingly -- hums his tunes.

Poet Sukanta's 53rd death anniversary observed


Yesterday marked the 53rd death anniversary of legendary poet Sukanta Bhattacharya. He was born in 1926 in Kalighat, Kolkata. His ancestral home is at the village Unshiya, under Gopalganj district now, in Bangladesh. His father, Nibaran Bhattacharya, was in the book selling business in Kolkata. Sukanta was one of the key figures of

modern Bengali poetry, despite the fact that most of his literary works had been in publication posthumously. During his life, his poems were not widely circulated, but after his death his reputation grew to the extent that he became one of the most popular Bengali poets of the 20th century.

The poetry of Sukanta is characterised by rebel socialist thoughts, patriotism, human ism and yet romanticism.

Sukanta spent his childhood at their house on Nibedita Lane in Kolkata. He was sent to Kamala Bidyamandir, a local primary school where his literary career began. His first short story was published in Sanchay, the school's student magazine Later another of his prose writing, "Vivekanander Jiboni", was published in Sikha, edited by Bijon Bhattacharya

After studying at Kamala Bidyamandir, he got admitted to Beleghata Deshbandhu High School. He joined the Communist Party of India in 1944. In the same year, he



edited an anthology, named "Akal", published by the Anti-Fascist Writers' and Artists' Association. In 1945, he appeared in the entrance examination from Beleghata Deshbandhu High School but failed. He was the editor of the Kishore Sabha, the Bengali daily organ of the party, Dainik Swadhinata, from its inception in 1946. He died of tuberculosis at the Jadavpur T.B. Hospital in Kolkata in 1947 at a very young age of 20. His notable literary works are "Chharpatra"

"Ghum Nei", "Purbabhas", "Abhijan", "Mithe-Kadha" and "Geeti Guccha".


