Jatrabari gas line restored

Gas supply to the capital's Jatrabari and its adjoining areas was resumed after the damaged distribution line of Titas gas in Jatrabari was restored yesterday.

Mir Moshiur Rahman, director of Titas Gas Transmission and Distribution Company, said the authorities carried out an emergency repair work to restore the damaged pipeline, resuming the gas supply by the evening.

The pipeline ruptured and caught fire early hours Sunday as the piling drill of under-construction Jatrabari Flyover collided with the gas line around four metres underneath the surface.

The gas supply to the area was cut off ever since.

The eight-inch diameter pipeline, installed in the sixties in the very beginning of gas supply to Dhaka, enters into the capital at Demra carrying natural gas from Brahmanbaria field, said Rahman.

Slum kids tell their ordeals

Deprived children yesterday told tales of their everyday ordeals of living in shanties and requested the government to provide them security and save them from child marriage.

They also appealed for not evicting the shantytowns without arranging rehabilitation of their families, as sudden eviction leaves slum children under the open sky.

About 15 children from different slums in and around the capital shared their stories of miseries and victimisation at a roundtable at Prothom Alo office in the capital.

The daily newspaper in collaboration with Unicef jointly organised the programme.

The slum kids said teenage girls in slums very often fell victim to sexual harassment, which compelled their helpless parents to marry them off at a tender age. The deprived children are also prey to drug peddlers, who force them into the crime, they said.

Many minor children, whom their mental rights, he added. parents leave unprotected to go for work, become victim of human traffickers, the kids said, and described sanitation as the worstproblemin slums.

Prof Nazrul Islam, an urban planner, said evicting slums without arranging rehabilitation was worse than natural calamities, like river erosion and cyclone, as there were a lot of infants being brought up in these places.

As the government goes tough against the drug peddlers, said State Minister for LGRD and Cooperatives Jahangir Kabir Nanok, the criminals choose slum kids and allured them with money.

"Our constitution has ensured children's rights. So the government is working relentlessly for that", he said.

He mentioned that the government was providing Tk 1500 for each of 500 slum children a month in the capital's Lalbagh.

Such activities will be extended to 8000 points across the country so that deprived children can meet their funda-

He also said the government already had rescued 55,000 slum children, who were involved in risky jobs.

In reply to a question of a slum child about frequent fire incidents in slums like Lalbagh Slum, Nanok said there were several reasons behind such arson attacks.

With changing of hands of state power, rent collectors from slums are changed, leading to clashes and arson attacks at the shantytowns, he said.

He added the ruling party cadres usually realised such rents illegally.

The slum children urged the minister to take steps so that their potential ity could be nurtured, and for this they demanded recovery of local playgrounds from the hands of influential persons and free access to recreational centres like zoo, museum.

They also raised a series of problems, including water logging, high rent, and scarcity of drinking water in slums.

Prothom Alo Joint Editor Abdul Quaiyum moderated the roundtable.

outlets held a meeting and decided to publish the editorial and broadcast special news report. The meeting was arranged on the occasion of today's sit-in.

The demonstration programme was announced on March 18 at a grand rally, demanding arrest of the killers of the journalist couple. From today's sit-in, which is jointly organised by journal-

ists' organisations and unions, journalists will also press home their demands, which also include providing a secured environment for discharging of their duties, stopping oppression on them, and ensuring freedom of the press. Bangladesh Federal Union of Journalists (BFUJ)

Study underway to find out best safety net actions

A research initiative is underway to find out which kinds of social safety net transfers work best for the rural poor in Bangladesh.

The study will assess impacts of five different safety net transfer modalities on household income, food security, and child nutrition.

This is a joint initiative of Washington-based think tank International Food Policy Research Institute (IFPRI) and United Nations World Food Programme (WFP), an IFPRI press release said yesterday.

The move comes at a time when the government has expressed willingness to further expand its budget on social safety net programmes (SSNPs).

Finance Minister AMA Muhith has recently said some new programmes will be included in the safety net programmes for underprivileged people as eunuchs and nomadic communities. The Disaster

Management and Relief Division of Ministry of Food and Disaster Management will host an inception ceremony of the research at a hotel in the capital tomorrow. Commencing this May,

the research project will continue till mid-2013.

The research will try to identify which of the five transfer modalities, under which some 4000 ultra-poor women receive a monthly assistance, valued at Tk 1500, best serve the purposes. The five transfer modalities are cash-only, food-only, cash and food combined, cash and nutrition training, and food and nutrition training.

Land broker shot dead in capital

Shop employee stabbed

at Khilgaon

Engineer shot in another incident

Unidentified miscreants shot dead a land broker at his under-construction building at Chotbari Laltek in the capital yesterday.

The deceased was Bashiruddin Bashu, 45, residing at his own house in the city's Nababer Bagh Uttar Para area.

Bashiruddin was splashing water on the moulding of the rooftop of his Chotbari Laltek building when two youths came there and shot him in the head, said eye-witness Shahjahan Miah.

Shahjahan, tenant of Bashiruddin's another building, said he was accompanying Bashiruddin on the rooftop when the incident happened.

Critically injured Bashiruddin was rushed to National Institute of Traumatology and Orthopaedic Rehabilitation (Nitor) where doctors announced him dead, said Officer-in-Charge (OC) Anisur Rahman of Shah Ali Police Station.

His relatives said he had rivalry with several people over issues of land brokerage and possession of land.

A case was filed with Shah Ali Police Station in connection

with the killing but none was arrested as yet. In another incident, extortionists shot a project engineer

of an under-construction building at Rampura yesterday. The victim was Moazzem Hossain, 50, an employee of Al-Kamil Properties.

Masud Rana, a witness and official of the company, said four youths appeared before the site at around 12:00 noon,

introduced themselves as the guests of the engineer and asked a

worker to call him over cell phone. At one stage, they fired two bullets on the engineer while he

Masud rushed him to Dhaka Medical College Hospital. Meanwhile, muggers stabbed a clothe store employee and snatched money and valuables from him at Khilgaon early yesterday.


was coming to them.

Police raided a mess at Madani Manjil in Mirpur Section-13 around 1:00am yesterday and arrested the Shibir men, said


