Cooling water for Barapukuria Power Plant

An article on the above topic was published in a local English daily on May 6th on this

Interestingly, it seemed that the answer to the problems of water depletion in surrounding villages was not such a difficult matter!

The article stated that the mine-mouth coal-fired power plant needs 1000 cusec of water for cooling daily. On the other hand, it was also stated that the mine pumps out 1500m3 of water every hour which is equivalent to 36000m3 water daily. It would have been better to put both the units of water flow in either meter cube or cusecs per day, for comparison. Further, it was stated that the water for cooling the power plant is supplied by 14 deep tube-wells at an average of 70 cusec each per tube-well daily.

Normally, the power plant should recover at least 80 percent of the cooling water needed, and thus the logical shortfall of (1000-800) around 200cusecs of water daily needs to be provided. Further, it was also stated that 36000m3 of water pumped out of the mine daily, which can easily produce 32000m3 of boiler water suitable for the power plant daily. Nothing was said about this important aspect of salvaging the mine water for use in the power plant!

This water can be filtered and treated and can produce boiler quality water. Such plant can easily be procured from boiler water softening plant suppliers who, based on the analysis of the mine water samples, can recommend the plant and equipment needed for producing boiler quality water. It does not need any consultant for design and procurement of such a plant. Unfortunately, nothing was mentioned about this mater either. Over all, it was an unclear and technically incomplete report on the gamut of the whole problem, to come to any sensible conclusion!

We want safe travel on road

In recent days road accidents have become so common that people do not feel safe during travels. In our local news bulletins, either in the print and electronic media, every day we come across reports on a large number of deaths and injuries due to road accidents.

The causes of these accidents include mechanical error, carelessness of the drivers and commuters about traffic rules, bad condition of highways and untrained drivers. Moreover, use of drug by drivers, talking on mobile phones while driving, reluctance of the public to use overbridge, stopping vehicles at any place, overtaking, over speeding, and use of unfit vehicles have added to the already critical situation.

A survey shows that about 12-15 thousand people of our country lose their lives and nearly 20-25 thousand people are wounded due to road accidents every year. About 100-150 vehicles out of 10,000 are subjected to road accidents. The expansion of business activities and growth of the economy have its negative impact on the traffic system because our infrastructure facilities have not expanded at the same pace.

These accidents cause a large number of families helpless. Many people become disabled for the rest of their lives. This also affects a person psychologically. Unfortunately, the authorities do not seem to be careful enough to reduce the frequency of road accidents. We, therefore, draw the attention of the communications ministry and the general public. As responsible citizens, we have to be careful, make our children and drivers aware of the traffic rules. Carefulness can save our valuable lives.

Reducing maternal and newborn deaths

It is appreciable that Bangladesh has improved the situation in the area of maternal and newborn deaths. A report says that infant mortality rate has declined from 85 deaths per 1000 live births in late '80s to 52 deaths per 1000 live births over the period of 2002 to 2006. Another report says that maternal mortality rate has declined from 514 deaths per 100,000 in the mid '80s to 322 deaths per 100,000 in the late '90s.

It is said that malnutrition is the major cause of maternal and newborn deaths in our country. Though poverty alleviation is the first step to tackle malnutrition in general, maternal anemia should be addressed particularly as part of tackling malnutrition. Experts say around 45 percent women in Bangladesh suffer from anemia during pregnancy. Because of anemia, women face different types of complications like prolonged labour during delivery. Delivering underweight child, maternal and neonatal death etc. are also the results of anemia.

We have learnt from a newspaper report that for improving the situation of maternal anemia in Bangladesh, the government has introduced a programme under which 100 Iron Folic Acid tablets are distributed among the pregnant women. Unfortunately, the tablets are wrapped in normal paper when distributed. These tablets lose their original colour and turn black in contact with air. As a result, many women give up taking those discoloured tablets thinking that they have lost their effectiveness. These tablets can be distributed in bottles or blister packets.

Sincere efforts of the authorities can reduce maternal and newborn deaths in the country.
