





# Maznun Mizan Show stealer

Maznun Mizan's acting career began 15 years ago, with Dhaka Theatre. Regular stage appearance eventually brought him to the world of TV plays. Although he took on humble roles in the beginning, his popularity grew with TV commercials. His success in the media landed him impor tant roles in TV plays and made him a known face among the viewers.

Recently Mizan had a chat with The Daily Star (TDS). Excerpts:

When did you join Dhaka Theatre? Mizan: January 16, 1996. I also enrolled at Jahangirnagar University as a student during that time. Studies and acting both went on side by side. Truth be told, the doors to all dreams opened for me when I joined Dhaka Theatre. I learned many things, which I would not have unless I joined theatre.

Which Dhaka Theatre productions did you work in?

Mizan: I acted in "Bonpangshul", "Merchant of Venice", "Joiboti Konyar Mon", "Mrityu Shongbad" and "Prachya". These plays set the ground for my career. Theatre is the best school for acting.

Mizan: I worked for eight years straight. I

still work with them when old plays are staged. I want to continue working on stage.

What are your recent projects? Mizan: I am immersed in projects. I'm doing several serials at the moment. "Motijheel Commercial Area", "Hawai Mithhai", "Sorol Satya", "Boyra Poribar", "Taal Bahana", "Shoshur Bari Private Lim ited" are currently being aired. A serial titled "Shobuj Nokkhotro" recently concluded its airing. Meanwhile, several new ones -- "Prohelika", "Kacher Ghor", "Prem

Dao" -- will start their telecasts. Are you working on any one-hour-play

Mizan: Special one-hour-dramas, featuring me, were aired on Independence Day and Valentine's Day. I recently worked on a drama called "Kuhu", where I star opposite Sadia Islam Mou. I also finished work on a drama titled "Mon, Shorir, Mon" and will soon be working on four more

What was your first aired TV play? Mizan: It was "Kash Bon-er Konya", directed by Shahidul Haq Khan. My career in TV began with a minor character.

To what extent did you have to struggle to arrive where you are at now?

Mizan: I struggled a lot. I had no connection/contact in the media. Whatever my achievements are, I earned them on How long did you stay with Dhaka Thea- my own. Maybe it was my experience in theatre that helped me along the way. Besides, my patience and determination also made it possible. Any regret?

Mizan: At the beginning of my career in TV, I used to get only small roles. I was never discouraged, but thought that hard work will eventually earn me better results However, my father was concerned as to why I got minor roles in plays. By the time I started getting more prominent roles in plays, my father passed away before being able to see my success. This is a matter of great regret for me.

What are the most significant plays of

Mizan: The serials "Baba" by Abdullah Al Mamun, "Nokshi Parer Manushera" by Giasuddin Selim and "Lohar Churi" by Mohammad Hossain Jamie, Other works that deserve mention are "Tomar Doa-e Bhalo Achhi Ma", "Mohona", "Ekta Kinle Ekta Free", "Journey by Boat" and "Choita Pagol". Besides I worked in serials and onehour-plays by Humayun Ahmed, which I consider some of my best works. You are also a host?

Mizan: Sometimes I host programmes. I hosted almost 200 episodes of Banglavision's "Raat Birate". I want to continue my work as a host, but not by neglecting my acting career.

Tell us about your dreams regarding

Mizan: Many TV plays are being made nowadays, but there is a lack of quality. Production standards are on a downward spiral. I want more quality works -- from both the makers and the actors.

## DISCO QUEEN DONNA SUMMER

Like the King of Pop or the Queen of Soul, Donna Summer was bestowed a title fitting of musical royalty -- the Queen of Yet unlike Michael Jackson or Aretha Franklin, it was a

designation she wasn't comfortable embracing "I grew up on rock 'n' roll," Summer once said when explaining her reluctance to claim the title.

Indeed, as disco boomed then crashed in a single decade in the 1970s, Summer, the beautiful voice and face of the genre with pulsating hits like "I Feel Love", "Love to Love You Baby" and "Last Dance", would continue to make hits incorporating the rock roots she so loved. One of her biggest hits, "She Works Hard for the Money", came in the early 1980s and relied on a smouldering guitar solo as well as Summer's booming voice.

Yet it was with her disco anthems that she would have the most impact in music, and it's how she was remembered Thursday as news spread of her death at age 63.

Summer died of cancer Thursday morning in Naples, Florida, said her publicist Brian Edwards. Her family released a statement saying they "are at peace celebrating her extraordinary life and her continued legacy."

Luminaries from Aretha Franklin to Dolly Parton and Barbra Streisand mourned the loss, as did US President Barack Obama, who said he and First Lady Michelle Obama were saddened to hear of the passing of the five-time Grammy winner. "Her voice was unforgettable, and the music industry has lost a legend far too soon," he said. "Our thoughts and prayers go out to Donna's family and her dedicated fans."

It had been decades since that brief, flashy moment when Summer was every inch the Disco Queen.

Her glittery gowns and long eyelashes. Her luxurious hair and glossy, open lips. Her sultry vocals, her moans and sighs. She was as much a part of the culture as disco balls, polyester, platform shoes and the music's pulsing, pounding rhythms.

Summer's music gave voice to not only a musical revolution, but a cultural one -- a time when sex, race and fashion were being explored and exploited with freedom like never before in the United States.

Her rise was inseparable from disco's itself, even though she remained popular for years after the genre she helped invent had died. She won a Grammy for best rock vocal performance for "Hot Stuff", a fiery guitar-based song that repre sented her shift from disco to more rock-based sounds, and created another kind of anthem with "She Works Hard for the Money", this time for women's rights.

Elton John said in a statement that Summer was more than three daughters, Brooklyn, Mimi and Amanda.

"Her records sound as good today as they ever did. That



she has never been inducted into the Rock 'n' Roll Hall of Fame is a total disgrace especially when I see the second-rate talent that has been inducted," he said. "She is a great friend to me and to the Elton John AIDS Foundation and I will miss

Summer may not have liked the title and later became a born-again Christian, but many remembered her best for her early years, starting with the sinful "Love to Love You Baby". Released in 1975, a breakthrough hit for Summer and for disco, it was a legend of studio ecstasy and the genre's ultimate sensual anthem.

What started as a scandal became a classic. The song was later sampled by LL Cool J, Timbaland and Beyonce, who interpolated the hit for her jam "Naughty Girl". It was also Summer's U.S. chart debut and the first of 19 No. 1 dance hits between 1975 and 2008 -- second only to Madonna.

Summer, real name LaDonna Adrian Gaines, was born in 1948 in Boston. She was raised on gospel music and became the soloist in her church choir by age 10.

A marriage to Helmuth Sommer didn't last, but the singer did hold on to her ex-husband's last name, changing it to "Summer". By 1974, she had met producers Giorgio Moroder and Pete Bellotte and released her first album, "Lady of the Night", to success in Europe.


Religion played an important role in her later life, said Michael Levine, who briefly worked as her publicist. "Her passion in her life, besides music, was God, spirituality and religion. She held a bible study class at her home every week," he said.

Summer released her last album, "Crayons", in 2008. It was her first full studio album in 17 years. She also performed on "American Idol" that year with its top female contestants. Summer is survived by her husband, Bruce Sudano, and

The anniversary show of Shunnon Theatre' monodrama "Lal Jamin" has been dedicated to the deceased photographer Shawkat Jamil. Prior to the show at the Experimental Theatre Hall of Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy on May 17, one-minute-silence was observed for the photographer who died last March due to brain haemorrhage.

Poet Nirmalendu Gun and journalist Zahid Reza Noor, among others, attended the show as guests.

This was the 38th show of the play. Written by Mannan Heera and directed by Sudip Chakroborthy, "Lal Jamin" is a chronicle of a female freedom fighter, who after four decades of independence, asks the nation about realisation of the goals of Liberation War.

The play zooms in on an adolescent and her happiest days. As the war breaks out,

her father joins the freedom fighters. The young girl wants to do the same but her mother objects. Then one day, she meets a young man, whom she calls "an illusionist". The illusionist's spirit encourages her to overcome all hurdles and join the pro-

Liberation forces. But the girl, along with other freedom fighters, is captured by the Pakistani occupation forces. They encage her till the war is over. After 40 years of independence, she asks

the nation whether the spirit and values of the war have been upheld. Momena Chowdhury of Aranyak played he protagonist.

Ramiz Raju and Julfikar Chanchal directed the music for the play. An added attraction is a flute recital by Bari Siddiqui.

Bangladeshi expatriate painter Imtiaj Shohag has been working with quiet determination to make it in the Paris art circuit. He is presently in Dhaka for a few weeks, and his solo painting exhibition, titled "The Water Beyond", is now on at Alliance Française de Dhaka, in Dhanmondi. Shohag has developed styles that are mainly technique-based. The painter works in encaustic medium, which uses heated wax -- coloured pigments are added to that. The paste is then applied to a surface, like wood or canvas. In older times, this medium gained much popularity among the experimental painter for its promptness and its quick application process. The medium has seen resurgence in popularity since the 1990s.


Shohag constructs an image and then he deconstructs it, only to recreate it. Well-drawn figures, objects and meticulously created textures make most of his images memorable. His works often high light natural disasters, and painfu man-made adversities. He is particularly concerned about the chaotic aspects of calamities flood, cyclone, global warming and pollution. Suffering of floodaffected people, broken ships, irrigation, pitchers, the effects of tremor, road accidents and many more imageries realistically appear in his paintings. It is obvious that his mode of expression has a great similarity to narrative



paintings where one gets a familiar story of his or her surround-

capture fragmented visions inspired by realism. The artist did many paintings where forms of disinter tion were highlighted. At his ong ing exhibition, his works also highlight a combination of contempo rary geometric shapes and kaleido scope forms. The artist has used figures and motifs derived from h whimsical visions.

Collage is a recurring technique visible in his works. He feels that the technique gives an edge to his paintings. The works seem time consuming as well. The exhibition ends on May 22.


