Tech-run dev process to collapse

Warns naturalist Dwijen Swarma at exhibition

The development process, which is driven by technology and neglects nature, will collapse, renowned naturalist Dwijen Swarma warned yesterday.

"The development plan being implemented now is borrowed from the western colonialists and is separating us from the nature," said Swarma, also a nature writer, at the inaugural of a three-day exhibition.

Bangladesh Resource Center for Indigenous Knowledge (BARCIK) is organising it at Drik Gallery in the capital. The exhibition titled "Uncultivated food, local rice varieties and rural food-biodiversity of

Bangladesh" will remain open from 9:00am to 8:00pm.

Over 500 indigenous rice varieties, 250 vegetables, fruits and traditional social and cultural motifs collected from different parts of the country are being exhibited.

Dwijen Swarma said leaders of the tropical part of the world, including Mahatma Gandhi, wanted development where human and nature will live hand in hand. However, after the Second World War, the western colonialists imposed a development paradigm that is dependent on technology and destructive to the nature, he said.

"I am frustrated about the future of the human race with such techno-

logical development and destruction of ecology," he said, expecting that the authorities will take lesson from the consequences. Mokaram Hossain, a nature writer,

said Bangladesh is gradually losing its indigenous rice, fruits, vegetable varieties and trees. "Instead, we see many alien trees that are not suitable for this land," he said. Now there are so many trees

Eucalyptus and Acacia -- in each and every corner of the country. These are causing loss of natural balance, he said, adding that adequate research should be done before planting alien trees.

Sujit Chowdhury, advisor on climate change from German Embassy-

Dhaka, said ecological degradation is so widespread in Bangladesh that there must be strong movements, including in the political parties, to preserve the nature.

"Otherwise, this country will not sustain," he said, adding that Germany is a leading partner in mitigating climate change challenges. Germany will stand by Bangladesh in its efforts to tackle climate change impacts, he added.

Sukanta Sen, executive director of BARCIK, said they have been trying to create awareness on protection of the country's biodiversity for long, and the exhibition was part

Bangladesh protests BSF killing

Dhaka has strongly protested the killing of an unarmed Bangladeshi national by the Indian Border Security Force (BSF) in Chapainawabganj on May 16 and called for immediate effective action to prevent such incidents from recurring in future.

In a statement, the foreign ministry said Durul Islam, 38, son of Afzal Hossain of Azmatpur Hudmapara village in Shibganj upazila of Chapainawabganj district, was killed by BSF from Sasani camp.

It said Darul Islam received bullet wounds when BSF opened fire while inspecting his own maize field. Durul Islam succumbed to the bullet wounds on the day.

In another incident, Bangladeshi national Faruk Ali died as a result of firing by BSF men in the same area on April 14, said the foreign ministry.

Following continuation of such killing by BSF, the foreign ministry recalled the firm commitments from the Indian authorities as well as the Indian leadership to put an end to such acts of violence.

The foreign ministry asked the authorities concerned of India to conduct an inquiry into the incidents of killing and take appropriate action against the BSF personnel responsible for such deplorable acts.

It also called for immediate effective action to prevent such incidents from recurring in future.

PALACE GRABBING BY JUDGE

HC orders probe

The High Court yesterday directed the law secretary to investigate into the allegations against a joint district judge and three others of occupying "a former Hindu zamindar's palace" at Nawabganj in Dhaka.

During hearing on a rule, the court also asked the secretary to submit the enquiry report before it within a month.

The HC issued the suo moto rule on May 10 following a report published in the Daily Sun under the headline "Zamindar palace is judge's palace now!"

The four reportedly involved in grabbing the palace are- Abul Hossain Khandaker, the then joint district judge of Feni, who is now attached to the ministry of law, his brothers Abul Kalam Khandaker, and Khandaker Abu Ashfaq, also a local BNP leader and chairman of the upazila and their uncle Khandaker Abul Hashem.

Earlier, Abul Hossain Khandaker was promoted as an additional district judge once but the government demoted him after receiving some allegations, Deputy Attorney General

ABM Altaf Hossain told The Daily Star. Meanwhile, a high official of the law ministry requesting anonymity said that Abul

Hossain Khandaker is now attached to the ministry as Officer on Special Duty (OSD). However, departmental proceedings are

going on against him on different allegations, he added. The HC bench of Justice AHM Shamsuddin Choudhury Manik and Justice Jahangir

Hossain Selim yesterday set July 10 to pass further orders on this matter and directed the four accused to appear before it on July 8. The four had appeared before the HC

yesterday in this connection yesterday as per its earlier order. According to the news report, an influential

local family has allegedly occupied the magnificent palace of a former Hindu zamindar at Kolakopa under Nawabganj upazila. Built during the British rule on several

acres of land, the palace now has "Joj bari (judge's house) engraved on its entrance wall, the report stated.

The property of Madhusudan Roy, Shyamlal Roy, Kanailal Saha and Harmohan Saha was declared vested property and a total of 20.6 acres of land was leased out to Ansar Academy in 1979 and 1981.

However, a section of unscrupulous people grabbed a portion of the property along with the beautiful palace, the report added.

Prisoners take Sylhet jail guard hostage

A group of inmates of Sylhet Central Jail yesterday held a jail guard hostage for about two hours protesting irregularities in the prison including sub-standard food supply.

The inmates held Subedar Yousuf at knife point and demanded of the jail officials to arrange a meeting with Sylhet Deputy Commissioner Khan Mohammad Belal and National Human Rights Commission Chairman Dr Mizanur Rahman. Yousuf was freed after a

scuffle between inmates and jail staff that left 3 prisoners and 6 staff members injured.

Shahidul Alam, additional district magistrate, confirmed the incident.

A three-member probe committee has been formed to investigate the incident.

Implement budgetary allocation for women

Urge two rights bodies

Two women's rights organisations yesterday urged the government to properly implement the budgetary allocation for women to turn them into skilled human resources in the

science, technology and mass communication sectors. Addressing a press conference, they also demanded an increase in the budgetary allocation for these sectors in the 2012-13 fiscal.

Bangladesh Nari Progati Sangha (BNPS) and UN Women jointly organised the press conference, "We want substantial allocation to ensure participation of women in science, information and technology", at the capital's Jatiya Press Club.

BNPS Director Omar Tarek Chowdhury read out a 19point recommendation at the conference, where its Executive Director Rokeya Kabir also spoke. Quoting the finance ministry's "Gender Budgeting

Report, 2011-12", he said around 20 per cent of the budgetary allocation for the information and communication technology ministry was meant for the benefit of women. But according to a survey, women at the field level did not

benefit from the ministry's gender sensitive projects, he said. Tarek Chowdhury called upon the government to widen opportunities for women so that they can avail education

and training to benefit from the budgetary allocation. He also urged the government to formulate provisions making it mandatory for media houses to keep a 50 percent

job quota for women.
