Nato urges Pakistan to reopen supply route

Agrees to hand Afghans security lead by mid-2013

AFP, Chicago

Nato leaders yesterday called on Pakistan to reopen a key supply route into Afghanistan "as soon as possible" after talks with Islamabad on the border crossing faltered.

In a declaration at a summit in Chicago, the alliance expressed appreciation to Russia and Central Asian governments for allowing supply convoys through their territory and said "Nato continues to work with Pakistan to reopen the ground lines of communication as soon as possible."

"The countries in the region, particularly Pakistan, have important roles in ensuring enduring peace, stability and security in Afghanistan and in facilitating the completion of the transition process," the declaration said.

"We stand ready to continue dialogue and practical cooperation with relevant regional actors in this regard," it added.

Islamabad shut its border to Nato supplies in November after a botched US air raid that left 24 Pakistani soldiers

To ferry troops, food and equipment into Afghanistan, the US-led force in Afghanistan has relied on cargo flights and a more costly northern route network that passes through Russia, Central Asia and the Caucasus.

Meanwhile, Nato leaders agreed yesterday to hand Afghan forces the lead for security from mid-2013 as they rush to end the unpopular war and ensure Afghanistan can ward off the Taliban after foreign troops leave.

In the summit declaration, US President Barack Obama and his 27 military allies confirmed plans to withdraw their combat troops by the end of 2014 and leave behind a training mis-

The leaders declared that the transition process was "irreversible" and would put Afghan forces "in the lead for security nationwide" by mid-2013, allowing US-led troops to gradually shift their focus from combat to support.

"We are gradually and responsibly drawing down our forces to complete the ISAF (International Security Assistance Force) mission by 31 December 2014," they said in a declaration setting in stone a roadmap agreed in 2010. US President Barack Obama yester-

day vowed that the international community would not abandon Afghanistan as it seeks to take control of its own security and shape its future. As the Taliban remain resilient after a

decade of war, Nato leaders sought to reassure Afghan President Hamid Karzai that the international community would not abandon his country after 130,000 foreign combat troops are gone.

Syria forces

Syrian forces ambushed and killed nine army deserters in a north Damascus suburb yesterday, a human rights watchdog said, as Nato ruled out military action against the regime of President Bashar al-Assad.

The bloodletting also appeared to spill over into neighbouring Lebanon where two people were killed overnight in street battles between pro- and anti-Syrian groups in Beirut, a security official said.

The latest violence in Syria comes after a rocketpropelled grenade exploded on Sunday near a team of UN observers in a Damascus suburb.

Mamata non-committal on Pranab as president

West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee yesterday remained non-committal on backing Congress leader Pranab Mukherjee as president saying her party would strongly support Speaker Meira Kumar for the post.

"No, I didn't say but if allows him who am I to oppose it? It depends on the majority. It is a

democratic country. He (Mukherjee) is finance minister...for Pranab Mukherjee I am very much sincere. About this I am very much serious. It's Congress party's decision (as to) who will be the candidate. We cannot say. I cannot interfere in Congress party's business.

"But if you ask my party's choice or the personal choice, then I'll say, I love Miera Kumar. She is a soft-spoken lady from the scheduled caste background," she told CNN-IBN.

She was replying to questions about her party's stand on the coming presidential election and why Mukherjee's name is not not on her wishlist for the post of president.

Banerjee also favoured former Governor Gopalakrishna Gandhi or former president APJ Abdul Kalam. "These three names are better, I think so,

she said, according to the transcript of the interview issued by the channel.

Asked about Pranab Mukherjee, the chief of Trinamool Congress, which runs a coalition government with the Congress in West Bengal, said, "Is he the son of Bengal? He may the son of world... I don't think so but it is his choice. I don't know."

To a query about Mukherjee not not being in Mamata Banerjee's wishlist for the post of president, Banerjee said "No. I didn't say. But if country allows him, who am I to oppose it."

Mali solves political impasse

Alast-minute deal signed with Mali's junta on a transition government solved a political impasse, but as mediators left yesterday, a crisis in the rebelhold north loomed large over the new leaders.

Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS) mediators wrapped up a mission to Mali after securing their choice for transition president by offering the leader of a March 22 coup the status of former head of state.

"We are all leaving, with the feeling that we have accomplished our mission" set by ECOWAS, Ivory Coast Minister of African Integration Adama Bictogo told AFP.

"The framework of the transition has been defined," he added.

Putin names new Russian cabinet

Russian President Vladimir Putin has announced a new cabinet, warning that it will have to fulfill its duties in a difficult global economic climate.

Putin, who won a third term in March's election, said yesterday that the new cabinet - led by Prime Minister Dmitry Medvedev- should


continue the course set in previous years. Medvedev stepped down as president to allow Putin to reclaim the top job. Putin

served as the premier for four years after

having to relinquish his presidency after two terms due to limits. Many members of the old cabinet have retained their seats, including Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov, Defence Minister Anatoly Serdyukov and Finance Minister

Anton Siluanov, reports AP. Politicians in charge of the health, education, and interior ministries are to be replaced after facing strong public criticism.

Italy quake zone hit by aftershocks

Several thousand Italians were sheltering in cars and makeshift tent cities yesterday as a series of aftershocks rattled towns across the northeast after a strong quake killed six people.

Sunday's 6.0 magnitude quake reduced homes and historic buildings to rubble in the densely-populated Ferrara area, Italy's industrial heartland but also home to priceless architectural and art treasures.

At least 24 aftershocks were felt through the night and heavy rains lashed the area as firemen and police made house-tohouse checks and rescuers set up four tent cities to provide shelterforabout 4,000 people.

"We are really afraid that there's going to be another big one," said one resident of Finale Emilia.

Pakistan opposition boycotts PM dinner for Erdogan

Pakistan's main opposition party said yesterday it would boycott a banquet being hosted by the prime minister for Turkey's premier, as a protest against the Pakistani leader's conviction for contempt.


The snub from opposition leader Nawaz Sharif's Pakistan Muslim League-N is likely to embarrass Prime Minister Yousuf Raza Gilani in front of his visiting Turkish counterpart Recep Tayyip Erdogan, who is widely admired in Pakistan.

On April 26, Gilani became Pakistan's first sitting prime minister to be convicted in court, for refusing to ask the Swiss authorities to reopen corruption cases against President Asif Ali Zardari.

Gaddafi ex-spy chief charged in Mauritania over false papers

A Mauritanian court has charged Moamer Gaddafi's ex-spy chief, arrested two months ago and the subject of several handover demands, with illegally entering the country, an official said yesterday. Abdullah al-Senussi, feared former right hand man

of the slain Libyan leader, was charged overnight for using false travel documents to illegally enter Mauritania on March 16 on a flight from Casablanca.

"He was charged and put in prison, in a cell specially prepared ahead of the trial, whose date has yet to be set," a judicial source told AFP on condition of anonymity.

Sri Lanka's ex-army chief freed from jail

Sri Lanka's ex-army chief Sarath Fonseka was released from prison yesterday after he was jailed following his unsuccessful bid to unseat the president in 2010, and vowed to "save" the country.

"I am free. I will devote my life for my people," Fonseka shouted to thousands of supporters as he emerged from Welikada prison in Colombo, after receiving a pardon ordered last week by President Mahinda Rajapakse.

"I will not betray the people who stood behind me. I will save the country. The people will correct the injustice caused to me... I was a victim of a vendetta," he said, referring to his incarceration of more than two years.

Malaysia's Anwar to be charged over protest

Malaysian opposition leader Anwar Ibrahim will be charged over an April protest demanding fair elections, his lawyer said yesterday, accusing the government of a fresh bid to remove Anwar from politics. The move comes just four months after

Anwar was acquitted of sodomy in a long-running trial that the charismatic leader has said was engineered by the government of Prime Minister Najib Razak to remove him as a political threat. Anwar will be charged in a Kuala Lumpur court today with

violating a contentious new law on public assemblies and a court order restricting the April 28 rally, his lawyer Sivarasa Rasiah told AFP. "This is a fresh attempt to bar Anwar from participating in
