Bus supervisor finds tragic end

Supervisor of a bus was crushed under its wheels at Pallabi in the capital yesterday.

The deceased was Monir Shikdar, 31, supervisor of an ENA Paribahan bus that was under-repair with faulty engine.

ENA Paribahan sources said the bus was taken to a

garage in Mirpur-12 where the incident happened.

The engine mechanic, who was trying to start the bus, failed to control the bus after it started, thus

hitting into Monir around 6:00am.

Monir was rushed to Dhaka Medical College
Hospital where doctors declared him dead.

Inu for dialogue

Jatiya Samajtantrik Dal (JSD) yesterday stressed on holding an all party dialogue to find an 'alternative mechanism' for holding free and fair elections.

This is the only way to resolve the ongoing political deadlock centering the debate on the caretaker government system, said Hasanul Haq Inu, chief of JSD, a component of ruling AL-led alliance.

He was speaking at a press conference at the Jatiya Sangsad Media Centre in the capital.

He, however, said the caretaker government system cannot be restored after the High Court verdict on it.

"The opposition party can suggest a model on the alternative system," said Inu, also chief of the parliamentary standing committee on post and telecommunication ministry.

She said the five-year rule of BNP-Jamaat alliance government and the successive two-year tyrannical period in the name of caretaker government left behind a trail of corruption and mismanagement in the country.

She mentioned that the caretaker government oppressed many teachers, students, businessmen and politicians and filed cases against them.

Mentioning that there has been no delay in holding the trial of war criminals, the premier called upon all, including the professionals, to remain united as ill-efforts are on to protect the war criminals.

She also expressed her strong resolve that democratic process would continue in Bangladesh alongside the efforts to make it a prosperous country.

She also urged the professionals to help publicise the development activities of the government as their working field was very vast.

Hasina mentioned that her government was doing very well compared to many other countries despite the global economic 'recession'.

Bangladeshi workers to enjoy re-employment

South Korea will facilitate reemployment for a period of four years and ten months to the Bangladeshi workers who do not overstay illegally and return back to their homeland on completion of their job contracts in South Korea, said a press release of the South Korean Embassy in Dhaka.

This special facility will be given as per the Employment Permit Scheme of South Korea.

Under the earlier Industrial Trainee System of the country, a Bangladeshi worker could work under a company for three years and be re-employed for three more years.

"Those who return home after completion of their stipulated period will be considered honest and sincere workers and will be awarded through reemployment in the same companies. Korea is going to frame a law in this regard," the press release said.

'Encourage women into driving profession'

CHILD DROWNING

A leading killer, yet unrecognised: Unicef

Although drowning is emerging as a leading killer of children in Bangladesh, it has remained undetected as a significant health issue, says a new Unicefreport.

One of every four children

between one and four years dies from

drowning in Bangladesh, Cambodia, Vietnam, and Thailand, it shows. More children drown than die of diseases like measles, polio, whooping cough, tetanus, diphtheria and tuberculosis combined in the four countries,

which were surveyed for the report.

"For too long drowning has been

a hidden epidemic", said Gordon Alexander, director of Unicef's Office of Research, which jointly conducted the study with The Alliance for Safe Children (TASC).

"Drowning is emerging as a leading cause of death for children in the surveyed countries. And yet drowning is off the political radar".

Adequate supervision and swimming lessons can significantly reduce child drowning, suggests the report, "Child Drowning: Evidence for a newly recognised epidemic and its prevention", which has been published recently.

The vast majority of drowning

deaths are preventable, as they tend to occur within 20 metres of the home, when unsupervised children wander off and fall into local water hazards.

The report includes new evidence into prevention interventions in an operational research programme in Bangladesh, which shows 80 percent of the deaths were reduced when poor village women leave their children at village crèches when at work.

Another 90 percent death rate was slashed for children four years and older, who participated in SwimSafe (swimming and safe rescue training) programme.

"This report makes clear that

there is a serious--and until now, hidden--problem in the countries surveyed", said Gordon Alexander.

"It also provides evidence of affordable interventions that can save hundreds of thousands of children's lives. We must now act where we have the evidence".

The report claims that the actual drowning death toll in Bangladesh is higher than is reported, as drowning causes immediate death mostly, and children who drown are never taken to health facilities whereas the figures rely on reports from hospitals and health facilities.
