Witness tells court

BNP Senior Vice Chairman Tarique Rahman assured Huji chief Mufti Abdul Hannan and his associates that he would arrange a safe passage out of the scene once they carried out the grenade attack on an Awami League rally in 2004, a witness told a Dhaka court yesterday.

Abu Hena Md Yusuf, inspector of Criminal Investigation Department, said this in his deposition to the Speedy Trial Tribunal-1 as a prosecution witness in the August 21 grenade attack cases.

He claimed that Hannan, while on remand in Ramna Batamul blast cases, told him about Tarique's assurance.

After recording Abu Hena's deposition, Judge Shahed Nuruddin fixed June 3 for the next hearing. Defence lawyers will cross-examine the witness on that day.

Twenty-four AL leaders and workers, including Ivy Rahman, were killed and 300 others were injured in the grenade attack on the AL rally at Bangabandhu Avenue in the capital on August 21, 2004.

The attack was aimed at assassinating AL President Sheikh Hasina, then leader of the opposition. Hasina narrowly escaped death.

Two cases -- one under the explosive substances act and the other for murder -- were filed after the incident.

Abu Hena told the court that he had earlier investigated the Ramna Batamul blast cases and submitted charge sheets against Huji chief Hannan and 13 others on November 29, 2008.

During investigation of the Ramna Batamul blast cases in 2005, Abu Hena interrogated Hannan about the grenade and bomb blasts that took place at different places in the country.

Hannan admitted that he along with his accomplices in 2000 had planted a 76-kg SEE PAGE 19 COL 5

Ten Bangladeshi workers died from smoke inhalation as a fire broke out at their rented house in Bahrain early yesterday.

Muhammad Ibrahim, first secretary (labour) at the Bangladesh mission in the oil-rich state, confirmed the report, but could not go into details of the workers' iden-

He said nine of the workers were from Comilla and the other from Chandpur.

The fire originated from an electric short circuit around 4:00am at the house in East Riffa, 30 kilometres off the Bahrain capital Manama, Ibrahim said.

Firemen rushed to the scene after a tip-off from neighbours and found all the 10 dead; the residence was engulfed in smoke, he told The Daily Star over phone from Manama.

The firemen had to break the wall to enter, he said, SEE PAGE 19 COL 1

Smoke kills 10 Tender mishandling costs govt dearly

Due to mishandling of a tender and nonfulfilment of financial commitment by the World Bank (WB), the government is being forced to inject from its own funds \$194 million into a 335 megawatt gas-fired combined cycle power project in Siddhirganj.

The Electricity Generation Company of Bangladesh (Egcb) is set to sign an agreement with Spanish Isolux and Korean Samsung joint venture today.

The joint venture is locally represented by Science and ICT Minister Syed Abul Hossain's family company Sahco.

In re-tender for the project, the Egcb in August last year picked the lone joint venture bidder -- Isolux-Samsung-- for the job.

The joint venture offered to build the plant at cost of \$ 341m. Together with other components which include a long term servicing of the plant, the project cost now stands at a staggering \$529 m.

But the project was originally approved in 2009 with a \$ 269 m budget including a WB fund of 196m.

In late 2010, before the re-tender was floated, the WB had promised to increase its funding by another \$220 m. But despite repeated requests, it has not agreed to provide the extra fund till date.

Now, the authorities have worked again on the project's finance and found that it needed \$194 m in foreign currency to have the project implemented by Isolux-Samsung.

The High Court yesterday granted six-week ad-interim bail to five opposition lawmakers in an arson case, considering their "parliamentary privileges". The court also issued a rule upon the government to

explain in a week why twenty-nine other accused should not be granted bail. On May 10, detectives pressed charges against 45

leaders, including BNP acting secretary general Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir, in the case, filed with Tejgaon Police Station after the torching of a bus in front of Prime Minister's Office during the April 29 hartal hours.

On May 16 and 21, a metropolitan magistrate sent the leaders to jail after rejecting their bail petitions. The magistrate on May 21 accepted charge sheets against the 45.
