Vitamin A plus national campaign begins today

UNB, Dhaka

The national Vitamin A plus campaign will be observed across the country today to prevent childhood blindness, reducing child mortality and strengthening immunity.

More than 2.20 crore children aged six months to five years will be fed highpowered Vitamin A capsules while more than 1.90 crore children will be given deworming tablets, officials said.

Messages on exclusive breastfeeding for children till age six month will also be publicised during the campaign.

Children aged six months to 11 months will be given blue-coloured capsule of high-powered Vitamin A, children aged one year to five will be given red-coloured capsule of high-powered Vitamin A and children aged 2-5 years will be given deworming | tablets.

Over four lakh health workers and volunteers will work together to make the nationwide campaign a success.

Every year, almost five lakh children in the world fall victim to night blindness disease due to lack of Vitamin A leading to their blindness. One third of under-five Bangladeshi children died due to the disease.

According to an estimate of WHO, night blindness was identified as one of public health problem.

High-powered Vitamin A capsule distribution activities among children aged six months to five years every six month began in 1974 for preventing night blindness and blindness.

Observance of Vitamin A week began from 1994.

77pc elderly slum people face health problems: Study

When their wearied bodies demand rest and care, elderly people in the country's urban slums are instead condemned to toiling in their closing days if they are to eat and survive the day. Visiting several slums in Narayanganj,

the correspondent of the news agency found the elderly people living miserable lives in shanties without healthcare and necessary support.

Jabeda Khatun, in her early 70s, lives alone in Khyshipara Slum in an inhuman condition, although once she had a happyfamilyin Bikrampur. It was the erosion of the mighty Padma

that devastated her family 30 years ago, devouring their homestead and all the belongings. Then Jabeda along with her family took shelter in the slum. Her husband died 20 years ago, and

her only son was killed in a road accident three years back. Jabeda has a sister-inlaw, but she is struggling to survive with her four children. So there is no one who could take care of her.

A wretched Jabeda said she had long been suffering from eye problems, but could not afford to consult a doctor. "I have poor eyesight. I cannot see anything clearly.... how will I live?" she

Having no one around, she has been forced into begging for survival.

Noorjahan, another elderly woman, was lying on a mat in a shanty of the slum in unhygienic conditions. "I've nowhere to go, no one to look after me. My only daughter got married three years back and went to Dhaka along with her husband," she said.

Noorjahan, in early 60s, says people are not willing to give her work as she has got oldandis losing working ability day by day.

Shashwatee Biplob, social protection and policy manager of HelpAge International, said Bangladesh was in the phase of a democratic transition when life expectancy was increasing and birth rate was on the decline.

"The share of population above the age of 60 is growing at a rapid rate from 1.9 million (4.4 per cent) in 1951 to 9.4 million (6.6 per cent) in 2007. This number is expected to increase to 14.6 million (about 9 per cent) by 2025", she said, adding that the transition was creating new social protection challenges.

The miseries of elderly people in urban slums are very common in Bangladesh. Although about 33 percent of urban people live in slums, they have

access to limited basic facilities.

According to a recent study conducted by Population Research and Development Associates (PRDA), the overwhelming majority (77.8 per cent) of the elderly people suffer from healthrelated problems in the urban slums.

The major health-related problems of the elderly people in slums are fever (49.7 per cent), pain (36.3 per cent), weakness (21.2 per cent), asthma or breathing complications (14.5 per cent), gastritis or ulcer (13.5 per cent), rheumatism, eye diseases and others.

The PRDA conducted the study titled "Older People in Dhaka Slums: A Socio Economic Assessment" on 10 slums of Dhaka city from Oct 2010 to Jan 2011.

It found that about 59.2 per cent elderly people got treatment in a pharmacy or dispensary, while about 17.4 per cent sought treatment from public healthcare facilities, 14.7 per cent from private doctors and 7.1 per cent from NGO facilities.

A consultant of PRDA, Naushad Faiz, said some two-thirds of the elderly people in slums were engaged in household works with the percentage of women higherthan men.

About 6.5 million people in the country are visually impaired, while 40

A daylong diabetic camp was organised in Shatkhira yesterday offering free diagnosis for the disease to more than 300 people.

The camp at Shaheed Muktijodhya College in Tala upazila found 96 people with diabetes positive, out of 305, who came there for the test.

The patients diagnosed with diabetes were provided with medical consultation and treatment by Associate Prof Dr M A Hasanat of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University.

The camp was arranged by F R F Diagnostic & Research Centre, a nonprofit organisation, with financial assistance from Fazlur Rahman Foundation.

According to a report of World Health Organisation (WHO) released recently, one in ten adults worldwide has diabetes.

Port city dwellers cool off in overnight rain

A fortnight of suffering in the sweltering heat seemingly ceased as it began drizzling Thursday evening. Soon the light falls turned to heavy shower, bringing some respite to the city people from the extreme of the pre-monsoon temperature. Accompanied by cold breeze, the downpour continued

for several hours throughout the night. From yesterday morning, it has been raining intermittently. Over the last 24 hours till 12:00noon yesterday, the

Chittagong Met Office recorded 83.4 millimetres of rain. Officials said the rainfall was caused by monsoon winds and likely to continue for the next 24 hours. The downpour not only relieved people, but put them in

misery when it came to commuting. Rokeya Begum, a resident of Chawk Bazar area, was seen

standing at the entrance of Chittagong Shopping Complex, trying to avail a rickshaw or auto-rickshaw home. "I feel relieved for the shower, as we expected it for the

last two weeks to get respite from severe heat. But on the other hand, I along with my children have to wait for hours to return home, which is very much tiring", she said. Rickshaw pullers are not interested in going to Chawk Bazar area, while the drivers of CNG-run auto-rickshaws

demand very high fares, she complained. Shafiqul Islam, who carried out his duty at his office in Muradpur, was trying to catch a rickshaw ride to his house

in Chandgaon residential area Thursday evening. Taking shelter under the roof of a roadside shop, he expressed his resentment at the reluctance of the rickshaw pullers.

"The drivers of rickshaws and CNG-run auto-rickshaws seem to feel very happy, seeing the miseries of the commuters", Shafiqul said, talking to the correspondent.

"On a normal day, they request us to ride their rickshaws. But whenever it begins raining, they show reluctance". Locals said some low-lying areas, including Halishahar,

Bakalia, Probortak intersection, Bahaddarhat, Kapasgola and Chawk Bazar, had gone under knee-deep water due to the ceaseless rain. The drains also overflowed, forcing people into wading through filthy water all their way.

2 die in road crashes

Two people died in road accidents in Khilkhet and Rupnagar areas of the capital yesterday morning.

The deceased are Abdul Khaleq, 45, driver of a CNG-run auto-rickshaw and Akter Hossain, 32, a pick-up van driver. Khilkhet police said a covered van hit a standing CNG-

run auto-rickshaw from behind beside the road at Khilkhet bus stand, killing the auto-rickshaw driver. Locals rushed him to Dhaka Medical College Hospital

(DMCH) where he succumbed to his injures. Aktar, a pick-up van driver, was killed when a tuck

rammed his vehicle from the opposite direction at Birulia embankment of Rupnagar.

He died at the DMCH at about 1:00pm on arrival.


