The Bangladesh cricket team's new head coach Richard Pybus arrived yesterday to take over the reins of the Tigers for the next two years.

Pybus arrived in the capital within three days of being confirmed as the new Bangladesh coach for a two-year term to spend some time with his charges before the Zimbabwe tour, which will be his first assignment.

The 47-year old Englishman told the reporters upon his arrival at the Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport that he is excited to take on the new challenge. He also said that his main target would be to ensure that the Tigers maintain their consistency in performance.

Pybus, who last coached a national team in Pakistan in 2003, also said that he will let the press know in detail about his plans and visions after putting pen to paper.

Muktijoddha keep title hopes alive

Muktijoddha Sangsad kept their hopes of a maiden professional

league title alive with a 3-0 victory over a hapless Brothers Union at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday. The All Reds, who finished runners-up in the last edition of the top tier league, cut Abahani's lead at the top of the Grameenphone Bangladesh Premier League table to two points with their fourth win in five matches.

The victory, which was revenge for their 2-1 defeat in the first leg, put Muktijoddha on 34 points from 16 matches, two behind leaders Abahani who have 36 points from 15 matches. Brothers Union, on the other hand, have now lost four matches in a row and are facing relegation at seventh place. The Oranges have 15 points from 16 matches but they have played two matches more than the other teams below them in the table.

The first half of the match was a cagey affair when both sides pressed for domination but neither came close to breaking the deadlock. The first shot on target came in the sixth minute from Muktijoddha midfielder Shakil Ahmed, whose grounder hit the post before it rebounded off Sunday Chizoba into the net. But the Nigerian striker

was standing in an offside position and hence the goal was disallowed. Borthers' first serious attempt came in the 21st minute when Mohammad Javed's lob was headed strongly by Kingsley Chigozie but the Muktijoddha keeper Maksudur Rahman cleared with a diving save.

Brothers came close to finding the net when a corner in the 40th minute slipped through the grasp of Maksudur before Ariful Islam stepped in to clear the ball, and the rebound from Jamal Hossain was punched away by the keeper. The clearance fell to Sunday who raced to the Brothers danger zone before being pulled back by defender Samuel Jankasa. Sunday's dipping kick missed the target by inches.

Muktijoddha came back roaring after the breather and broke the deadlock in the 46th minute, thanks to gigantic Brazilian defender Rafael de Androde who headed in Ariful Islam's throw. Three minutes later Brothers replied with an excellent counterattack and should have got the equaliser, but Muktijoddha keeper Maksudur Rahman made two brilliant saves to thwart attempts from Kingsley Chigozie and Victory Antony.

But that was the last serious attack from the Oranges as they chased shadows thereafter. Muktijoddha expectedly made it 2-0 in the

Spain's claycourt masters tightened their stranglehold on one half of the French Open draw on Saturday as both David Ferrer and Nicolas Almagro reached the last 16 with straight sets wins.

On the women's side, defending champion Li Na battled back to defeat America's Christina McHale 3-6, 6-2, 6-1 and reach the that will take on Sri Lanka | French Open last 16 Saturday, but 2010 winner Francesca Schiavone crashed out of the event and the world top 20.

Sixth-seeded Ferrer flattened Russia's Mikhail Youzhny 6-0, 6-2, 6-2 in just 101 minutes, whilst Almagro saw off the challenge of Argentina's Leonardo Mayer 6-4, 6-1, 6-2.

With six-times defending champion Rafael Nadal and Marcel Granollers in action later in the day, there was the distinct possibility that half of the qualifiers for the last 16 in the bottom half of the draw could come

In contrast, there were no Spaniards through into the last 16 in the top half of the draw.

Fourth seed Andy Murray meanwhile

made smooth progress into the fourth round and, more importantly, appeared to be injury-free in a 6-3, 6-4, 6-4 demolition of Colombia's Santiago Giraldo.

The 30-year-old Ferrer, who has yet to make it past the quarterfinals at Roland Garros despite being one of the best players on clay for the last few years, had Youzhny by the throat from the start, winning the first set 6-0 and leading 2-0 in the second before the Russian got off the mark.

Also through to the last 16 in early play was eighth seed Janko Tipsarevic of Serbia who worked his way past Frenchman Julien Benneteau 6-3, 7-5, 6-4.

Tipsarevic won the last five games of the match after being 4-1 down in the third set to reach the last 16 at Roland Garros for the first time and will next take on Almagro.

Women's second seed Maria Sharapova reached the last 16 with a 6-2, 6-1 win over Chinese 28th seed Peng Shuai.

Russian Sharapova will take on unseeded Klara Zakopalova of the Czech Republic for a place in the quarterfinals.

The 30-year-old Li had to draw upon her 10-year age gap to prevail over the 36thranked American, who had fallen in the first
