ASTE dumping in the Gulshan-Baridhara lake goes on unabated, though the water body was declared an ecologically critical area more than a decade ago.

The declaration is inscribed on a notice board placed on Gulshan-Shahzadpur link road. The DoE has not carried out a single drive against law-breakers since the declaration was made public.

While land grabbers fill up the lake with earth, sand and construction debris, Dhaka Wasa storm drains release human and chemical wastes into it.

Anyone passing by the lake will experience a bad odour and see a thick layer of refuse floating on its surface. The lake has also become a breeding ground of mosquitoes. The photos were shot recently.

Communal riot in Myanmar

Border watch intensified

The Border Guard Bangladesh has increased patrolling and vigilance along the border with Myanmar in the wake of a riot between Rohingya Muslims and majority Buddhists in the neighbouring country.

"The patrolling has been intensified and forces have been made alert more than the normal process so that the violence in the neighbouring country does not affect border security", Maj Gen Anwar Hossain, director general of BGB, told The Daily Star yesterday evening.

Quoting the Myanmarese media, AFP reported that sectarian violence between Buddhists

and Muslims had left at least seven

Police and military units deployed in Rakhine state -- which borders Bangladesh -- had "systematically controlled" unrest, which erupted on Friday and saw hundreds of Buddhist villagers' homes set ablaze, state television said and added, "Stability has been restored since Saturday morning.'

Unrest flared on Friday when at least four Buddhists were killed in riots in Rakhine, home to large numbers of Rohingya, a stateless Muslim group described by the UN as one of the world's most persecuted minorities.

The BNP might call hartal from its rally in the city tomorrow if the government obstructs the rally and does not free its top leaders from jail.

The national standing committee of the party decided this at a meeting presided over by Chairperson Khaleda Zia last night, said BNP sources.

The main opposition party and its allies might also opt for protest rally, hunger strike and mass processions across the country if the government does not allow tomorrow's rally.

The meeting of the party's highest policy-making body lasted for more than two hours and ended around 11:30pm at Khaleda's Gulshan office.

A BNP leader hinted that the party will not go for tougher movement ahead of Ramadan if the government releases its

BNP mulls | Starts a sad story with baby's death

The body of a newborn had to be handed over to the charitable organisation Anjuman Mufidul Islam for free burial as its parents did not take the body from hospital out of fear they would have to pay the hospital bill.

The hospital had informed the parents that they would not have to pay the Tk 27,000 hospital bill to take the body and held on to the body for 64 hours before giving it to the police, who in turn gave it to the charitable organisation for burial.

Rokeya Begum, mother of the baby, said she had given premature birth to a son at a hospital in Moghbazar on May 27. As his condition deteriorated, he was moved to a hospital in Mohammadpur the same day following doctors' advice.

Saudi prince arrives today

A business tycoon, the prince had already shown interest in making big investment in energy and tourism sectors here.
