Two factories fined Tk 9 lakh

A Department of Environment (DoE) team yesterday fined a textile dying factory in Fatullah Tk 8.5 lakh for dumping untreated effluent into Shitalakhya River.

The factory owner had been running the factory for about 15 years without an environment clearance certificate. With no Effluent Treatment Plant (ETP), the factory released around 26 lakh litres of untreated effluent within this period, said DoE Director Mohammad Munir Chowdhury.

The factory owner, in an undertaking to the DoE team, pledged to set up an ETP within three months, he added.

Meanwhile, a mobile court yesterday fined a drinking water plant, "Neon Drinking Water", in Bagghona area of Chittagong city Tk 50,000 for producing drinking water in an unhygienic environment, having no water testing facilities and using Bangladesh Standards and Testing Institution's logo illegally.

The court, led by District Executive Magistrate Jannatul Ferdaus, also sealed the factory for four months and took an undertaking from its owner. On October 29, 2011, another mobile court had fined the factory the

Dhaka's traffic system to be upgraded

Work to modernise Dhaka's traffic signal synchronisation system and to install solar panels for countdown timers and traffic lights are going on to speed up vehicular movement and reduce air pollution, Environment and Forest Minister Hasan Mahmud told

parliament yesterday. A feasibility study to install new street signals at 41 important intersections is going on and another plan to modernise the parking system here will be prepared, he added.

"Feasibility study will be carried out on rescheduling bus and bus rapid transit routes," he added.

He also said Tk 2,100 crore has been allocated for the Climate Change Trust Fund in last three fiscal to implement six projects.

Balanced use of water must for Bangladesh

Says expert

Bangladeshi people should maintain a good balance in using underground water and surface water for irrigation purposes to ensure the country's water security in future, said noted water scientist Dr Mac Kirby.

"It is very much important to understand the availability of underground water and surface water, and its sustainable use," said Dr Kirby, a scientist of Australia-based Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation (CSIRO), while talking to reporters after a seminar yesterday.

Australian High Commission in Dhaka and CSIRO jointly organised the seminar styled "Solving water challenges - Water and food security: Experiences in Australia, Asia and Bangladesh" in Brac Centre Inn auditorium in the capital.

Water security in Bangladesh can be threatened by climate change, over population and other factors, said Dr Kirby, stressing the need for more research and accurate information for addressing the country's water challenges.

Addressing the seminar as chief guest, Water Resource Minister Ramesh Chandra Sen said the government will finalise the Water Act-2012 soon.

CSIRO in coordination with Bangladeshi partners - Institute of Water Modelling, Bangladesh Water Development Board, Water Resources and Planning Organisations, Bangladesh Institute of Development Studies, and Centre for Environmental and Geographic Information Services - had been conducting research on the overall water situation in Bangladesh since last year.

The research initiative titled "Bangladesh integrated water resources assessment project," funded by Aus AID, was launched in July last year.

Ramesh hoped that the research will help to understand the complex issues of water management and to formulate policies, plans and programmes in this regard.

Acting Australian High Commissioner in Dhaka Tim Bolotnikoff said, for the fiscal year 2012-13, Australian aid to Bangladesh stands at US \$100.5 million and it is likely to increase in the next fiscal.

PM's empowerment model to lift billions

Says Dipu Moni

The "People's Empowerment and Development Model", proposed by the prime minister, aims at empowering billions of voiceless, marginalised and deprived people worldwide, said Foreign Minister Dipu Moni yesterday.

She was delivering her keynote speech at the national consultations preparatory to the "International Conference on People's Empowerment and Development Model" in Cirdap auditorium in the capital.

The UN General Assembly adopted the model after Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina proposed it in the assembly's 66th session. "Any empowerment model which recognises that eradica-

tion of poverty and hunger, reducing inequality, mitigating deprivation and accelerating employment are essential for curbing extremism and terrorism must be on the right track towards human development," she said. Human development depended on education and the

quality of life instead of solely relying on economic growth, stated a concept paper, "Accelerating Human Development", on the model. The paper's statistics stated that teaching staff numbers

reached 13.57 percent at Bangladeshi universities while student

enrolment at tertiary level increased by 3.51 percent between 1990 and 2010. The paper, presented by Dr ATM Zahurul Huq, former chairman of University Grants Commission, also stated a rise in

human development, primary and secondary school entrants, life expectancy, per capita income and literacy rate. The lack of literacy, poverty and healthcare are the security threats of developing countries, not armed attacks, said Prime

Minister's International Affairs Adviser Dr Gowher Rizvi, addressing as chief guest at the consultation's concluding session. On eliminating terrorism, Farooq Sobhan, president of

Bangladesh Enterprise Institute, said, "It is important to analyse why a terrorist becomes a terrorist." Militancy preys on deprived and aggrieved people and therefore eradication of poverty and hunger and reduction of

social inequality are essential for human development, said the speakers. The issue of efficient water management also came up in the myriad of topics discussed at the consultations, including eradication of hunger and poverty, creating employment,

reducing social inequality and deprivation, and accelerating human development. Discussants at the consultation included Foreign Secretary



8 killed, 6 injured in road accidents

Eight people were killed and six others injured in separate road accidents across the country yesterday.

In Jessore, a school student was killed when a truck hit his bicycle in Gangra area in Monirampur upazila of Jessore.

The deceased was identified as Rocky Hossain, 15, son of Abdul Halim of Hajrakati village and a class X student of Gangra High School.

Police said Rocky was on his way to school when a goods-laden truck hit him leaving him dead on the spot.

Says Dr Akbar Ali Khan

If the next election is not held with the participation of all political parties, the country's democracy will face tougher political conflicts, said former adviser to a caretaker government Dr Akbar Ali Khan yesterday.

"As the political parties blend the party with the government when they come to power, it hampers the development of democracy," he also said at a discussion at Jatiya Press Club in the capital.
