Notre Dame admission process stayed

The High Court (HC) yesterday stayed the admission process for class XI of Notre Dame College in the capital on the basis of marks the admission seekers got in Secondary School Certificate (SSC) examinations.

In response to a writ petition, the court also issued a rule upon the government to explain in four weeks why a circular, issued by the Secondary and Higher Secondary Education Board, Dhaka, should not be declared illegal.

Implement Rooppur n-power project quickly: PM

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday directed the authorities concerned to work for the speedy implementation of Rooppur Nuclear Power Plant Project.

She gave the directive while presiding over the second meeting of the national committee on monitoring and giving guidelines for smooth implementation of the project, at her office. Earlier, Bangladesh signed a "Framework

Agreement on the Cooperation in the Field of the Use of Nuclear Energy for Peaceful Purposes" with Russia on November 2, 2011. Under the agreement, two nuclear power plants

with capacities to produce 1000 megawatt of electricity each will be established at Rooppur in Pabna.

DU teacher's bail prayer rejected

Zafar was arrested on June 11 after his wife, Rebecca Parvin, filed a torture case against him with the Chief Metropolitan Magistrate's (CMM) Court of Dhaka on May 30.

Dhaka North City Corporation authorities evicted scores of illegal street vendors, rent-a-car companies and hawkers from the capital's Karwan Bazar commercial area for the second consecutive day yesterday to free some half a dozen roads.

Two-thirds of the 72-feet wide roads in Karwan Bazar, home to scores of government and private offices and commercial establishments, had been illegally occupied.

Moreover, cars used to be parked illegally in multiple lanes, choking the area and making public movement difficult.

The corporation's Zone Executive Officer, Pronab Kumar Das, said eviction drives would

continue until the roads were freed of illegal occupancy. A mobile court was present on

similar drive is scheduled for next Wednesday, he said. The corporation had carried out similar drives several times before but the illegal occupants returned

as soon as the officials left the scene. A 16-feet-wide space would be kept on each side of the roads for orderly parking of cars while the rest (40 feet) would remain free for pub-

lic movement, said Pronab. He assured that from now on they would request police to keep the illegal occupants off the streets and ask the mobile court to penalise the offenders while the zone officer would carry out routine evictions.

HC issues directive on CNG-run three-wheelers

The High Court yesterday directed the government to deploy mobile courts in the capital from June 21 to stop private CNG-run auto rickshaws from operating illegally on a commercial basis.

During hearing of a suo moto rule on June 7, an HC bench ordered the authorities concerned to take necessary actions against the owners and drivers of the three-wheelers for breaching traffic rules.

The copy of the order was released yesterday after Justice Mohammed Bazlur Rahman and Justice Md Habibul Gani signed it.

In the order, the court asked the deputy commissioner of Dhaka to deploy executive magistrates for conducting the mobile courts on the streets of the capital from June 21.

It also directed the Bangladesh Road Transport Authority (BRTA) not to allow further registration of private three-wheelers. The chairman of BRTA

and Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) commissioner will assist the mobile courts to function properly, according to the directive. The DMP commissioner has

been asked to circulate these directives by placing advertisements and press releases via the print and electronic media to warn those involved in such illegal activities.

The HC bench also directed the DC of Dhaka, DMP commissioner and BRTA chairman to submit separate compliance reports before the court by July 9.

Earlier, on May 14, the HC bench issued the suo moto rule following a report published in The Daily Star on May 13, titled "Private yet up for hiring".

According to the report, a largenumber of privately-owned auto rickshaws ply the streets as vehicles for hire, ignoring their registration rules. In spite of "private" inscribed on the grey three-wheelers, they lurk at bus stops and major intersections

Govt urged to realise compensation from Chevron, Niko

The National Committee to Protect Oil, Gas, Mineral Resources, Power and Ports yesterday renewed its call to realise the long overdue compensation from US company Chevron and Canadian company Niko for the explosions at Magurchhara and Tengratila gas fields, which inflicted a massive loss on the country.

The two companies owe Bangladesh a compensation of Tk 45,000 crore, said leaders of the committee, who were speaking at a discussion at the capital's Mukti Bhaban.

The explosion at Magurchhara field under Chevron occurred on June 14, 1997, while Niko-run Tengratila gas field blew out on January 7, 2005.

Speaking at the discussion, which marked the 15th anniversary of Magurchhara explosion, columnist Syed Abul Maksud, said, "It will be a mistake if the government thinks that only a handful of people are demanding the compensation. It's a demand of the whole nation."

Our politicians and bureaucrats are extremely kind towards foreign multinational companies, he said, but they did not have any compassion for their own country.

Prof Anu Mohammad, member secretary of the committee, said Magurchhara and Tengratila remained a symbol of destruction.

He urged the government to stop lying about limitations of resources and calling in the foreign multinational companies due to these limitations. Prof Anu said the compensation amounting to five billion

dollar or Tk 45,000 crore was equivalent to the allocation in the energy sector for five years.
