611 mutineers get imprisonment

A special court yesterday sentenced 611 out of 621 accused soldiers of 13 Rifle Battalion of erstwhile Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) to rigorous imprisonment, ranging from four months to seven years, in the Pilkhana mutiny case. Each convict was also fined Tk 100.

The remaining 10 sepoys, who had earlier pleaded guilty, were exonerated by the three-member special court-8 led by

Brigadier General Abu Sayeed Khan. However, these 10 sepoys and 135 of the convicted are

accused in the BDR carnage case. The mutineers mowed down 57 top and mid-ranking

army officers alongside 17 other people at the BDR's Pilkhana headquarters on February 25-26, 2009.

The court framed charges against 623 accused on October 20, 2010 and afterwards two of the accused died.

The soldiers were accused of leaving the Darbar Hall defying the director general's order, showing solidarity with mutineers, revolting with firearms, staying inactive in preventing the mutiny, giving provocative speeches before the media and failing to control unruly colleagues and subordinates.

The verdict came in 55 working days after the case proceedings started from 2010.

A total 3,956 out of 4,044 soldiers of 53 units of BDR (now Border Guard Bangladesh) were convicted while 88 got acquittal. A total 1,998 BDR jawans are being tried in four special courts.

Most steel mills lack air pollution control system

Most steel re-rolling mills in and around the capital have been running without necessary air pollution control system posing risk of air pollution and health hazard, according to findings of the Department of Environment (DoE).

The DoE recently conducted drives at 17 rerolling mills in the capital's Demra area, and found that about 90 percent of the mills are running without mandatory "fume extraction system", said a DoE press release.

As per the environment conservation laws, the mill owners must inform the DoE about any malfunctioning of the system, and suspend operation of the mills until the system is installed but they do not comply with the rule, said Mohammad Munir Chowdhury, a director at the DoE. Fumes containing met-

als like lead and chromium are emitted from steel mills, he said adding that the Demra area's air contains 735 microgram lethal particles in per cubic metre, while the tolerable level in Bangladesh is 200 micrograms.

Highly toxic fumes can cause respiratory problems among the locals and destroy biodiversity, he said.

REPRESSION OF ADIVASI WOMEN **Judicial commission** demanded

Four women's rights organisations yesterday urged the government to form a judicial inquiry commission to investigate the recent incidents of repression on Adivasi women.

They also urged the National Human Rights Commission to probe the incidents of rape and murder of two minor indigenous girls in Rangamati and Naogaon this year. The call was made at a press conference at Dhaka

Reporters' Unity (DRU), jointly organised by Bangladesh Mahila Parishad, Bangladesh Nari Pragati Sangha, Karmojibi Nari, and Bangladesh Adivasi Nari Network. Shahnaj Sumi of Bangladesh Nari Pragati Sangha said

either local influential remained involved in rape, murder or support the accused, which prevented justice. Nishi Dewan of Bangladesh Adivasi Nari Network said, "We protest almost every incident and submit memoran-

dum to the prime minister, demanding trial but do not get proper responses." They said most repression incidents involved land dis-

Adivasi women," said Rokeya Rafique Baby, executive director of Karmojibi Nari.
