Stop pushing back Rohingyas

Urges HRW

New York based Human Rights Watch (HRW) urged Bangladesh to stop forcibly pushing back Rohingyas fleeing sectarian violence in Myanmar.

It also urged the government to provide Rohingyas with humanitarian assistance and grant them temporary refuge until it is safe for them to return.

A press release of HRW published on its website yesterday said at least 18 Rohingya asylum seekers, including three young children, are in immediate danger of being returned to Myanmar on World Refugee Day, June 20. "Bangladesh is putting the lives of those fleeing violence

Myanmar," Bill Frelick, refugee programme director at HRW, said in the press release. "This is a reminder that the fundamental principles of refugee protection still need to be respected," he added.

The rights body said while Bangladesh is not a party to the 1951 Refugee Convention or its 1967 Protocol, it is to other treaties, including the Convention against Torture, the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, and the Convention on the Rights of the Child that provide protections to refugees and asylum seekers.

HC issues rule on marriage registration

The High Court (HC) yesterday issued a rule asking authorities concerned to explain in four weeks why it should not be compulsory to register marriages based on couple's national identification (ID) cards.

The court also asked the authorities to explain why rights of street children should not be incorporated into the newly proposed amendment to the child law.

The HC bench of Justice Farid Ahmed and Justice Zafar Ahmed issued the rules in response to two writ petitions filed on behalf of Bangladesh National Women Lawyers' Association on foiling child marriage and protecting rights of street children.

WAR CRIMES TRIAL

Deposition against Quader Mollah deferred to July 3

STAFF CORRESPONDENT

The International Crimes Tribunal-2 yesterday deferred the date for recording statements of the prosecution witnesses against Jamaat-e-Islami leader Abdul Quader Mollah to July 3. The date was announced following a time

petition filed by the defence.

The three-member tribunal headed by its Chairman Justice ATM Fazle Kabir also directed the defence to submit its list of witnesses and documents, if it has any, on that day.

Yesterday was scheduled for examination of prosecution witnesses and submission of defence documents. The tribunal, however, heard the prosecution's opening statement against the Jamaat leader.

On May 28, the tribunal framed six specific charges against Quader Mollah for his alleged involvement in murders and mass killings during the Liberation War of 1971 and fixed June 20 for hearing of the opening

statement. Reading out from the 96-page opening statement, Prosecutor Sultan Mahmud Simon said that as an organiser of Al Badr Bahani, an auxiliary force of Pakistan occupational army, Quader Mollah directly took part in killing, mass killing, arson and loot-

ing during the war. The Jamaat leader was arrested in a criminal case on July 13, 2010, and later shown arrested in the case for crimes against humanity committed in 1971.
