Spain select **Euro 2012** trio

Euro 2012 winners Juan Mata, Jordi Alba and Javi Martinez were included in Spain's soccer squad on Tuesday for the London Olympics later this month.

Chelsea midfielder Mata and full back Alba, who is set to leave Valencia for Barcelona this week, scored in Sunday's 4-0 final victory over Italy in Kiev.

The world champions became the first side to retain the European title, stringing together three major tournament triumphs in a row.

Luis Milla's 22-man Olympic squad was named the day after Mata, Alba and Athletic Bilbao midfielder Martinez were involved in a huge homecoming celebration as the team paraded the trophy through the streets of Madrid.

"I believe it would be unfair to demand that this team be at the same level as the full national team," Milla told a news conference.

"This team has character and a similar playing philosophy but it is a different team under different pressures."

The Olympic team will join up on Friday and will face Senegal and Mexico in friendlies before heading to London.

The squad, which will be trimmed down to 18, also includes Manchester United goalkeeper David De Gea, Chelsea midfielder Oriol Romeu and Barcelona trio Martin Montoya, Thiago Alcantara and Cristian Tello.

Lazio sign Ederson

Monday announced the signing of Brazilian midfielder Ederson from Lyon on a five-year deal.

Ederson, 26, was out of contract at Lyon after spending four injury-hit seasons at the Stade de Gerland.

The Brazilian international had been signed by OL for 14 million euros (\$17.6m) from Nice but made just 82 league appearances after his transfer, scoring 11 goals.

Ederson, who left Juventude in his homeland for Nice at the age of 19, has

won one cap for Brazil. At the end of last week, he gained Italian nationality, allowing him to move to Rome without taking up one of the limited squad places available to non-EU players.

PSG snap up Lavezzi

Argentine forward Ezequiel Lavezzi has joined Paris St Germain from Napoli on a four-year deal, the Ligue 1 club said on Monday.

Lavezzi, 27, is PSG's first recruit this summer as they look to build a competitive team for next season's Champions League after finishing second in Ligue 1.

"He is a very very important player," general manager Leonardo told a news conference at the Parc des Princes.

"He will mark the club's history."

Lavezzi, one of the crowd favourites at San Paolo, hopes he will find the same connection with the demanding PSG fans.

"I will do what I can to enjoy the same relationship with the Paris crowd," he said.

No financial details on the deal were disclosed but media reports suggested the transfer fee was about 30 million euros.

Fiesta in Spain Quartet faces probe

Spain's triumphant Euro 2012 heroes parted a red-andyellow sea of fans in central Madrid on Monday in a giant, deafening national

fiesta that swept aside all thoughts of economic crisis.

An open-top double-decker bus ferried the team like a small boat picking its way through a vast ocean of hundreds of thousands of adoring Spaniards waving flags, cheering and dancing to thumping rock music. Helicopters hovering above filmed a

crowd that seemed to carpet the entire heart of the capital to rejoice in Spain's historic 4-0 thrashing of Italy in the Ukrainian capital Kiev. At the climax of the party, the players

basked in glory in the central Plaza de Cibeles square, where Queen's "We are the Champions" blared from loudspeakers. In the centre of the square, a huge

Spain flag was draped around the neck of an emblematic stone fountain of the goddess of nature riding a chariot hauled by lions.

The team joined a rock group to sing and dance on a huge stage in the square, with towering video screens behind.

Rappers blared out the song "No hay dos sin tres (You can't have two without three)" in praise of Spain's unprecedented third straight title and the team

danced along, wearing red T-shirds reading "Champions of Europe."

"For me it is a great pride to be able to captain this team of great players and great people," Spain goalkeeper and captain Iker Casillas told fans from the stage.

"Thank you for being here!"

Left winger Andres Iniesta, who was crowned the player of the tournament, said he was humbled to be part of a legendary squad.

"But more than anything I feel very proud to see your expressions of joy in these difficult times for us -- it is a matter of pride to see you happy," he said.

During the victory parade, Spaniards packed the streets from the buildings right to the edge of the bus, which was escorted by mounted police as it gingerly made its way to the city centre. Leaning over the edge of the bus,

forward Cesc Fabregas brandished the silver trophy, adding to an unprecedented collection that includes the 2008 Euro and the 2010 World Cup. Residents hung from apartment

balconies to get a glimpse of their heroes, waving wildly as the team passed and throwing buckets of water to cool fellow party-goers on the street below.

Giant red balloons bobbed above supporters' heads.

One fan, 42-year-old Jaime Barea, brought a group of 14 children, his own and his friends' offspring. "It will give them an unforgettable

memory," he said.

Golden Boot for his three goals and one assist in the tournament, perched nonchalantly at one point with one leg hanging over the edge of the bus.

Barcelona forward Cesc Fabregas laughed and waved to fans. Real Madrid's Sergio Ramos danced in his seat.

Smiling coach Vicente del Bosque, in a white business shirt, leaned over, waved gingerly and even swayed to the music.

Chants of "Champions, Champions!" rang through the Spanish capital.

King Juan Carlos, 74, still hobbling after injuring his hip during an African elephant-hunting safari, joined with the royal family in hailing the victors at the Palacio de la Zarzuela in Madrid. "Spaniards are proud of you, really

proud, and not only because each of you are good players but because as a team you are terrific," he said before the players joined the national fiesta.

Casillas gave the king a Spain shirt with the number 1, signed by the entire

"The country is more united and people can forget their problems for a while," said 27-year-old Jessica Pino in a team shirt, draped in the Spanish flag and with a Viking hat in the national colours.

The party erupted from the end of the first half of the match on Sunday night, when Spain was already 2-0 up, and huge numbers of fans invaded the



Bonuses owed to the France team for having made the quarterfinals of the recently-concluded European Championships have been frozen, the French

football federation announced on Tuesday. Each member of the French team, which

lost 2-0 in the quarters to eventual winners Spain, was eligible for a bonus of 100,000 euros.

But in light of the in-fighting and illdiscipline that dogged the country's Euro campaign, federation president Noel Le Graet said: "The whole of the bonuses of the France team at Euro 2012 are frozen.

"It's blocked money, which may be redistributed or maybe not."

Le Graet, up for re-election in December, added that four players from the squad would appear at a disciplinary committee "as soon as possible after their holidays" to explain their behaviour at the tournament hosted by Poland and Ukraine.

"Four players will go before the disciplinary committee: (Hatem) Ben Arfa, (Yann) Mvila, (Samir) Nasri and (Jeremy) Menez," Le Graet said after a meeting of the executive committee, a body he said was unable to impose sanctions.

"The players must be punished, sanctioned, but I don't want to make victims out of them.

"Financial sanctions are detailed in our statutes, and (possible) suspensions for the upcoming cases will be examined most fairly."

Nasri verbally abused an AFP journalist after the loss to Spain and was seen as a disruptive influence throughout, while Ben Arfa had a dressing room row with Laurent Blanc, who stood down as coach after the tournament.

captain Hugo Lloris during the Spain game, telling him to shut up, while M'Vila did not shake hands with Blanc or his replacement when he was substituted by Olivier Giroud. All the incidents led many pundits to

draw similarities to the France squad that disgraced itself at the 2010 World Cup. Le Graet added that France's World Cup

and Euro-winning captain Didier Deschamps "is part of a shortlist" in the federation's bid to find a suitable replacement for Blanc. "I saw Didier Deschamps quickly yester-

day evening (Monday)," Le Graet said. "In any case, the proposal was made to him. He confirmed to me that the France team was part of his dreams.

"He asked me for a few days to think things over. He's part of a shortlist.

"If Didier drags it out too much, I'll take another decision. But I won't today disturb a Ligue 1 club," Le Graet said in a nod to Deschamps' current employer, cashstrapped Marseille.

But if confirmed, 43-year-old Deschamps, once witheringly described as a "water carrier" by Eric Cantona, would be taking on what increasingly looks like a poisoned chalice after a torrid recent history for the 1998 world champions.

Euro 2000-winner Roger Lemerre stepped down after France failed to exit the group stage at the 2002 World Cup; Jacques Santini, left after Euro 2004 for an ill-fated sojourn at Spurs; and Domenech went in 2010 after a rollercoaster six years.

Should Deschamps take over, he would at least be able to continue the hard work that Blanc had put in since replacing the largely unloved Domenech after the 2010 World Cup debacle.

British Olympic football coach Stuart Pearce said no manager "picks on sentiment" as he explained why David Beckham had been left out of his squad for the London 2012 Games.

Pearce unveiled his 18-man squad Monday with veteran Manchester United midfielder Ryan Giggs, who played alongside Beckham when they were

both making their way in football at Old Trafford, Liverpool striker Craig Bellamy and Manchester City defender Micah Richards occupying the three over-age places in an 18-man squad where the other players are under 23. "I have a vast amount of respect for David and what he has

done to bring the Olympics here," said former England

defender Pearce. But he added: "I have a duty of care to everyone to pick in my mind the best squad. I don't think there's a football man-

ager around who picks on sentiment." Pearce named a squad

containing 13 players from England and five from Wales. That meant there were no Scottish or Northern Irish players selected. Football officials in Scot-

land, Northern Ireland and Wales had all expressed concerns about their players participating in the Olympics, fearing it could signal the start of their demise as independent football nations.

But Pearce said of his squad: "They are individuals that are all Olympians. There are no nationalities there in my eyes."

Tottenham and Wales winger Gareth Bale was not considered due to injury.
