hold it across the country as per the instructions from FIFA," said Bachchu adding that the national women's football championship has been turned into a women's super league.

Wickets keep falling

Young seamer Thisara Perera grabbed a career-best 4-63 as Sri Lanka bowled out Pakistan for 226 on the opening day of the final Test in Pallekele on Sunday.

Left-arm spinner Rangana Herath chipped in with three wickets after Sri Lanka captain Mahela Jayawardene put the tourists in to bat for the second consecutive match. Pakistan hit back to reduce

Sri Lanka to 44-3 by stumps as left-arm seamer Junaid Khan removed Dinesh Chandimal and dangerman Kumar Sangakkara in the space of four deliveries. Chandimal was leg-before

for eight, while Sangakkara was bowled for zero after making 199 not out and 192 in the previous two Tests. Mohammad Sami then

trapped skipper Jayawardene leg-before in the last over of the day to cap an absorbing day's play at the Pallekele International Stadium.

Pakistan, looking for a series-levelling win, failed to adjust to the moving ball on a responsive wicket and collapsed to 56-4 soon after the first hour of play.

They recovered through a fighting 75 from Asad Shafiq, who put on 85 for the fifth wicket with skipper Misbahul Haq (40) before the innings terminated midway through

the post-tea session.

Sri Lanka, who won the first Test in Galle before the second in Colombo was drawn, are seeking their first series win in three years, after defeating New Zealand 2-0 at home in 2009. Perera, a 23-year-old

playing only his sixth Test, made an immediate impact in his maiden appearance in the series by grabbing three wickets in his first eight overs. Unlike the second Test where Jayawardene's deci-

sion to field on a flat track

backfired as Pakistan ran up 551-6 declared, the hosts finally found conditions that suited the bowlers. The bounce on the greenish pitch was less than expected -- the wicketkeeper

stood up to the stumps as early as the third over -- but there was considerable movement in the air and off the wicket. Perera, taking advantage of overcast conditions, struck

after Pakistan's openers had rattled up 35 by the eighth over, bowling Mohammad Hafeez with a delivery that swung in sharply.

Hafeez, who scored 196 in the second Test, made 22 with four hits to the fence.

Azhar Ali, another centurymaker in Colombo, edged a wild drive off Perera to Thilan Samaraweera at gully before he had scored a run.

Yuvi's lesson by cancer

Indian all-rounder Yuvraj Singh believes that his battle with cancer has made him more disciplined but he confessed that he has suffered memory problems after undergoing chemotherapy.

The 30-year-old, who is recovering from a rare germcell tumour between his lungs, told the Hindu newspaper on Sunday that his illness had given him a fresh outlook on life.

"I'm more disciplined and more organised. I pray every day and I've learnt to be loyal to my body and myself," he said, confirming that he hoped to play in the Twenty20 World Cup in Sri Lanka in September. "Family will give you love

and support, but you have to take the initiative when you fight a disease like cancer. I'm happy to be in the right frame of mind now to chase my dreams. Speaking on Saturday as he launched a campaign to

improve early detection of cancer, Yuvraj said his postchemotherapy period was difficult and that basic cricket training had given him a huge confidence boost. "I had lost my memory

and still thought it was 2011. I had lost taste for food. Now, I value every meal and also breathe with both lungs,' Yuvraj said.

Serena isn't done yet



Serena Williams has warned her rivals that her emotional fifth Wimbledon title will act as a springboard for even greater glory as she aims to make up for the worst period

of her life.

Just two years ago Serena should have been on top of the world after winning Wimbledon for the fourth time, but instead the American was at her lowest ebb after a series of freak fast. health problems left her battling for her life. The trouble started when she needed 18

stitches and then surgery after stepping on broken glass in a Munich restaurant. Worse was to come as she suffered life-

threatening blood clots on her lungs and, as she lay on a couch with tubes poking from her body to aid her recovery, Serena was convinced her career at the top was over. But, showing the ferocious will-power that

marked her rise to prominence, Williams gradually battled back to full health and capped a remarkable revival on Saturday with a 6-1, 5-7, 6-2 victory over Poland's Agnieszka Radwanska in the Wimbledon final. "Every title is special, but this one is defi-

nitely super-special because it's a huge comeback for me," she said after her first Grand Slam triumph since the illness.

"There was a moment I just remember I was on the couch and I didn't leave it for two days. I was praying, like I can't take any more. I've endured enough.

"I was just so tired at that point. I had a tube in my stomach and it was draining constantly.

"Gosh, I mean, right before that I had the blood clot. I had lung problems, then I had two foot surgeries. I felt like I didn't do anything to

bring on that. It was the lowest of lows. "But I didn't give up. I came back and winning is amazing because last year I was ranked almost 200. It's been an unbelievable journey for me."

Serena's 14th Grand Slam crown underlined her credentials as the sport's preeminent force and, at an age when many players are entering the twilight of their career, the 30-year-old has no intention of resting on her "It's Wimbledon, I've wanted to win here so

bad," she said. "Oh, my gosh, I still can't believe I was able to come through and win my seven matches.

"It hasn't sunk in. That's the difference to the wins I had in the past. Usually it sinks in "It's the beginning of a great phase. I feel

amazing out there. This whole tournament felt really great physically. So I think it's definitely the beginning of something great.

"There's the US Open, the Australian Open, the French Open, Wimbledon 2013..."

Serena has now equalled sister Venus's tally of five Wimbledon titles and the next All England Club legend in her sights is Bille Jean King, who won the tournament six times, with the chance to catch German great Steffi Graf on seven titles another motivation.

"I don't see why not. I have never felt better. This whole tournament I have pretty much been injury free," Williams added.

If Serena continues serving with the kind of sustained accuracy and power she showed at Wimbledon -- the world number four eventually finished with 102 aces after hitting 17 against Radwanska -- her dream of dominating women's tennis again could well come true.

"My serve really helped me throughout this tournament. I can't describe why it was so good or how it was so good. It's not like I practice it that much. I just had the rhythm," she said.

And if she ever has cause to doubt herself during a match, there is no question what memory will spur her on to greater heights.

"I didn't just stay there when I was down. I got up," she said. "That's what you got to do sometimes. I got up and I started."

Centuries from Chris Gayle and Marlon Samuels inspired West Indies to a 55-run win over New Zealand in the second one-day international here at Sabina Park.

After three successive half-centuries in the back-to-back Twenty20 matches in Florida and the first ODI on Thursday Gayle again showed the local fans what they had been missing after 12 months of international exile.

His contribution of 125 runs, featuring nine sixes, from 107 balls and with Samuels compiling 101 off 103 balls, lifted West Indies to 315 for five.

New Zealand were always going to be struggling to match that total and despite half centuries from BJ Watling, Martin Guptill and Kane Williamson were bowled out for 260 off 47 overs.

Saturday's result gave the hosts a 2-0 lead in the five match series which they can seal in St Kitts on Wednesday. For Gayle this was his 20th ODI ton, a new

West Indian record, surpassing the previous record set by Brian Lara.

He was prevented beating his career-best score of 153 when in the 38th over one of his shots landed in the hands of deep midwicket. For man of the match Samuels this was his

third ODI century.

Steven Finn's four-wicket haul laid the platform for England's eight-wicket hammering of Australia in the fourth one-day international here on Saturday. England, set a modest 201 for victory, fin-

ished on 201 for two with 13 balls as they won the series, going 3-0 up in this five match campaign after Wednesday's clash in Birmingham was washed out. "Our bowlers set the tone beautifully at the

start," said England captain Alastair Cook. "Steven Finn took the wickets today, but the other guys bowled well too." Jonathan Trott (64 not out) and Ravi Bopara (33 not out) shared an unbroken stand of 65 as

England recorded their ninth successive oneday international victory with 13 balls to spare. Ian Bell (69) and Warwickshire colleague Trott

had previously put on 66 for the second wicket. Bell's 94-ball knock, featuring nine fours, meant that in five innings since taking over as an opener following Kevin Pietersen's limited overs retirement he'd scored 364 runs at an average of

72.8 with one hundred and three fifties. Meanwhile Trott's effort, in his 47th innings, saw him become the fourth fastest batsman to 2,000 ODI runs behind South Africa's Hashim Amla (40 innings) and Paki-

stan's Zaheer Abbas and Pietersen (both 45). Earlier, fast bowler Finn's man-of-thematch haul of four for 37 in his maximum 10 overs sparked an Australia top-order collapse as the visitors struggled in overcast conditions
