### RELOCATING FOOTHILL DWELLERS Most utility services remain at end of deadline today

Hundreds of people on many risky hillsides in Chittagong continue to have access to utility services at the end of a seven-day deadline today to cut power, gas and water supplies to discourage habitation there.

The directive had come from the divisional Hill Management Committee (HMC), formed in 2007 following a devastating landslide that left 127 people dead on June 11, at a meeting in Chittagong Circuit House on July 2.

Chittagong Water Supply and Sewerage Authority (Cwasa), Karnaphuli Gas Distribution Company Limited (KGDCL), and Power Development Board (PDB) had disconnected some lines during the timeframe, beginning But spot visits by this correspondent in many of the risky

areas, including Batali and AK Khan hills and Tigerpass, Lalkhan Bazar, Ambagan, Biswa Colony and Chattaswari road areas confirmed that the utility services were still Cwasa Magistrate Quazi Mohammad Hasan said they

disconnected around 600 water supply lines at Motijharna, Firoz Shah Colony and Akbar Shah areas. "Only five among some 100 water supply lines at Motijharna area were found to be legal. Some technicians

had used plastic pipes to draw water from Cwasa's main supply pipes to the slums. "A powerful gang of goons under a local councillor are

reconnecting the lines at Motijharna area," he said.

Hasan said they could not disconnect the supplies in many areas as some non-government organisations have helped to connect the lines to the slums with permission from a certain ministry. PDB officials said they had disconnected only 45 power

supply lines at Motijharna, Bangla Bazar, Akbar Shah and Firoz Shah Colony areas. PDB Chief Engineer Raisuddin Sarkar said they would

no longer supply power to residents of risky slopes and continue disconnecting the lines. Meanwhile, KGDCL officials said they had disconnected

six lines at Firoz Shah Colony and Akbar Shah Colony.

A local of Motijharna at Lal Khan Bazar, Abu Musa, said, "Many house owners rent houses out to poor people and are reconnecting water and power lines in the houses with the help of local goons."

"It seems to me the utility service providers are not coming forward with all their logistic support," said Department of Environment, Chittagong Director Jafor

HMC Member Secretary Ismail Hossain said, "The drives would continue to evacuate the people this monsoon."



# CMC main male hostel in bad shape

Residents of the main hostel for male students of Chittagong Medical College (CMC) are suffering immensely as the building is in a dilapidated condition with unhinged doors and leaking sanitary pipes in bathrooms and toilets among many other problems.

According to the residents, water supply to the hostel is also very poor, and there are frequent incidents of theft as well.

Sometimes water supply remains stopped for all day long, and the crisis deepens on Fridays and national holidays, they said.

Preferring anonymity, a fourth-year MBBS student said they often get wet by filthy water dripping from leaking pipes of toilets on upper floors.

The hostel consists of five blocks -- Zakir Block (A), Sadik Block (B), Jashim Block (C), East Block (D), and West Block (E).

Zakir Block and Jashim Block can accom-

modate 128 students each, East and West

blocks can accommodate 96 students each, and Sadik Block can accommodate 120 where mainly foreign students reside, The Department (PWD), under the Ministry of Daily Star found that its bathrooms and Housing and Public Works, looks after the

toilets were in a bad condition with unhinged doors, and filthy water dripping from overhead sanitary pipes. A Sri Lankan student, preferring anonymity, said they face embarrassing situations

while using the bathrooms and toilets. "There is no door at the bathrooms and

toilets adjacent to our rooms," he said. Another fourth-year MBBS student,

seeking anonymity, said many portions of Zakir Block and Sadik Block have been dilapidated too.

Window sunshades of many rooms of the blocks have been damaged, he said.

Only the walls of the hostel were whitewashed during a renovation work carried out last year, he added.

Shahidul Islam, a fifth-year MBBS student, said their clothes are frequently stolen from the corridor where they hang those from clotheslines for drying after washing. Their mobile phone sets and other valu-

ables are also stolen from their rooms quite often, although two security guards stay on

duty in two shifts at the main entrance of the hostel round the clock.

Many students complained that they do not have any lounge or waiting room for guests, so they have to take their guests outside to sit and talk.

The hostel's main entrance is also in a bad condition. It needs to be reinstalled soon. The road to the college campus from the hostel also needs repair, they added.

Mafizur Rahman Jumma, vice-president of Chittagong Medical College Central Students Union (CMCCSU), also a representative of students at the hostel, said they submitted an application to the college authority demanding solution to the prob-

"We also demanded a waiting room, a basket ball court, and a badminton court," he said.

The college authorities, however, have taken steps to set up a deep tubewell to solve the water crisis, he said adding that the authorities also assured them of resolving all the problems step by step.

Dr Hafizul Islam, assistant professor at the biochemistry department of the college, During a recent visit to the West Block, also the hostel super, said Public Works maintenance work of the hostel.

"We have written to PWD and provided to the officials of the department a list of work that needs to be done," he said adding that an engineer from PWD recently visited the hostel.

"They assured us that they will begin the repair work soon," he said.

"We can feel the problems of the students. We fully sympathise with them," he said adding, "The students are like our children. So we feel very bad for their sufferings at the hostel.'

Dr Selim Mohammad Jahangir, principal of CMC, said they formed a committee to find out the problems of the hostel.

"Digging of a deep tubewell is going on now. It will be completed soon," he said adding, "We have informed PWD requesting the beginning of maintenance work as soon as possible."

"Maintenance work is a continuous process in such a big hostel," said Dr Selim adding, "PWD does the work regularly."

### BDR CARNAGE TRIAL

### Accused also witnesses

At least two accused jawans of the BDR carnage case, confined to Dhaka Central Jail, were also listed as witnesses in the case.

BDR jawan Shamsul Haq, a carpenter working in Pilkhana's construction wing, was listed as both accused number 641 and witness number 605 while chef Habibur Rahman was listed as accused number 555 and witness number 997.

"It proves that the investigation agency was utterly negligent in their investigations. The charge-sheet placed before the court is defective," said one of the defence counsels, Shameem Sardar.

It was a mistaken by the investigation officer, said prosecutor of the case, Mosharraf Hossain Kajol.

Metropolitan Sessions Judges' Court, holding the trial in the capital's Bakshibazar, yesterday recorded the testimonies of five witnesses. This took the number of witnesses giving testimonies to 283.

#### MOEEN U AHMED UNABLE TO APPEAR

Chief prosecutor of the case, Anisul Huq, yesterday said former army chief Gen Moeen U Ahmed would be unable to come and give his testimony as a witness to the carnage at the Pilkhana BDR headquarters on February 25-26, 2009 that left 74 people, including 57 army officers, dead.

"Moeen U Ahmed rang me and let me know that he was now in New York taking chemotherapy and of his inability to appear before the court now due to illness," an ATN Bangla report quoted Anisul.

A Dhaka court, on July 1, had asked Moeen and three other high-profile witnesses to give their testimonies in the case.
