President asks DCs to work for dev

President Zillur Rahman yesterday urged the deputy commissioners to put in their best efforts for holistic development of the country.

"Holistic development of the country and successful implementation of various programmes mostly depend on efforts, skill and sincerity of divisional commissioners and deputy commissioners. '60pc women under family planning'

State Minister for Health and Family Welfare Mozibur Rahman Fakir and UNFPA Representative in Bangladesh Arthur Erken also addressed the programme.

At the function, several workers and institutions of the country were awarded for their contributions to family planning and maternal health care services. Besides, seven electronic and print media

journalists were awarded for best reporting on population and health. In another programme, Food and Disaster Management Minister Muhammad Abdur

Razzaque termed overpopulation a challenge and laid emphasis on effective family planning strategy to control the country's population growth.

depression as her mother died 7 to 8 months ago and her father got married again, police said.

The body was sent to Sir Salimullah Medical College morgue for autopsy.

Kuakata boat antique Says expert

The boat that surfaced from beneath the sandy beach in Kuakata is of great antique value, said Research Assistant Md Golam Ferdous, head of the three-member investigation team, over phone from Kuakata vesterday morning.

The Department of Archaeology of Khulna Division dispatched the threemember team following reports published in The Daily Star. "We have examined the boat very closely

and there is no doubt that it is an ancient boat, 200 or more years old," said the researcher. "Our initial challenge lies in how to

extract it out from the beach without

inflicting any damage to the frame," he

said. Ferdous, however, added that his concern at the moment also lies in guarding the boat from thieves until the excavation work

"Since our arrival on Tuesday we have not seen any initiatives taken to guard the boat," he said.

The ancient boat, belonging to the first Rakhine settlers from the Arakan Province

of Myanmar over 200 years ago, was found on June 29 during low tide in the Bay of Sources in the department's Dhaka

office said that the Department of Archaeology does not posses any modern equipment, expertise, or adequate fund to bring out the boat from underneath the sand and restore it to its original look. "We may seek help from outside sources

with permission from our ministry and restore it," said an official of the department in Dhaka willing not to be quoted. French born Bangladeshi, Yves Marre,

who initiated a traditional boat museum under the banner "Protection and Preservation of National Naval Heritage of Bangladesh", said he would be willing to assist the department in extraction and restoration of the ancient boat. "We have to solve the fund problem and

also work jointly with the administration to carry out this job," Marre said.

"I can tell you, the prime minister of our country, Sheikh Hasina, is very eager and serious in protection and preservation of our naval heritage and she will come forward to help us in this regard," he added.

ROHINGYA ISSUE DCs asked to be cautious in issuing passports

: The foreign ministry has asked the deputy commis-: sioners (DCs), especially of Cox's Bazar and Bandarban, to be cautious in issuing passports to ensure that the Rohingyas cannot get Bangladeshi passports. "Previously many

Rohingyas managed voter IDs and passports of : Bangladesh. Thus, they went abroad and created huge problems in Saudi Arabia. So, we asked the local administration for doublecheck," Foreign Secretary Mijarul Quayes told reporters yesterday. After a meeting with the

DCs at the ministry, Quayes said usually the border guards and coast guards are instructed to be alert when : any tension arises with the neighbouring countries. "But, we also want the

local administration to remain well aware of the issues," he said adding that as maritime dispute with Myanmar is settled, there is an issue of more vigilance in the Bay of Bengal. According to an estimate by the government, around

alongside 29,000 registered Rohingyas, are staying mostly in the country's southeastern districts bordering Myanmar. The issue has come to the forefront recently as

four lakh illegal Rohingyas,

Rohingyas made desperate efforts to intrude Bangladesh following sectarian clashes in Myanmar. Meanwhile, forty three

Rohingyas, who entered Bangladesh territory yesterday, were sent back hours later, reports UNB.

Major Shafiqur Rahman, deputy commander of 42 Battalion of Boarder Guard Bangladesh (BGB) at Teknaf, said BGB members in separate drives held 38 Rohingyas from Shah Purir Dwip, two from Damdamia and three others from Rila in the morning.

Customs staff stop working for an hour

Outbound and incoming passengers suffered at the Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport yesterday as customs officials and staffers stopped working for about an hour alleging that Armed Police Battalion (APBn) members are interfering with their work, said airport sources.
