EU provides relief for flood, landslide victims in hill districts

The European Union (EU) has provided international agencies with 5.4 lakh euros, equivalent to Tk 5.5 crore, to give humanitarian assistance to the worst affected people of the recent flooding in Bangladesh.

In Ramu and Chakaria upazilas in Cox's Bazar, CARE-UK will assist 60,000 of the most affected people. Each of the 12,000 households will receive a single distribution of 20kg rice, 5 doses of oral rehydration salts and Tk 500, said a press release.

Working with Naikhongchari, Lama and Alikadam upazilas in Bandarban, the United Nations World Food Programme and Concern Universal UK will provide 3,700 of the most vulnerable households with a monthly ration of 50kg rice, 1 litre soybean oil,

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said the government has taken initiatives to build exclusive industrial parks for readymade garments, plastic, printing and other sectors and also a separate industrial city for Jamdani, hosiery and electronics for flourishing small and cottage industries.

She said this while inaugurating the 55th founding anniversary of Bangladesh Small and Cottage Industries Corporation (BSCIC) at Osmani Memorial Auditorium in the capital. Hasina said works on the setting up of two

specialised industrial parks across the country and a multipurpose industrial park in Sirajganj are progressing while special economic zones are being set up in seven divisions. She said that her government is imple-

menting massive programmes for flourishing the country's industrial sector by putting emphasis on agro-based small industries.

Referring to the huge demand for

Bangladeshi processed foods abroad as over 80 lakh expatriate Bangladeshis now live across the globe, the prime minister asked the BSCIC authorities to help setting up processing plants for fish, meat and vegetables.

The prime minister called upon the entrepreneurs and the BSCIC officials and employees to supplement the government efforts at building a middle income country by 2021 and expressed her hope that a poverty, hunger and illiteracy free Bangladesh could be built with the united efforts of all.

The present government, she said, is expanding and modernising the BSCIC training programme as well as expanding specialised training in the industrial sector including in management, design, fashion, packaging, and marketing.

Chaired by Industries Minister Dilip Barua, the inaugural function was also addressed, among others, by Industries Secretary K H Masud Siddiqui and BSCIC Chairman Fakhrul Islam.

Says survey

About 91 percent of women become victims of stalking and other forms of gender violence, experts said quoting a survey report at a workshop yesterday.

The survey was conducted by Bangladesh National Women Lawyers Association (BNWLA) in 2010. The experts said the High Court passed a ruling in 2009,

calling "stalking" a component of sexual harassment, which was punishable. The experts, however, conveyed disappointment at the sentence, which is only a year's jail term or a penalty of Tk

2000. The sentence must be increased to demonstrate the seriousness of the crime, they said. "Stalking can lead to increased suicide among girls, and

therefore has to be treated as a crime, not just as a social problem," said Giti Ara Nasreen, a professor at Dhaka University.

"Such a high figure shows that stalking and sexual harassment are not only practiced by 'hooligans' as is depicted in

the media, but by males in general." The workshop, "Role of Media to End Sexual

RIVER EROSION PREVENTION

Experts call for cooperation among S Asian nations

South Asian nations should cooperate to address issues of river erosion, which turn thousands homeless every year, academics and disaster management experts said yesterday. This is a serious issue but it has been

ignored for long, they said at the inaugural session of a weeklong regional training on river erosion and embankment safety management in South Asia.

"About one million people are affected by river erosion in Bangladesh alone. Many of these people get displaced for years," said Prof Dr Shahnaz Huq-Hossain, director of Dhaka University's Disaster Research Training and Management Centre (DRTMC).

Centre, New Delhi, jointly organised the training at the Nabab Nawab Ali Chowdhury Senate Bhaban of DU. Academics, practitioners, and government officials from the South Asian countries are to attend the training.

Those losing their homes and land because of rivers are taking shelter in city slums, Dr Shahnaz said, adding that mainstream intervention is necessary for those victims.

DU Vice Chancellor Professor AAMS Arefin Siddique said river erosion and its victims has become a national problem. "Riverbanks maintenance is very impor-

tant for preventing erosion," he said urging South Asian facing similar problems to collaborate.

DU Pro-VC and Geography Professor Dr DRTMC and Saarc Disaster Management Nasreen Ahmad, among others, also spoke.

to defer nomination

Jahangirnagar University (JU) teachers have staged a sit-in on the campus demanding cancellation of a special senate meeting scheduled to be held on July 20 to nominate a three-member vicechancellor (VC) panel.

The teachers, under the banner of Sammilito Shikkhak Parishad, have been demonstrating for the last two days demanding senate election prior to the special senate meeting.

They also demanded elections of syndicate members, provosts, deans, Jahangirnagar University Central Students' Union (Jucsu) and registered graduates at the senate meeting.

The teachers alleged that all the senate members are holding their posts without election for a long period.

As per the university act, the senate members must be first elected and selected so that they can nominate the persons for the post of vicechancellor, they added.

Meanwhile, the JU teachers yesterday decided to raise a fund for Padma bridge construction by donating their income of a day in response to Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's declaration that the bridge would be constructed from the country's own finance instead of World Bank loan.

The teachers under the banner of "Bangabandhur Adorsho O Muktijuddh Chetonay Bishwasi Shikkhak Karmakarta O Karmachari Brindha' announced this through a press conference at the university's central cafeteria around 12:30pm.
