UK foiled Iran nuke-weapon drive: M16

Britain's foreign intelligence chief believes his agents prevented Iran from acquiring nuclear weapons but that the pariah state will become armed within two years, the Daily Telegraph reported yester-

In a rare public speech, MI6 boss John Sawers told a meeting of around 100 senior civil servants in London that British agents had foiled Iran's attempts to produce a nuclear weapon as long as four years ago, according to the Telegraph.

"You'd have Iran as a nuclear weapons state in 2008 rather than still being two years away in 2012," the report quoted Sawers as saying last week.

When Iran does finally acquire nuclear status, the intelligence chief warned that Israel and the United States "would face huge dangers".

"I think it will be very tough for any prime minister of Israel or president of the United States to accept a nuclear-armed Iran," he suggested.

The US unleashed a fresh wave of sanctions against Iran on Thursday, ratcheting up pressure to convince Tehran to take seriously concerns about its suspected nuclear weapons programme.

Iran has been subject to severe international economic sanctions over its controversial nuclear programme, which Western powers believe masks an atomic weapons drive despite repeated denials by Tehran.

Sanction call grows after massacre

Russia rejects West's move against Syria regime; questions rise on Turkey jet grounding

The UN Security Council embarked on new talks on a Syria resolution yesterday with western envoys saying the killing of more than 150 people highlighted the need for tough measures.

Syria's regime and opposition yesterday accused each other for the alleged massacre.

France joined the opposition Syrian National Council in urging the UN Security Council to pass a binding resolution against Damascus, which pointed the finger at the "bloodthirsty media" and "terrorists" seeking intervention.

In the first US reaction to what has been widely reported as a massacre, Washington's ambassador Susan Rice said reports coming out of the village of Treimsa were "nightmarish".

In a message on her Twitter account, she said the killings "dramatically illustrate the need for binding (Security Council) measures on Syria." France also said the killings, in which the

Diplomats from the 15-nation council met yesterday and ambassadors were to hold their own talks later in the day. They have so far failed to narrow differences over rival resolutions proposed by Russia and the · western powers.

Russia has already rejected calls for sanctions against Syria on Thursday, while the United States warned the UN mission to the conflict-stricken country should be withdrawn without new measures. Russia is proposing a rival resolution that

renews the mandate of the UN mission in Syria, which ends on July 20. But it has said sanctions are "unacceptable".

Russian authorities made no immediate public reaction to events in Treimsa.

Anatolia news agency said two Syrian brigadier generals and a score of other soldiers crossed into Turkey, bringing the total number of high-ranking defectors to 17.

Meanwhile, Turkey said it has found no traces of explosives on the wreckage of a fighter jet it has claimed was downed by Syria on June 22, raising new questions about the incident that inflamed crossborder tensions.

: US warns over chemical weapons

The US yesterday said that Syrian officials would be "held accountable" if they failed to safeguard the country's chemical weapons after a report suggested some · were being moved out of storage.

The Wall Street Journal reported on Thursday that intelligence reports suggested some chemical weapons were on the move, but the reasons for the transfers were unclear.

It said some US officials feared the weapons could be used against rebels or civilians, while others believed the material was being deliberately hidden from armed opposition groups or · Western powers.

The Wall Street Journal said the Obama administra-· tion was "particularly worried about Syria's stocks of sarin gas, the deadly and · versatile nerve agent".

Hillary in plea for workers' rights

US Secretary of State Hillary Clinton yesterday urged Southeast Asian nations to promote workers' rights and improve labour conditions as a means of spurring economic growth.

"Standing up for workers' rights and high labour standards is both right and moral, it's also smart and strategic," Clinton told a women's forum in the Cambodian town of Siem Reap.

Respecting workers' rights "leads to positive economic outcomes including higher levels of investment. And bringing women into the economy has ripple effects," she said, adding it boosted equal opportunity and raised taxes for governments. "Denying workers their universal rights costs societies

dearly in lost productivity, innovation, and growth, as well as undermining the rule of law and creating instability", Clinton insisted. She held up neighbouring Vietnam and Cambodia as exam-

30 people killed as S Africa train collides with truck

More than 30 people were killed yesterday when a goods train ploughed into a truck carrying farm workers on a level crossing in South Africa, an official said.

The victims were "torn into pieces" in the accident that saw the mangled truck shunted up to two kilometres (one mile) down the line, said Thulani Sibuyi, head of eastern Mpumalanga province's community safety department.

"What we know at this stage is that more than 30 people appear to have died at the point of impact," he said.

Parademics were still at the scene near Malelane, east of the provincial capital Nelspruit.

"It would appear as if the truck driver may have crossed the railway line without having a proper look-out and as a result the train hit him and then pulled him for about a kilometre to two kilometres," said Sibuyi.

The exact number of dead and injured who had been taken to hospital still needed to be confirmed, he said.

The truck was transporting about 50 people, believed to be farm labourers, he said.

E Timor ruling party wins polls

The ruling party of East Timor resistance hero Xanana Gusmao has won 30 seats in parliament, according to a final count yesterday from last weekend's vote, and will need to form a coalition to govern.

Gusmao's centre-left National Congress for Timorese Reconstruction (CNRT) is three seats shy of the 33 needed for an absolute majority in the 65seat parliament.

The main opposition left-wing Fretilin party had come second with 25 seats. The Democratic Party (PD), a member of the previous ruling coalition, won

Mladic trial to resume Monday

The trial of former Bosnian Serb army chief Ratko Mladic will resume next week after being suspended when Mladic fell ill, the Yugoslav war crimes tribunal said yesterday.

The 70-year-old was taken to hospital as a precautionary measure after falling ill during his trial on Thursday, though his lawyer, Branko Lukic, told AFP later the same day that his client was already feeling better.

Mladic is being tried for genocide, war crimes and crimes against humanity for his role in Bosnia's 1992-1995 war that claimed 100,000 lives and displaced 2.2 million people.

Court orders Mugabe to hold by-polls

Zimbabwe's Supreme Court has ordered President Robert Mugabe to call by-elections by the end of August, a ruling that could alter the balance of power in parliament between his ZANU-PF party and its rivals.

The case was taken to court by three opposition MPs who lost their seats in 2009 when they were expelled from a splinter wing of Prime Minister Morgan Tsvangirai's Movement for Democratic Change (MDC).

The High Court ordered by-elections to be held but Mugabe appealed to the Supreme Court, arguing the government had no money to conduct the polls.

The MDC holds 96 seats in the 210-seat lower house of parliament, 10 short of a simple majority, against ZANU-PF's 91. The original three constituencies are all in Tsvangirai strongholds.

Russia MPs pass 'foreign agents' law

Russia's lower house of parliament yesterday approved a controversial bill that brands as "foreign agents" non-governmental organisations who receive funding from abroad.

The legislation, condemned by both the European Union and Washington, was passed by the State Duma with 374 votes in favour, three against and one abstention in the third and final reading -- just minutes after the second

A breach of the law would be punishable by hefty fines or jail time.

The deputies also passed a law making libel or slander a criminal offence punishable by a fine of up to 5 million rubles (\$152,000), voting 238 in favour to 91 against. Communist lawmakers then staged a walkout.

Thai government escapes threat of dissolution

Court dismisses complaint against ruling party

Thailand's ruling party escaped the threat of dissolution yesterday after the Constitutional Court dismissed an opposition complaint that had raised fears of

reigniting the kingdom's bitter splits. "The Court dismiss all the petitions," said Nurak Marpraneet, one of eight judges at the Bangkok court, which had been flanked by security forces in anticipation of the ruling.

The court found complaints against plans by Prime Minister Yingluck Shinawatra's party to amend the constitution -- drawn up under the military junta that deposed her divisive brother Thaksin -were unfounded.

Opposition Democrats, which were swept out of power in a landslide election win for Yingluck last year, alleged the efforts to amend the constitution signalled a threat to the deeply-revered monarchy.

CIRCUMCISION ROW Germany to protect religious rights

The German government yesterday pledged quick action to protect the right of Jews and Muslims to circumcise baby boys on religious grounds, after a court ruling that prompted international outcry. Chancellor Angela

Merkel's spokesman Steffen Seibert told reporters it was "concerned" about the judgement published by a Cologne regional court last month calling the religious rite of circumcision a criminal act. "It is absolutely clear to

the federal government that we want Jewish, we want Muslim religious life in Germany," he said. The Cologne ruling said

circumcision of male infants on religious grounds was tantamount to grievous bodily harm, a criminal act subject to prosecution.
