
Kewell voted greatest ever

Former Liverpool and Leeds United star Harry Kewell has been voted Australia's greatest ever footballer. Kewell was awarded the honour, which was decided by public voting and the input of a panel of experts, at a ceremony late Thursday in Sydney. The 33-year-old, who returned recently to England after a season in the A-League with Melbourne Victory, was not present to collect the award but described it as "an incredible honour". More than 15,000 public votes were cast during the selection process, while a panel of current and former players,

Tigers undercooked before practice T20s

Poor conditions at the Civil Service Cricket Club in Belfast, where the Tigers will play all three games of their Twenty20 series against Ireland, could play spoilsport as Bangladesh gear up for the Ireland leg of their Europe tour.

The Tigers are scheduled to take on Ireland XI in the early afternoon (5:30pm Bangladesh Standard Time) and the Northern Cricket Union President's XI in the evening game (10:00pm BST) at The Green in Comber on Monday, and there's the threat of them going into the games without much cricket practice.

As they attempted to train at Stormont, the conditions haven't been up to scratch due to the unrelenting rain over the past month in the Northern Ireland capital. They had to be content with some stretching and warm-up football on Thursday, concerning the team manager about the lack of a proper net session ahead of the two practice Twenty20s.

"It has been raining for the last month and the ground is poor. So we are a bit con-

cerned whether we can finish a complete session of cricket practice," said manager Tanjeeb Ahsan Saad. "Though the sun came up in the last two days, the ground and the wicket's sustainability to hold a session remained to be seen."

However there are no concerns about the weather anymore as, according to Saad, the temperatures haven't dropped as was expected. "It is cold but not unbearably so," he informed.

Meanwhile, Ireland have recalled Boyd Rankin to their 15-man squad for the threematch series, after the Warwickshire fast bowler demonstrated his recovery from a foot injury sustained in April.

Rankin took 15 wickets during Ireland's successful ICC World Twenty20 qualification campaign in the UAE in March but he has only played second-XI cricket since then. Ireland will take on Bangladesh in three T20 matches, the first of which takes place on Wednesday, as part of their World Twenty 20 preparations.

"It's obviously been a frustrating time sitting on the sidelines but it's great to be back bowling again," Rankin said. "The weather

BPL-FICA battle rages on

The war of words between the Bangladesh Premier League and Federation of International Cricketers Association continued when CEO Tim May blasted BPL chairman Gazi Ashraf Hossain's suggestions of FICA forging a "hate campaign" against the Twenty20 competition.

Ashraf had told The Daily Star on Thursday that FICA wants to sully the BPL's name and the outstanding player payment figure it stated in a media release on Wednesday -- \$600,000 was just part of their imagination.

May however denied the allegations, saying, "I have noted that the chairman of the BPL has come out with some words to the effect that only an amount of \$70k is owed to players from the inaugural BPL event. He also alleges that FICA has some plot to destroy the event," he said.

"This is a total nonsense and a shallow and deliberate action of BPL to take attention away from a BPL administration that is clearly either out of its depth or completely oblivious to the facts of the situation. FICA's sole objective is to ensure BPL and franchises act in accordance with the agreements that they have entered. "Under those Agreements, the franchises

and the BCB (in its capacity as guarantor of player payments) owe a number of players, both foreign and domestic hundreds of thousands of dollars "We are not politically motivated --

Bangladesh players are members of FICA -and a well-run BPL is obviously of benefit to all, particularly Bangladesh players. Why on earth would we mount a campaign that will work against our members' interests?" he added. According to May, the blame clearly lies

with BPL and the Bangladesh Cricket Board.

"Our simple obligation to players is to ensure that they are paid as their employment contracts state and to provide advice going forward to players as to the relative risks entering into various events, whether those risks be financial, safety or corruption.

"We make such recommendations free of fear, favour or discrimination. FICA, players and their managers, have tried for months to work with the franchises, BPL and BCB to address this matter. Players and their managers simply have got tired of the endless string of broken promises and excuses provided by these administrators.

Lee quits int'l cricket

Australian pace bowler Brett Lee on Friday announced his retirement from international cricket after a 13year career, saying his body and mind were no longer up to the stresses of touring.

The 35-year-old said a calf muscle strain that forced him home from Australia's recent one-day tour to Britain was the final straw after a string of setbacks caused by injuries.

"I woke up this morning and just felt like I was ready," Lee said, adding his original plan had been to play at September's World Twenty20 tournament in Sri Lanka as his international swansong.

ronment you have to have 100 percent commitment -- mentally and physically," he told a press conference at the Sydney Cricket Ground.

"And I guess looking at the next day internationals in Sri few months I just didn't have that Lanka, starting in desire any more.

"It wouldn't be fair on me, or my team if I went with that attitude ... you get to the point in life where you say

enough is enough."

Lee said he would continue to play the less demanding Twenty20 cricket in the Indian Premier League and the

Lee's calf injury was the latest in a long line of injuries that punctuated his playing career, of 310 Test wickets at 30.81 from 76 matches and 380 one-day international wickets at 23.36 from 221 matches.

He also endured side strains, a broken toe, ankle issues, stress fractures to his back, persistent elbow problems and appendicitis. Lee was not offered a national

contract in Cricket Australia's latest round of agreements, and decided not to take up a deal with his state side, New South Wales, for this coming summer.

Cricket Australia chief executive James Sutherland paid tribute to Lee's contribution to Australian cricket and as an inspiration to "I think personally in a team envi-youngsters to take up the game.

"His record as a wicket-taker and leader of the attack is fantastic and speaks for itself but his resilience and ability to bounce back after numer-

ous injuries has also been impressive," Sutherland said.

"On top of this, and this is a significant part of his legacy, Brett inspired young Australians to play cricket and bowl fast."

Lee also became extremely popular in cricket-mad India where he wrote and recorded the song "You're the One For Me", which reached number two on the Indian charts and led to a role in his first Bollywood movie "Victory". Lee said while he had enjoyed his

cricket career, he was tired of being away from home for long periods and was looking forward to a different phase of his life.

"It's been a fantastic career and I've loved every minute of it, but it's stage two of my life now," he said.
