Ittefaq editor gets bail in defamation case

The High Court yesterday granted anticipatory bail to the daily Ittefaq's Editor Anwar Hossain Manju for four months in a defamation case.

Former Deputy Managing Director of Takaful Islami Insurance Company ASM Nazrul Islam filed the case with a Dhaka court on June 4 against Manju for publishing an advertisement treating him (Nazrul) as absconder in his daily in February last year.

The court issued warrant for his arrest on July 8. The HC bench of Justice Siddiqur Rahman Miah and Justice KM Kamrul Kader granted the bail after hearing a petition filed by Manju on July 15 seeking bail.

PM seeks IFAD support for fish processing plant formed

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday sought cooperation of the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) for setting up fish preservation and processing plants in Haor areas of the country.

She sought the support when IFAD President Kanayo FN wanze metheratherofficial Gono Bhaban residence in the afternoon.

Hasina said her government has emphasised crop diversification as well as research for boosting food production.

"We have invented flood, drought and salinity-tolerant varieties of paddy which help increase country's food production," she said.

The premier said the country's fish and poultry production has risen to a great extent in the last three years.

Hasina thanked the IFAD for extending its support to Bangladesh especially in agriculture and rural development.

The IFAD president, appreciating Bangladesh's stunning success in different fields, including agriculture, said his organisation has undertaken six projects and would take a six-year project in Bangladesh in the light of the goals of the sixth five-year plan and Vision 2021 of the government.

TORCHING OF MC COLLEGE HOSTEL

Third probe body

Previous committees show no progress

Over a week into the torching of 42 rooms of MC College's hostel in Sylhet with two probe bodies showing no progress in identifying the culprits, the home affairs ministry yesterday formed a third investigation committee.

Deputy commissioner (North) of Sylhet Metropolitan Police, Ejaj Ahmed, heading the five-member committee, said they were asked to file a report in two weeks.

On July 8, the ruling party backed Bangladesh Chhatra League activists torched the rooms after clashing with Jamaat-e-Islami backed Shibir activists, leaving some 20 people injured.

Since then, none has been arrested although five cases, including two by BCL, one by Shibir, one by Jubo League and one by the hostel super, had been filed.

Additional District Magistrate Md Shahidul Alam, heading a five-member committee, said the college staff, teachers and students were afraid to identify the culprits.

Vice Principal Prof Md Al Helal Bhuiyan, heading another committee formed by the college authority, mirrored Shahidul's comment.

One member of the committees, requesting anonymity, said video footage and pictures taken by journalists could be used to identify the culprits but there was also pressure from a quarter in the ruling party to protect the attackers.

Addressing a press briefing at Sylhet Circuit House yesterday, minister without portfolio Suranjit Sengupta said the incident should not be considered emotionally and it was not an isolated incident but a result of

ATN chief apologises to journos

ATN Bangla Chairman Mahfuzur Rahman, in an undated written statement, apologised to the journalist community for his derogatory comments on murdered journalist couple Sagar Sarowar and Meherun Runi.

"I am sad and seek apology for my comments that angered and bruised the dignity of journalists," he said.

On May 30, Mahfuzur, at a press briefing in London, had said, "Sagar and Runi were victims of an extramarital affair." He also claimed to have video footage that hinted at the motive behind the murders.

On February 11, Sagar, a news editor at private TV channel Maasranga, and his wife Meherun, a senior reporter for ATN Bangla, were brutally killed in their rented flat in the capital's West Rajabazar.

BANSKHALI CARNAGE Next hearing on Aug 2

A Chittagong court yesterday fixed for the next hearing date of Banshkhali carnage case on August 2.

The court of third additional district and session judge (acting) Hosne Ara passed the order after completing the second-day quizzing of Bimal, said court sources.

Earlier, Bimal Kanti Shil gave his statement before the court on May 15, 23 and June 3, 27.

A gang of attackers on November 18, 2003 night set the house of one, Tejendra Shil, at Shilpara in Banshkhali on fire, killing 11 members of his family, including an infant.

Tejendra's son Bimal, the lone survivor of the attack, filed a case the next day against 30-35 unidentified people on charges of arson attack, looting and murder.

CLIMATE CHANGE

Use funds for recovery activities

Says EU envoy

The funds promised to Bangladesh to fight against climate change impacts should be spent in the recovery activities of the country's marginalised people, said Ambassador of the European Union (EU) in Bangladesh William Hanna yesterday.

"The marginalised poor people are mainly being affected by the severe impacts of climate change," he also said while addressing as chief guest a workshop in the capital's Brac Centre.

Non-government organisations Action Contre la Faim, Christian Aid, DanChurchAid, Muslim Aid, and Save the Children jointly organised the workshop in line with the formation of a consortium named "DeSHARI" by them to work together in pragmatic sectors relevant to disaster management.

William Hanna said the EU will provide its promised funds to Bangladesh for recovering losses due to climate change impacts. He mentioned about the support of European Commission for Humanitarian Aid and Civil Protection to around 14,000 marginalised water-logged flood affected

families as part of its 'early recovery' activities in Bangladesh. The DeSHARI members will work in Bangladesh's disaster prone regions including haor, char and riverine that are subject to flooding and waterlogging and the coastal districts that are vulnerable to cyclones and storms.

WB LOAN CANCELLATION

Govt will question procedure

Says Dipu Moni

Bangladesh will raise question about the World Bank's procedure in canceling the loan commitment for Padma bridge project, said Foreign Minister Dipu Moni yesterday.

"As a sovereign state, we have the right to raise questions as they have. We will also raise question in the proper place and at the proper time about the procedure," she said.

She was addressing a view exchange meeting organised by the newly formed Indian Media Correspondents Association in Bangladesh at Jatiya Press Club in the capital.

The foreign minister said the allegation of the World Bank was not substantiated by any credible evidence and the decision to cancel the Padma bridge funding was not taken through due process. "We are aggrieved by the decision. The tenure of the credit agreement was scheduled to end later, but the deadline was brought closer and the agreement was

cancelled," she said.

Dipu Moni, however, said there is no reason to damage Bangladesh's relationship with the World Bank just for canceling funding for one

"If they don't fund it, we will arrange alternative funding," she said, adding that Bangladesh will construct the Padma bridge with its own fund, but the door is open for international development partners.

Japan is positive about financing the project under a new framework and it would be easier for the Bangladesh government if Japan stands

by it, she said. She said she does not think that Bangladesh's image has been tarnished after the World Bank cancelled the \$1.2 billion credit line for the Padma bridge project on corrup-

tion charges. Asian Development Bank said it would also be unable to release fund for the project due to the joint nature of co-financing.
