Mashrafe Bin Mortaza's three early wickets helped Bangladesh to an easy win over an Ireland XI by seven wickets at The Green in Belfast yesterday, their first practice match

Balbirnie and No 3 Andrew Poynter in the first over of the game, and went on to take the wicket of James Shannon at the end of the third over to put the home side in trouble after they had decided to bat first. After a brief recovery, left-arm spinner

Elias Sunny then had Lee Nelson and Andrew White stumped in the tenth and twelfth over while Mushfiqur Rahim completed a third stumping, that of Stuart Thompson off Mahmudullah Riyad, to further dent the Irish side.

Nigel Jones and wicketkeeper Rory McCann added 45 runs for the unbeaten seventh wicket stand, with the all-rounder Jones hammering three sixes and a boundary in his 26-ball 41 McCann added 15 off 16 balls.

The Tigers lost Tamim Iqbal and Mohammad Ashraful by the Powerplay overs cheaply, before Shakib Al Hasan and captain Mushfigur Rahim added 61 runs for the third wicket. The world's No 1 all-rounder made a run-a-ball 37 with four boundaries and a six while the skipper struck 40 off 25 balls with four boundaries and a couple of sixes.

Riyad struck the winning blow, hammering a six off the off-spin of White.

India invite Pakistan for series after five years

Indian cricket chiefs on Monday said they had invited Pakistan for a series later this year, their first in five years, in a further sign of improving ties between the neighbours.

If approved by the two governments, the series would comprise three one-day internationals and two Twenty20 games in December-January, the Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) said.

"It was decided to resume cricketing ties with Pakistan by inviting the Pakistan cricket team for a short series in December 2012-January 2013," the BCCI said in a statement. "The modalities will be worked out shortly."

The rivals have not played a bilateral series since Pakistan's tour of India in 2007 after cricket ties were snapped following the 2008 terror attacks on Mumbai, which were carried out by militants from Pakistan.

The ODI matches will be played in Chennai, Kolkata and New Delhi and the Twenty20 games in Bangalore and Ahmedabad, BCCI spokesman Rajiv Shukla told reporters in New Delhi.

The series will be held when England, who are due to tour India later this year, return home briefly for Christmas and New Year.

The Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) swiftly welcomed the proposed series, which will now require approval from the Indian foreign affairs and home ministries.

Cup in Bangladesh in March. Both matches were won by India. An Indian government source

told AFP the decision to resume cricket ties was made by the respective boards and not the government.

"The issue of resuming cricketing ties came up in recent bilateral talks and it was left for the boards to resolve it," the source said.

NBR inquires about BPL

The National Board of Revenue (NBR) has asked the Bangladesh Premier League (BPL) governing council to provide all payment information the six franchises made. This was learned yesterday after the NBR officials last Thursday decided to squeeze the applicable tax payments out of the franchises.

So far the NBR has received close to Tk 2.5 crore from the six BPL franchises, but with news floating of players being paid their dues, it shook the NBR into action. It was also learned that the government agency was unhappy that the franchises were being so tardy at paying up.

They have also decided that in order to get the dues, they will apply all measures including freezing accounts,

The moment the concept of Bangladesh Premier League (BPL) was brought into public

attention, a debate began over Bangladesh Cricket Board's ability to stage a tournament modelled on the Indian Premier League (IPL). The first question was whether the

BCB could strike a balance between the commercialisation of cricket and the development of players, especially when the country desperately needed to focus on improving the standard of first-class cricket to save face in the international arena. Most importantly, many also had doubts over the governing council's ability to properly observe all legal formalities related to undertaking and shaping such a massive financial venture.

But the board prioritised the staging of the BPL, seeing it as a necessary response to the demands of the times and were finally able to complete the first edition successfully on the field in

February this year. The Tweny20 tournament contained all the excitement and entertainment that the cricket crazy fans were craving with the big names of international cricket despite corruption controversies and a fiasco over the fourth semi-finalists. But all on-field success seemed to

have been marred by the non-payment of dues to contracted BPL players. The tug-of-war between the Federation of International Cricketers Association (FICA) and the BPL governing council over the players' outstanding payments is tarnishing the image of Bangladesh cricket in the international arena. In response to FICA CEO Tim May's various statements over the last two months, the BPL governing council officials came up with salvos threatening the various franchises with new payment deadlines.

It became a funny and ludicrous game which only served to damage the image of Bangladesh cricket even more. And interestingly enough, the franchises kept mum regarding the non-payment issue though it should not have happened if a professional

framework was in place at the onset. While it is true that the governing

council is solely responsible regarding the running of the tournament, the franchises are what makes the tournament what it is. The board is dreaming if they think that the BPL will be successful in the long run and find a strong footing without professionalism among the franchises. So far the governing council could

not provide the details of the payments because they are not getting enough support from the franchises. It is also curious why the franchises have maintained radio silence when board officials are defending them by saying that there only a minimal amount is unpaid mainly because of some technical problems. The non-payment issue is direr for the local players than the foreign players. It seems, astonishingly, that the franchises are vanishing from the scene. The BPL is also facing another major

The Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) on Monday swiftly welcomed the first proposed cricket series with India in five years, saying millions of fans would be delighted.

"The decision is great and we welcome it. It seems that millions of cricket fans have their wishes fulfilled," PCB chairman Zaka Ashraf told reporters in Pakistan's eastern city of Lahore.

"We have received a letter with the BCCI invitation for the series in which they have confirmed the series, and the venues and other things will be decided later," said Ashraf.

India's cricket chiefs said they had invited Pakistan for a tour later this year, which would be the first in five years if approved by their governments.
