

Pre-Ramadan hike in essentials price



During Ramadan, some dishonest businessmen try to make profits unethically by hiking up prices of basic commodities. Sometimes the price rises to such a height that it goes beyond the means of lower and middle income people. And every year we see the government takes steps to rein in the price.

But the ground realities show a different picture. In practice, the government initiatives are too little compared to the need to feel its impact in the local market. This year the prices of sugar, egg, oil, onion, garlic and potato has already started to soar ahead of Ramadan.

The hoarding tendency of some unscrupulous traders for making excess profits during Ramadan aggravates the situation. The government should impose ban on hoarding of basic commodities and fix the prices of all commodities. Constant monitoring should be in place side by side with mobile court. Every market should have a Local Market Monitoring Committee (LMMC) comprising senior citizens of the local-

This letter is in reference to the exclusive interview of Dr. Ijaz Hossain, Professor, Department of Chemical Engineering, BUET, published in your daily on July 14, 2012. What surprises me is that the professor did not discuss the issue of nuclear energy at all.

Nuclear powered electrical generation is the second cheapest, the cleanest, most efficient in terms of maintenance and it provides long term solutions. With perfect planning on the board and project management, we can have two medium size second generation reactors in place supplying us a minimum of 2400 MW under a barter term agreement with Russia. All the initial studies and site are in place. If we can procure MIG-29 multirole fighter aircraft for BAF, why can't we have electricity generation in the same procedure? Only thing that lacks here is the political will of the leadership.

The reports of Fukushima accident are telling us that the accident has happened purely due to negligence and human error. Some even cites conspiracy theory to weaken Japan's economy. The reactors were originally designed to withstand up to 9 on Richter scale. Japan is turning on its reactors one by one now. Japan would not do that if they were not absolutely sure about safety.

So, what I want to say is that nuclear power should be our option no. 1, gas-powered turbine is second and coal-ired power should be our reserved option.

Ban green chilli export

The price of green chillies has increased by 200 percent from Tk 20 - Tk 40 a month ago to Tk 80 - Tk 100 a kg now in the city markets. Some say that the prices of chillies are rising in the domestic markets due to exports to India. Indian markets are facing a shortage of vegetables supply due to floods. Prices of green chillies along with aubergine, onion, potato, garlic and cucumber etc. are also on the rise in the Indian markets.

The month of Ramadan is set to begin from the third week of July. It has been observed that during Ramadan consumption of the above mentioned vegetables increases along with sugar and cooking oil in our country. If exports of vegetables to India continue for earning more profits during Ramadan, it would disrupt the smooth vegetable supply in our local markets. The local consumers would be deprived of adequate supply of these items meaning the prices will not remain within reasonable limits. Recently the Federation of Bangladesh Chamber of Commerce and Industry (FBCCI) urged the government to slap a ban on export of these commodities to check the price spiral during Ramadan.

We hope the government would accept the proposal of FBCCI in this regard and start implementing it by imposing restriction on exports of green chillies immediately.
