

Recalling the genius that was Humayun Ahmed

As the news of his death broke out, reactions poured in from friends, colleagues and well-wishers of author-filmmaker extraordinaire Humayun Ahmed. They termed Ahmed as "a man of principle", "a highly creative individual", "a multifaceted talent", "an author who created a multitude of readers", "a father figure" and beyond.

Syed Shamsul Haq, author-poet-playwright As an author, Humayun Ahmed had a significant role in creating new readers in this country. His repertoire is immense! I think his short stories will keep him alive forever. I can particularly mention the short story "Chokh" which I find to be remarkable. I would love to call his mother a "Ratnagarbha". She gave birth to Ahmed, Muhammad Zafar Iqbal and Ahsan Habib.

Dr. Enamul Haque, theatre personality-actor He never feared to speak the truth. He was a man of principle. I was very close to him. He gave me the opportunity to act in his two groundbreaking television plays -- "Ayomay" and "Eishob Din Ratri". People still recall the character 'Moti', and credit goes to him.

Jewel Aich, illusionist He wrote a novel, "Magic Munshi", couple of years earlier. He dedicated this book to me. I am lucky that I got the chance to bond with him. He was a man who loved to have fun and knew how to enjoy life to the fullest. His logic was impeccable. He had great interest in magic as well. I will miss his company.

Dolly Zahur, actor

When Ahmed's "Eishob Din Ratri" was adapted into a TV serial, I got the opportunity to work with him. I played 'Nilu' in the serial, and that was my breakthrough performance on TV. People used to call me "Nilu Bhabi" for years. A creative titan like him comes

Jayanta Chattopadhyay, actor

I worked with him in several TV plays and films. I was also part of his last film, "Ghetu Putro Kamola". We had a lot of fun while shooting the film. He was a wise man who loved to read. We had great times together in

Faruk Ahmed, actor

I had the opportunity to act in his last play "Pipra", which is yet to be aired. I can proudly say that I have performed in most of his TV plays. I am a close friend and classmate of his younger brother Ahsan Habib. I came to know him in 1991

Afsana Mimi, actor

I first met him at the set of "Kothao Keu Nei". Later, I also acted in his serials -- "Nokkhotrer Raat" and "Sabuj Chhata". I have read all of his writings, starting with "Nandito Narokey". He is one of my favourite authors and, of course, Misir Ali is my favourite fictional character. This is truly a sad time for Bangla literature.

Tania Ahmed, actor

He was a father figure to me. He used to love me like his own daughter. My children used to refer to him as grandfather. I have lost a parent. This is an irreparable Zahid Hassan, actor

I used to call him "Humayun Bhai". I received a National Award for my performance in his film "Srabon Megher Din". I had the chance to perform in many of his TV plays as well. I acted in his film "Amar Acche Jol" too. He left too soon.

Shadhin Khasru, actor

I used to visit him at his Dhanmondi residence, 'Dakhin Hawa', very often. Despite our age difference, he used to treat me as a friend. My role in his play "Brikkhomanob" was a breakthrough in my career. What I've achieved as an actor so far -- all credits go to

Mir Sabbir, actor

When shooting, he used to wake up very early in the morning and used to walk for a while. I remember walking with him and he would touch upon a range of subjects during these conversations. A man like him is not



During his recent trip back home, before going back to New York for continuation of his medical treatment, I had an opportunity to meet Humayun Ahmed at Nuhash Polli. Here's an account of my last interaction with the master story-

The scorching sun was heating up the ground, with no rain in sight for the past couple of days. Ignoring the glare of the burning sky, Humayun Ahmed sat on the green bed of grass. Meher Afroze Shaon kept calling him from inside the house. Ahmed -- busy talking to everyone -- ignored her requests. However he asked for a glass of water, which was promptly brought by Nuhash Polli manager, Bulbul. The author's son, Nishad, was playing nearby -- looking for a chance to run to the nearby garden. But Ahmed barred him from doing so saying, "don't go there Baba, there are ghosts in the garden."

A large crowd gathered round the popular author, about 20 of them coming from Netrokona teachers and guardians from Netrokona Shahid Muktijoddha High School. Ahmed sought blessings from his paternal uncle, one of those from Netrokona. The writer said to his uncle, "It's your prayers that has kept me alive for

Turning to others, he said, "The school's results must improve. How else would I proudly claim it to be my own school?"

He then opened a packet. Showing its contents to everyone, the author said, "These are seeds. I tried to grow them here, but failed to get any result. Hopefully this time the trees will grow."

Ahmed walked around Nuhash Polli, followed by a crowd of admirers, including the owner of Anya Prakash, Mazharul Islam: playwright Shakur Majid etc. He picked a Jambura from a nearby tree. The nature-loving litterateur then went near his tea plants and stayed there for a while. Next destination was the pond at Nuhash Polli. Ahmed told us the pond is named 'Lilaboti' -- after his daughter. A seemingly glum

After all the walking, it was time "Humayun bhai". After lunch, for Ahmed to return to the house. He told the manager to make sure that everyone had lunch. He went in, along with Mazharul Islam, Shakur Majid and me. Ahmed sat on the floor of the living room and called for some watermelon. We resumed our adda, as his children -- Nishad and Ninid -- played

Lunch arrived. As we all ate, Ahmed played the perfect host,

asking us whether we had enough on our plates. Actress Tomalika Karmakar called me on the phone, and when I said that I'm at Nuhash Polli, she asked me to convey her regards to the author took a nap. Shaon informed us that the amount of visitors and Ahmed's endless chats with them would only worsen his condition.

It was time to bid adieu after Ahmed woke up. I handed him a copy of a Daily Star report on Nuhash Polli. He said, "stay well", as I said goodbye. Who knew this would be the last goodbye?
