US finds rights not well

Grim human, labour rights situation presented at congressional hearing; buyers wrote PM 2 letters in 4 months about hiking RMG workers' wage, probing death of labour leader Aminul

Days after two dozen top global apparel buyers gathered in Dhaka to share concerns over persistent labour unrest, top US officials painted a grim picture of Bangladesh's human and labour rights situation in a Congress hearing Thursday.

This could ultimately affect the country's exports and trade relations with the US if immediate measures were not taken to improve the conditions.

The garment sector, which accounts for more than 80 percent of the exports, could bear the brunt as major buyers from the US and European countries had been continuing to express their unhappiness over the labour rights situation at factories in Bangladesh.

The buyers seemed very serious about the issue and they had even written two letters to the prime minister in the last three months urging her to intervene and improve the labour rights situation and try the killers of a labour leader.

Rab arrests 17 Tahrir activists

Rapid Action Battalion members in separate drives arrested 17 members of banned militant outfit Hizb-ut-Tahrir from different parts of the capital on Thursday night and yesterday.

A team of Rab-1, following a tip-off, conducted a drive in Nikunja Boro Masjid of Khilkhet around 1:30pm yesterday and arrested nine members of the outfit.

The arrestees were found to be holding antigovernment rally and distributing leaflets containing anti-state statement among people of the area during the drive.

In another raid at Gandaria, Rab-10 personnel arrested four operatives of the outlawed party around 1:55pm while they

JU Senate elects 3-man VC panel

Ex-VC Prof Shariff bags highest votes

In the first-ever vice-chancellor panel polls at Jahangirnagar University during the rule of the Awami League-led government, its senate members yesterday elected a three-member panel amid agitation from a section of teachers. Prof Shariff Enamul Kabir, the immedi-

ate-past VC who was forced to resign in May following protests by students and teachers, bagged the highest 50 votes. Incumbent VC Prof Anwar Hossain got 38 votes while Prof Nurul Alam, a physics teacher, 37 votes.

President Zillur Rahman, also the chancellor of JU, will appoint anyone of the three. A highly-placed source said the government was considering Prof Shariff or Prof Anwar as the next JUVC.

Contacted, Education Minister Nurul Islam Nahid said, "After getting the list,

Syria starts all-out Damascus assault

Rebels clash with troops; wounded security chief dies

AFP, Damascus

Syrian forces launched an all-out assault on opposition strongholds in Damascus yesterday, a day after rebels seized crossings on the Iraq and Turkey borders on the 16-month conflict's deadliest day so far.

Rebel fighters also clashed with troops in several neighbourhoods of Aleppo in what a human rights watchdog said was the fiercest fighting so far in Syria's second city.

Yesterday's violence came after Russia

and China used their powers as UN Security Council permanent members to block resolutions on Syria for the third time in nine months.

In New York, The UN Security Council unanimously voted to give the UN observer mission in Syria a "final" 30-day mandate.

Russia had threatened to veto a Britishdrafted resolution, but Russia's ambassador Vitaly Churkin finally backed the resolution.

A gunman wearing a gas mask opened fire in a crowded US movie theatre screening the latest Batman film early yesterday, killing at least 12 and wounding nearly 40, police and reports said.

Witnesses described a scene of chaos at the midnight debut showing of "The Dark Knight Rises," saying the gunman had set off tear gas bombs and opened fire in the packed theatre in Aurora, a suburb of Denver, Colorado.
