
Inzaghi hangs up his boots

Tamim tames Dutch

Bangladesh bounced back from Tuesday's loss to lowly Scotland, as they comfortably beat Netherlands by eight

wickets last night at Sportpark Westvliet in The Hague. Tamim Iqbal's unbeaten 69, his maiden Twenty20 half-century, helped

the Tigers go past the home side's 144-7 with two overs to spare. The Tigers reached the target through Mushfigur Rahim's fourth six in his unbeaten 24ball 37, the pair having added 82 runs for the undefeated third wicket stand which would help in some way to lay the ghost of the 34-run defeat to the Scots.

Tamim hammered five boundaries and a couple of sixes in his 53-ball knock while there also contribution from Junaed Siddiqui at the top of the order. The left-hander was given a go in place of Mohammad Ashraful and although he didn't set the world on fire, he did hit a six and three boundaries in his 20-ball 26. When he was caught by Peter Borren off paceman Timm van

der Gugten, it ended a 45-run opening towards long-off. stand with Tamim.

Shakib Al Hasan, having lost his place at the top of the ICC Test allrounder rankings, gave a timid return catch to medium-pacer Ahsan Malik after making 12 off 11 balls with the help of two boundaries.

The home side's decision to bat first backfired from the first over when Mashrafe clean bowled wicketkeeper Wesley Barresi in the first over. The Australia born Tom Cooper then swung one from Mashrafe down Shakib's throat at deep mid-wicket, giving Bangladesh an early footing in the game. Eric Szwarczynski's dismissal, caught at mid-on off Shakib, in the fourth over made it 14 for three.

Michael Swart remained intact at the other end, adding 38 for the fourth wicket with Peter Borren though that partnership was brought to an end when the latter was needlessly run out for 12. The veteran Tom de Grooth then aided Swart to his half-century, the pair adding 42 for the fifth wicket, brought to an end by a superb catch by another veteran, Abdur Razzak, running

Swart was next to go but he made the biggest contribution: 57 off 41 balls with the help of four boundaries and a six. Hometown boy Tim Gruijters's final over blast at Mashrafe spoiled the paceman's figures but the 17 runs -- via Peter Seelar's six and two boundaries by Gruijters -- gave the Dutch some runs to bowl at.

Apart from Mashrafe's two, Shakib also got a couple of wickets while Abdur Razzak and Mahmudullah Riyad picked up one wicket each.

The Tigers, who will remain at ninth place in the ICC Twenty20 rankings, play their last game on tour, taking on the hosts again today at the same venue. The match begins at 6:00pm Bangladesh Standard Time.

Scots eye full membership

Scotland coach Peter Steindl has said his young team is capable of challenging more higher-ranked sides after they secured their first win against a full member nation by beating Bangladesh in a Twenty20 international at The Hague.

Steindl praised the composure and shot selection of Richie Berrington, who scored his maiden international century to lead Scotland to a 34-run victory on Tuesday.

"We've set our sights at beating a full

member and we haven't done that in a bonafide international before, either ODI or T20 internationals," Steindl told BBC Scotland. "We know we are capable of challenging teams that are above us.

"We had a polished performance, we worked hard and got that result we were looking for. We've got a young team who are hungry for success but realise we have a long way to go."

Berrington, a 25-year-old batsman who was born in Pretoria in South Africa, was the only player to score more than 20 for Scotland after they chose to bat. He was firm at one end, striking five sixes and ten fours in his 100 off 58 balls,

the seventh hundred in Twenty20 internationals. He was dismissed in the 19th over and Scotland's score of 162 proved too much for Bangladesh to chase.

"That was an outstanding knock by Richie," Steindl said. "He's had a couple of really good knocks for Scotland over the last two years, but today the composure that he had, his shot selection and decision making was outstanding and he deserved to get a hundred. But Richie would say himself that it was made even more special by the result."

AUSSIE COACH Waqar not

Waqar Younis is no longer in contention to become Australia's new bowling coach after being turned down this week following an interview. Cricket Australia is searching for a replacement for Craig McDermott, who vacated the position in May, and Waqar was keen to take on the position and work with Australia's emerging crop of fast bowlers.

Tasmania's bowling coach Ali de Winter is another contender for the role and was given the chance to audition as the stand-in mentor on the recent one-day tour of England. Interviews for the job did not take place until after the squad returned from that trip and Waqar said on Wednesday he was no longer in the running.

"I was interested but it didn't work out between me and Cricket Australia," Waqar told ESPNcricinfo. "It didn't really work out. They did interview me. I guess what I'm offering and what they're looking at are two different things. I don't know, I haven't really asked them the details but that's how it stands at the moment. It has just been in the last couple of days."

Waqar took 373 Test wickets for Pakistan during a 14-year career and was considered a master exponent of reverse swing, and has since then served as bowling mentor and head coach of Pakistan. Now based in Sydney, Waqar said he remained keen to become LONDONGIO
