Indian cabinet okays border pact with Bangladesh cloud the positive nature of the endeavour. UNB, Dhaka

Stalled since September last year, a constitutional amendment to ratify the India-Bangladesh boundary agreement got the nod from the Indian Cabinet Committee on Security (CCS) on Thursday.

It is likely to be placed before parliament in the monsoon session, reports Times of India.

Prime Minister Manmohan Singh and his Bangladeshi counterpart Sheikh Hasina had signed the land boundary agreement (LBA) in Dhaka last year. An updated version of the Indira-Mujib agreement of 1974, the accord's ratification will require a constitutional amendment of Article 368.

While the Indian government looks to concretise the LBA, the political climate in India is fragile enough for uncertainty to The constitutional amendment will have

to be passed by two-thirds of members "present and voting" and ratified by state legislatures.

India and Bangladesh share a 4,096km land boundary covering West Bengal, Assam, Tripura, Meghalaya and Mizoram. Around 53,000 people residing in the enclaves, who have just been counted in the first ever census in these areas, will get the citizenship of the country they are living in.

The LBA will not only change contours of India's map, but will be the first resolved boundary with any neighbour. The agreement will formalise status quo on enclaves and areas under adverse possession, entailing neither transfer of territory nor people.

Poor litigants must also get justice Says NHRC chief

The state must ensure that poor litigants are not denied justice on frivolous and baseless causes and should pay for their judicial expenses, the head of National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) said yesterday.

Having ratified most of the UN human rights treaties, Bangladesh must stop "miscarriage of justice," he told a workshop on "Periodic Review on Ratification of UN Human Rights Treaties" at the capital's Brac Centre. Prof Mizanur Rahman said that in harmony with human

rights conventions, the state should pay adequate, fair and due compensation to a victim if he or she was tortured by law enforcement agencies like Rab or any other forces.

He also noted that the country had not yet been able to dispel reservations to the UN convention against discrimination against women and had still not ratified the convention against forced disappearance.

The UN Human Rights Council during its second fouryearly review in next May in Geneva will focus on Bangladesh's development on human rights situation and implementation of the council's recommendations during the first review in 2009.

Robbers loot house in capital

Robbers looted around 100 tolas of gold ornaments, Tk 6 lakh in cash and a licenced revolver from the house of a former ward councillor of Dhaka City Corporation in the capital's Kuril area early yesterday.

The robbers entered the house of ex-councillor Kazi Hazrat Ali by cutting open the iron grilles of a window at the back of the building.

Ali, also president of BNP's Badda unit, resides on the first two floors of a four-storey building at Kazibari in Kuril.

Family members said a group of five or six entered the home around 3:45am and tied up all family members at gun point.

Syed Ziauzzaman, officer-in-charge of Bhatara Police Station, told The Daily Star that there were security guards at the entrance to the building but the robbers managed to dodge them.

Quoting details from Ali's statement the OC said, "Robbers looted 100 tolas of gold ornaments, Tk 6 lakh in cash and a licenced revolver with six bullets from the house. They left around 6:00am."

A case has been filed against four unidentified criminals. No one was arrested or any recovery was made as of filing this report at 8:00pm.

10 killed, 19 hurt in road crashes

MC COLLEGE ARSON Investigation committee gets 10-day extension

One of the three committees which Sylhet's MC College authority formed to probe the torching of 42 rooms of the college's hostel was given 10 more working days yesterday to submit the investigation report.

The committee, headed by Vice Principal Md Al-Helal Bhuiyan, was formed on July 9 and initially given 15 working days, said Principal Dhiresh Chandra Sarker.

On July 8, the ruling party backed Bangladesh Chhatra League activists torched the rooms after clashing with Jamaat-e-Islami backed Shibir activists, leaving some 20 people injured.

The second five-member committee, formed on July 10 and headed by Additional District Magistrate Md Shahidul Alam, was initially given 10 working days for the submission and given an extension of 15 working days on July 24.

The third five-member committee formed on July 16 and headed by deputy commissioner (North) of Sylhet Metropolitan Police, Ejaj Ahmed, was given 14 working days for the submission.

Dalit women face double discrimination

Gender and caste discrimination within the Dalit community and society has left its women deprived of social justice and human rights, academics and activists opined at a conference vesterday.

It remains a matter of debate whether to abolish caste-based jobs to reform the Dalit professions or to complement the jobs with proper amenities and facilities to establish rights, the discussants also observed.

Bangladesh Dalit and Excluded Women's Federation along with Nagorik Uddyog organised the conference on Dalit women in the capital's Chayanot Sangskriti Bhaban.

According to a Nagorik Uddyog report, as many as 55 lakh Dalit people and 10 lakh tea workers are being discriminated in society, said the discussants.

Around 350 Dalit women of 10 associations across the country attended the seminar where 25 meritorious young women were awarded for their progress in higher studies.

Information Commissioner Prof Sadeka Halim, Blast Honorary Director Sara Hossain, Jahangirnagar University's Prof Farzana Islam and urban planner Salma A Shafi also addressed the conference.

Hepatitis major cause of liver diseases: Experts

Hepatitis is a major cause of the liver diseases in Bangladesh that eventually lead to liver cirrhosis and cancer, said speak-

ers yesterday. They were speaking at a press conference on "Safe food, safe liver, safe health" organised by Hepatology Society, Dhaka, Bangladesh in the capital's Jatiya Press Club marking the World Hepatitis Day yesterday.

Dr Md Shahinul Alam, associate professor of Hepatology at Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University, said Hepatitis A and Eviruses spread through contaminated food and water.

Consumption of adulterated fruits, foods and spices and also food prepared in unhygienic conditions should be avoided, he added. Speakers also said Hepatitis B and C viruses are transmit-

ted through the use of unscreened blood, unsterilised syringes and unsafe sex practices. Other sources of these viruses could be use of the same razor blade on multiple customers at saloon shops, use of unsterilised equipments by dentists, and circumcision done

in rural areas with used equipments, they said, adding that

professional blood donors may be another source. The speakers also emphasised collecting blood only from reliable institutions like the Red Crescent Society and Quantum blood banks.
