Afzal Hossain on the evolution of TV drama

Afzal Hossain is the emblem of our country's golden age of TV drama. Often regarded as the most successful actor on Bangladeshi TV, Afzal began acting as a member of Dhaka Theatre, when he was a student of the Institute of Fine Arts. He was a regular in almost all Dhaka Theatre productions and became a known face in TV plays. His acting skills and hard work made him stand out among his contemporaries and helped him carve a permanent niche in TV

Performances in several films brought fame for Afzal, including the Kazi Zahir film "Notun Bou", where he starred opposite Subarna Mustafa. He also paired up with Diti in the Abdullah Al Mamun movie "Dui Jibon", before taking a long hiatus prior to appearing in the Humayun Faridee production "Palabi

Afzal's acting gigs reduced in recent times, as the star is busy with his production house. He has also directed a new serial for Channel i, titled "Chhoto Kaku", in which he plays the eponymous role.

Meanwhile, after a decade-long break, Afzal recently paired up with Subarna Mustafa in the tele-film "Prem Bachite Janey", directed by Arif Khan and to be aired by ntv this Eid. Afzal gives all credit to Arif Khan whose insistence convinced him to work with Subarna again after many years. Asked on how the reunion of the once-popular duo feels, Afzal says it is a

very enjoyable experience. Saying that Subarna Mustafa is still regular with acting, Afzal admits that he has become a less frequent face on the TV in recent times. But the adda sessions with Subarna between scenes feel great, adds

Asked how he manages to maintain his evergreen appearance, Afzal says he doesn't know the secret as he never has tried anything special to maintain the image. He adds that of all the mediums -- TV, cinema and theatre -- the stage attracts him the most, as people get a live "flesh and blood" experience. Working on the stage is more enjoyable, as the interaction between the audience and the performer is more direct, Afzal claims.

With many years of experience as a TV drama director, Afzal has also introduced countless models to the Bangladeshi advertising arena. The veteran says he is satisfied with all the acting performances he has done so far and is con-

In the past decade, Bangladeshi media has undergone a rapid growth, with

the spawning of multiple TV channels. Producers are investing crores of taka into TV plays, allowing actors to become full-time professionals. Asked between the main difference between his times and now, Afzal says his contemporaries acted out of love and passion for the art form. He adds that something good only comes out as long as there are emotions and love embedded

There was a time when a single drama on BTV could create a massive stir, turning an actor into a star overnight. An actor's work was greatly appreciated and admired by a legion of fans during that golden era. Afzal again claims that it was the passion of the performance, which made both the acting and its reception grander.

Ahmed Sofa: Voice of the underprivileged

July 28 marked the 11th death anniversary of Ahmed Sofa. On the occasion, writers, social and cultural activists placed wreaths at his grave at the Martyred Intellectuals' Graveyard in Mirpur, Dhaka. A number of institutes and writers associations also organised discussions on his life and immense contribution to Bangla literature.

Ahmed Sofa was one of the most prolific writers of Bangla desh. He was born in 1943 at Gaachbaria in Chittagong. Among the contemporary fiction writers in Bangladesh, Sofa belongs in the first rank for his thought-provoking and contem plative writings. Most of his writ-

ings shed light on social, political and economic issues. He wrote novels, stories, essays, poems, translations songs and criticism. Sofa was outspoken and bold. He hardly practised religion but his conviction was unquestionable.

About Ahmed Sofa and his political view, eminent literary critic Mahfuz Ahmed Khan said, "Sofa's candid personality and courageous expressions brought him into the limelight. Simultaneously, the genius was very friendly towards the younger generation. He was neve seen hankering after fame, money or materialistic gains. He was truly a secular thinker."

About his modes of writing, poet Mahadev Saha said, "Most of his literary works were often based on his personal and social experiences. He protested social and political injustice, and tried to depict yearnings, demands and thoughts of the masses through his writing. He always handled his stories with meticulous

Amy Winehouse's death, one year later: A timeline



In January 2011, Amy Winehouse returned to the stage in Brazil to largely positive reviews. Six months later, she performed what was quickly deemed a "train wreck" gig in Belgrade, Serbia, where she greeted the crowd, "Hello, Athens!" and stumbled around the stage clutching her stomach for an agonizing 90 minutes. On July 20, she danced alongside her goddaughter Dionne Bromfield at the iTunes festival. Three days later, she was discovered unresponsive in bed by her bodyguard at her Camden Square flat. The 27-year-old singer was pro-

nounced dead at the scene. In the days and weeks that followed, the number of tributes to Winehouse was nearly matched by the volume of stories speculating about her death and what would come next.

Here's a timeline tracking the most important developments in the Winehouse story in the year following her

July 23, 2011: Musicians react to Winehouse's death, including producer and close collaborator Mark Ronson, who tweeted, "She was my musical soulmate & like a sister to me."

October 26, 2011: U.K. coroner Suzanne Greenaway rules Amy Winehouse's official cause of death "misadventure" and states she

died because she disregarded the risks of excessive alcohol intake. March 28, 2012: Documents are made public more today. that show that Winehouse unsurprisingly had-Seasoned singers Syed Abdul Hadi, n't drafted a will, so her approximately \$4.66

million fortune will go not to her ex-husband Blake Fielder-Civil, but instead to her parents. May 11, 2012: Winehouse had once offered friend Pete Doherty a sample of her blood as a "self-portrait" painted on one of his canvases. He finished it off with his own "arterial splatter," named it "Ladylike," and put it on display at London's Cob Gallery as part of a larger

personal collection. June 28, 2012: Amy, My Daughter, Mitch Winehouse's memoir, is published.

July 16, 2012: George Michael tells a radio interviewer that he had approached Adele about performing a duet with him at his November 6, 2011 AIDS charity fund concert in honour of the late Elizabeth Taylor, but that the song he proposed they sing, Winehouse's "Love is A Losing Game".

Emceed by Naveed, a special entertainment show titled "Borshophurti"





Madonna fans vented their anger after the star ended a special intimate show in Paris after just 45 minutes. The singer said she had "a special affinity with France" as she opened the last minute concert, but

drew boos from many disappointed fans. The 2,000 tickets sold out in minutes, with fans paying between £80-£200 and some changing hands for up to £1,000. Madonna was also criticised for talking about

politics instead of singing, after revealing she had a message for France's extreme right-wing leader Marine Le Pen. France's National Front is threatening to sue the star for using an image of Le Pen with a Swastika

superimposed on her forehead at a concert earlier this month. "I know that I have made a certain Marine Le Pen very angry with me," Madonna told fans.

"It's not my intention to make enemies. It's my intention to promote tolerance," she continued. Afterwards 33-year-old Guillaume Delaval complained: "She spoke for 15 minutes about tolerance, it's not the UN here."

Paris resident Allain Zambrana, 26, from Nicaragua, said he wanted to ask for his money back. "I felt very frustrated because I camped out on the streets and then the show just ends like that." Several fans cried "refund!" as they realised


