Bangladesh, Nepal sign MoU

Bangladesh and Nepal yesterday signed a deal on holding bilateral consultations between the foreign ministries of the two countries for further strengthening of the ties.

Bangladeshi Foreign Secretary Mohamed Mijarul Quayes and his Nepalese counterpart Durga Prasad Bhattarai signed the memorandum of understanding (MoU) on behalf of their respective governments at the foreign ministry in Dhaka.

The MoU envisages the foreign offices of Bangladesh and Nepal to meet annually and consult on bilateral, regional and multilateral issues of common interest.

Earlier on the day, the two foreign secretaries, leading delegations of their respective countries, held talks on the full range of bilateral issues.

4 BCL activists denied bail

A Dhaka court yesterday rejected bail petitions of four Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL) activists accused in the murder of Jahangirnagar University (JU) student Zubair Ahmed.

The four -- Najmul Hossain Plabon, Kamruzzaman Sohag, Mazharul Islam and Mahamudul Hasan Masud -- are suspended students of JU.

They are among 13 accused in Zubair murder case filed with Ashulia Police Station.

Judge Md Abdul Majid of the Dhaka District and Sessions Judge's Court passed the order after defence lawyers submitted separate criminal appeals seeking bail against a lower court rejection order.

Judicial Magistrate Washim Shiekh of the Chief Judicial Magistrate's court rejected their bail prayers and ordered to send them to jail on July 16.

A French-born Bangladeshi expert on local traditional boats has examined an ancient boat that surfaced from beneath the sandy beach in Kuakata recently and said it was a national heritage bearing ethnic history.

"I have never seen such an unusual traditional boat," Yves Marre told The Daily Star after examining it on the beach Monday afternoon. "It is important to preserve it now, as it is lying at an insecure state," he said. Marre initiated a traditional boat

museum under the banner "Protection and Preservation of National Naval Heritage of Bangladesh". With his project, he has so far

replicated 65 types of traditional wooden boats of Bangladesh and other European countries.

"I urge the government to take immediate steps to save the boat to preserve our heritage, and it is going to be a learning process for generations to come," he said. "The boat should be kept in

Kuakata by setting up a museum or at a safe place where tourists can visit it easily. This is going to be a landmark attraction of Kuakata."

acclaimed expert on traditional boats and also managing director for TARATARI Shipyard Ltd at Kalurghat in Chittagong, said the monsoon tides were too high to do anything on the surfaced boat. "We have to wait till November to lift the boat from the sand and start restoration."

On July 11, a team of archaeologists from the Department of Archaeology, Khulna office, examined the boat and declared that the boat was over 200 years old. It is clearly an unusual boat that the first Rakhaine settlers in the area used for fleeing from Myanmar's Arakan province, the team leader said.

On July 24, Amitav Sarker, deputy Marre, an internationally commissioner of Patuakhali, inspected the ancient boat and asked the local authorities to take measures to protect it.

Faruk's father Fazlur Rahman and mother Hasna Hena talked to this correspondent by phone.

On July 8, police submitted a charge sheet against 110 Jamaat-e-Islami and Islami Chhatra Shibir leaders and activists, including Jamaat Ameer Motiur Rahman Nizami, and informed journalists of the charge-sheet on Monday. Fazlur Rahman
