The Bangladesh Football Federation yesterday decided to run a football camp from August 25 in an attempt to prepare the two national teams, U-21 to U-23 squad and U-18 to U-20 squad ahead of their respective international commitments next year.

The decision was taken at the first meeting of the BFF National Teams Committee headed by chairman Kazi Nabil Ahmed at the BFF House as the SA Games is scheduled for December-January in India, AFC Challenge Cup Qualifiers is scheduled for March next year and an U-18 tournament is scheduled for January next year in Russia.

"We will initially call near about 60 players who will, divided into four groups, participate in a competitive tournament in September and afterwards some 30 players will be picked up on the basis of performance of the camp," said Nabil adding that four separate coaches would conduct four different teams.

Ilievski had conducted a similar camp before a tournament which comprised the senior squad, the U-21 and the U-19 squads prior to last year's AFC U-19 tournament at home and SAFF Championship in India. Nabil, also the vice president of BFF,

informed that a squad comprising best performers is likely to be sent to a South Asian nation, probably Sri Lanka to take part in exhibition matches. However he did not clarify whether they will play against clubs or the national side.

"We have been in discussion with Sri Lankan Football Association for exhibition matches and they have all but confirmed hosting such matches," said Nabil.

Nabil also said he would try to appoint a foreign coach in October before the start of the domestic season so that the foreign coach is able to watch the performance of the players in domestic circuit.

The post of the head coach of the national football team has remained vacant for the last seven months since the departure of Macedonian coach Nikola Ilievski in

reporters, the smile only broadened.

"You guys have a talented team. It's just that the players are too impatient," they concluded, hitting the nail on the head.

"Twenty20 cricket," said the other ruefully. "That's were all the money is."

So it was while discussing the gradual death of Test cricket that we were afforded a rare tour of The Pavilion. Built in 1889, The Pavilion is the main survivor of the Victorian era, and it underwent an 8 million pound refurbishment plan in 2005. The Pavilion is home to the player's dressing room and the famous Long Room. It is exclusive to members -- women were not allowed in The Pavilion until 1999 -- and hence seen by few. Players have to walk through the Long Room to get to the middle.

The Long Room is littered with paintings of famous cricketers and administrators dating back from the 18th century. Overseas players hardly feature, with Sir Donald Bradman and Shane Warne the two of only four Australians featured. There is room though for Michael Atherton and even Alec Stewart.

Photography is strictly forbidden in the Long Room. "I work for the MCC and if I said that I could let you take photos, I would be lying," said one of the stewards.

But there is a feeling of history within those four walls. You can almost feel the presence of the players who have walked through this room to play innings at the centre of this iconic ground. Not for nothing did eminent cricket writer Lawrence Booth once call it, "the most evocative four walls in cricket."

Unfortunately, the trek to find the honours board proved futile. The players' dressing room, a restricted territory under the best of circumstances had been taken over by WADA (World Anti-Doping Agency) and hence there was absolutely no chance of an entry. "Event we can't go in," joked the stewards. Not all journeys end fruitfully.

## Usha blank Bima

Usha KC closed the gap with leaders Mohammedan SC in the Green Delta Insurance Premier Division Hockey League when the Old Dhaka outfit blanked Shadharan Bima 4-0 in their Super League encounter at the Maulana Bhasani Hockey Stadium yesterday.

Usha led the first half 2-0, thanks to a second-minute from Pakistani Shahbaz Ali before Moinul Islam Kaushik made it 2-0 five minutes from the break. Shahbaz struck his second goal in the 49th minute while his compatriot Mohammad Imran sealed the victory scoring in the 51st minute.

# Kohli ton seals series

Virat Kohli scored yet another century to take India to a 3-1 series victory against Sri Lanka by winning the fourth ODI of their fivematch series by six wickets at the R Premadasa Stadium in Colombo yesterday.

Chasing a par score of 252 to win, India were in a spot of bother with the score reading 52 for two after the dismissal of Virender Sehwag in the tenth over when Kohli came to the crease. Soon it was 60 for three as struggling batsman Rohit Sharma fell soon after, before Manoj Tiwary went with the score on 109.

That was the last bit of joy for Sri Lanka as India's other in-form batsman Suresh Raina joined forces with Kohli to take the game away from the Lankans. Their unbeaten 146-run fifth-wicket partnership came from only 18.4 overs. Kohli remained unbeaten on 128 off 119 balls with eleven fours and one six while Raina hit an unbeaten 51-ball 58 with the help of four boundaries and one six to take India home with 7.4 overs to spare.

For Sri Lanka Lasith Malinga, Angelo Mathews, Nuwan Pradeep and Jeevan Mendis took a wicket each.

Earlier, part-timer Tiwary grabbed four wickets to help India restrict Sri Lanka to 251-8 after the home side chose to bat first.

The leg-spinner, playing his first match of the series,

The lightweight archer had struggled intensely to cope with the wind. The baying crowd rooting for his opponent must not have helped either, even as Bangladeshi cricketers Mohammad Ashraful and Mosharraf Rubel turned up to cheer on their compatriot. "I told him -- whatever you do, don't miss the board," said a cheeky Ashraful later.

In truth, there was little danger of such affecting Milon. The 20-year old is a talented archer but a lack of international exposure and the alien conditions put paid to his hopes of springing an upset.

"My training does not prepare me for this," said Milon. "If you come to BKSP, you will see where we train. It's like a coop. Wind conditions don't factor at all," he lamented.

It would be too easy to just blame the wind for Bangladesh's latest 'failure' but the blustery conditions certainly did not make it any easier for Milon.

"The wind almost blew me off my feet," he said, perhaps a bit dramatically. But it was easy to imagine the young man of slight frame being swayed somewhat by the conditions. And plus, with archery, even millimetres matter.

To give him some credit, Milon kept pace

with Godfrey in the first set, but by the time the last shots were being doled out in the third, the Briton was miles ahead.

"He is a good lad," Godfrey said later. "I am an old man. I have been shooting arrows 27 years. He isn't even 27," said Godfrey summing up the event. Milon though seemed extremely dis-

traught at the result. "I was hoping for better," he said. "My target was to be amongst the top ten in the world." Those are heady words but Milon, who was

once ranked top in the world in the youth levels, was vehement that it was possible. "Bangladeshis can do everything.

believe in that. I wish we had better training facilities. What if we could practice at the Bangabandhu Stadium or even in Cox's Bazar? We could have been better prepared."

In the end though, Milon's story is similar to perhaps all the other Olympic athletes from Bangladesh. Much has been made of Bangladesh being the most populous nation to never have won a gold in the Olympics. But if we are indeed to achieve that seemingly impossible goal, the focus first needs to be on helping athletes like Milon qualify. It is easy to forget that we haven't even achieved that yet.


