## Annan bows out amid raging violence

Rebels bombard airbase in Aleppo as regime forces kill dozens in Damascus raids

International envoy Kofi Annan is stepping down, UN chief Ban Ki-moon announced yesterday "with deep regret," as his April peace plan for Syria in tatters in the face of raging violence.

Rebels shelled an air base used by regime forces to pound the northern city of Aleppo.

And in Damascus, government forces launched two operations to root out rebel activists on Wednesday, killing at least 70, the opposition has said.

Troops reportedly went from house to house demanding to see people's papers. Activists say the soldiers summarily executed many of their victims.

Syrian state TV said "dozens of terrorists" surrendered or were killed in the operation.

The UN chief paid tribute to Annan for his efforts in the "most difficult" assignment of ending the bloodshed that human rights monitors say has claimed more than 20,000 lives in Syria since an uprising erupted in March last year.

But he said the former UN chief would now step down at the end of the month and the search had begun for a successor.

"I wish to express my deepest gratitude to Mr Annan for the determined and courageous efforts he has made as the Joint Special Envoy for Syria," Ban said.

"Kofi Annan deserves our profound

admiration for the selfless way in which he has put his formidable skills and prestige to this most difficult and potentially thankless of assignments," he added.

The UN and Arab League named Annan as its envoy on the Syria conflict on February 23 and he brokered a six-point peace plan that was supposed to begin with a ceasefire from April 12.

But the truce never took hold and the United Nations has begun winding down

against President Bashar al-Assad's rule an observer mission that was supposed to oversee it ahead of the expiry of its mandate later this month.

killed yesterday -- 30 civilians, 11 soldiers and 10 rebels, said the Observatory, which has estimated that more than 20,000 people have died since mid-March last year.

Meanwhile, Russian President Vladimir Putin and British premier David Cameron failed to hide their differences on the Syrian crisis before the two leaders watched the Olympic judo together on Putin's first visit to Britain for seven years.

Britain has strongly criticised Russia's repeated blocking of any threat of UN sanctions against the Assad regime. Moscow has accused Western governments of bias towards the rebels.

The UN General Assembly will vote on a largely symbolic Arab-drafted resolution today calling on Assad to stand down.

Three million of Syria's 22 million people need food, crops and livestock assistance, the UN's Food and Agriculture Organisation said, citing a survey by the United Nations and the Syrian government.

The FAO said figure included 1.5 million Syrians who "need urgent and immediate food assistance over the next three to six months, especially in areas that have seen the greatest conflict and population displacement."

#### Afghan forces foil Kabul attack; 5 killed

Afghan security forces killed five insurgents and wounded one during a pre-dawn raid in Kabul yesterday, with authorities saying they had thwarted a mass attack and captured intelligence pointing to the militant Haqqani network.



## Assange would face India probes death penalty in US

Fears his mother



The mother of WikiLeaks founder Julian Assange, who is lobbying Ecuador to grant him asylum, says she is worried her son could face execution if extradited to the United States.

Christine Assange met Wednesday with President Rafael Correa, who is consider-

ing whether to grant political asylum to Assange.

The Australian campaigner took refuge in the Ecuadoran embassy in London in mid-June to avoid extradition to Sweden. Swedish investigators want Assange to answer questions about allegations of rape and sexual assault made by two women in August 2010 after WikiLeaks began releasing classified US documents.

Christine Assange echoed her son's fears that Sweden would extradite him to the United States to face charges for releasing masses of US military and diplomatic documents into the public domain.

"The US government feels that it can seek to try my son for espionage, and possibly executing him simply for doing the job of a good investigative journalist, which is telling the truth about power," she said in an interview with AFP at the Carondelet presidential palace after she met with Correa.

The United States has opened a criminal investigation into the leaks and is prosecuting US army private Bradley Manning in a military court. But it has not said whether it intends to bring charges against Assange as well.

#### series of blasts in Pune

Federal anti-terror agents joined local police in the western Indian city of Pune yesterday to probe a series of low-intensity blasts the night before when the new home minister had been due to visit.

The four explosives went off in succession beginning shortly after 7:30pm on Wednesday, targeting a bustling restaurant and shopping area in the town in central Maharashtra state and injuring one person.

National security and forensic teams arrived in Pune early yesterday and were examining two unexploded devices, Home Secretary RK Singh told reporters.

"Even though the blasts were very small, the fact that they happened in a onekilometre area and went off in a 40 minute period shows that there was planning behind it," he said.

He said investigators were looking at possible "terror links" to the blasts.

## US hails progress in China slams Syria Uprising talks with Pakistan

The US commander in Afghanistan yesterday said that "significant progress" was being made in improving cooperation with Pakistan, after his first visit since Islamabad ended a blockade on Nato supplies.

The talks between General John Allen and General Ashfag Kayani focused on improving security along the border between Afghanistan and Pakistan, and cooperation between Afghan, Pakistani and Nato troops, said a statement released by both sides.

"I look forward to these visits and am pleased with the upward spiral in our relationship they represent," Allen said.

"We are making significant progress toward building a partnership that is enduring, strategic, carefully defined and that enhances the security and prosperity of the region. Allen's visit is a further sign of efforts to repair the fractious

anti-terror alliance with Pakistan, which plunged to its worst crisis after US air strikes killed 24 Pakistani soldiers and American troops killed Osama bin Laden in Pakistan last year.

Both sides signed a deal Tuesday governing Nato convoys travelling through Pakistan into Afghanistan until the end of 2015. Kayani was quoted as saying that yesterday's meeting had

helped towards improving strategic and operational understanding between the Pakistan military and ISAF," using the acronym for the Nato mission in Afghanistan. The statement made no mention of the specific problems

and difficulties that have increasingly characterised relations between Afghan, Pakistani and Nato troops.

Lieutenant General Zaheer ul-Islam, the chief of Pakistan's spy agency, is also currently in the United States, the first visit by a head of the Inter-Services Intelligence agency to Washington in a year.

#### US over Iran sanctions

Beijing reacted furiously Wednesday to new US sanctions imposed on a Chinese bank over transactions with Iran, urging Washington to revoke them and saying would lodge an official pro-

China's foreign ministry urged the United States to lift the sanctions on the Bank of Kunlun, which it said violated the "norms of international relations' and damaged relations between Beijing and Washington.

US President Barack Obama on Tuesday imposed new economic sanctions on Iran's oil export sector and on a pair of Chinese and Iraqi banks accused of doing business with Tehran.

In a statement, China's foreign ministry expressed "strong dissatisfaction and firm opposition" to the US move, called it "groundless" and said it would officially protest the decision.

## Hopes fade as crisis turns into proxy war

Regional powers are pouring in money and guns, jihadists are joining rebels battling to overthrow Bashar al-Assad, while his own well-armed but hard-pressed forces are fighting back ruthlessly with combat aircraft and artillery. Gruesome scenes of slaughtered civilians or executed rebel

fighters provide daily snapshots of the worsening conflict in Syria. Video apparently showing rebels gunning down Assad militiamen in cold blood suggests the insurgents are capable of brutality to match their enemies. After almost 17 months of revolt against the Assad dictator-

ship, Syria's conflict is turning into a regional proxy war

between Sunni and Shia Islam that could splinter the country along sectarian lines unless a unified rebel leadership emerges as a credible opposition to the beleaguered government. Few observers of Syria see any sign of an opposition ready to

run the country if or when Assad and his clan, whose power base lies in the esoteric Shia sect of Syria's Alawite minority, lose overall control. With the Shia Islamic Republic of Iran behind Assad, and

Saudi Arabia and other Sunni Muslim states backing the rebels, Syria could become the arena in which the regional Sunni-Shia cold war becomes an open-ended civil war with the potential to destabilise its neighbours - Lebanon, Turkey, Iraq and Jordan.
