England fight back Smith's wicket was the first success for England in six hours and two minutes of play, during which 497 runs were scored, 377 of them in an unbeaten third wicket partnership between Amla and Kallis in south London last week.

After a wicketless morning, played in partly cloudy weather with sunny spells, the bowlers looked more dangerous as clouds rolled in and the light faded after lunch. Rain stopped play as the last over before tea was about to be bowled.

England had earlier endured a frustrating morning during which both opening batsmen had escapes against England's all-seam attack.

Petersen was dropped at second slip off Anderson when he had 29, with Cook -in the slips in the absence of dropped off-spinner Graeme Swann -- putting down a straightforward chance just below waist height.

Three balls earlier Petersen edged Anderson at catchable height between third slip and gully for four.

In the next over fast bowler Steven Finn, who replaced Swann, was denied a wicket when Smith, on six, edged him to England captain Andrew Strauss at first slip.

But umpire Steve Davis had called "dead ball" because Finn broke the stumps at the bowler's end with his right knee.

It was the fourth time Finn's knee made contact with the stumps but the first time the umpire intervened. There were four further "dead ball" calls against Finn, with two of them denying boundaries for Smith.

'bo' calls Phelps!

US President Barack Obama decided a personal tweet to Michael Phelps wasn't enough, so he surprised the US Olympic swimming star with a personal phone call at the London Games.

"The craziest thing was just when I answered the phone and they were like, 'Michael?' And I said: 'Yes'.

"And they said: 'Please hold for the President of the United States' and I was, like, 'OK!'"

Phelps, whose perfect eight-gold campaign in Beijing had already given him the most gold medals of any Olympian, added a new line to his legend as he surpassed Soviet gymnast Larisa Latynina's record of 18 career medals with a silver and a gold on Tuesday night that took his total to 19.

Obama offered his congratulations via social networking site Twitter in a tweet signed with his initials "bo' to indicate he composed it personally, and followed up with a phone call.

"He just got on and was saying how everyone is supporting me and is behind me at home and how proud everyone is of me," Phelps said. "That was pretty cool. And he finished by saying 'make sure you tell your mom I said hi'," added Phelps, whose mother, Debbie, is a staunch supporter and fan.

"It was a good call, Phelps said.

Sagar, Taibur Serena, Novak in semis

To complement her booming serve and slingshot returns, Serena Williams tried a lefthanded forehand Thursday at the Olympics.

She lost that rally but won most of the other points, beating former No. 1 Caroline Wozniacki of Denmark 6-0, 6-3 to reach the semifinals at Wimbledon.

Williams, seeking the first singles medal

of her career, has lost only 13 games through four rounds. She'll face top-ranked Victoria Azarenka of Belarus on Friday for a berth in the final. Playing on sun-splashed Court 1, Wil-

liams swept the first seven games against the No. 8-seeded Wozniacki. Williams kept one exchange going with a desperation, offbalance left-handed shot.

"I haven't practiced it in a couple of months," she said. "I wish I could have hit it better."

Otherwise, Williams stuck to the basics. She lost only nine points on her serve, never faced a break point and hit 30 winners to seven for Wozniacki.

"I felt a little off today, believe it or not," Williams said. "But I'm really, really hard to please."

Williams has won 11 consecutive matches this summer at the All England Club, including her fifth Wimbledon title a month ago. Azarenka beat No. 7 Angelique Kerber of

Germany 6-4, 7-5 under the Centre Court

roof. Kerber eliminated Venus Williams on Wednesday, but Azarenka feasted on the left-hander's serve, winning more than half of those points and breaking six times.

Serbia's Novak Djokovic set up an Olympic semifinal showdown with Andy Murray after beating French fifth seed Jo-Wilfried Tsonga 6-1, 7-5 on Thursday.

Djokovic is bidding to win his first Olympic gold medal after taking home a bronze from the 2008 Games in Beijing and he remains firmly in the hunt after seeing off the big-serving Tsonga on Wimbledon's Centre Court.

British hopeful Murray also won his quarterfinal, delighting a Court 1 crowd that featured Prince William and wife Kate. Murray, seeded No. 3, became the first men's semifinalist by beating No. 11 Nicolas Almagro of Spain, 6-4, 6-1.

Murray hit 15 aces to one for Almagro and never faced a break point. He had 29 winners and just seven unforced errors.

Americans Bob and Mike Bryan advanced to doubles semifinals by edging Jonathan Erlich and Andy Ram of Israel, 7-6 (4), 7-6 (10). Neither team managed a service break, and the Bryans sealed the victory on their fourth match point when Erlich doublefaulted into the net.

The twins, who are top-seeded, won the bronze in 2008. Both are also entered in mixed doubles.

The United States was the only nation to still have an entry in all five events of singles and doubles.

Fixing report due Monday

The Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) will make public the investigation report on a suspicious Bangladesh Premier League encounter between Brothers Union and Rahmatganj MFS on Monday, but both the alleged clubs are likely to be let off the hook due to lack of evidence. The announcement came yesterday after the BFF profes-

sional football league committee opened the five-page sealed report which was submitted on Wednesday by the Fixed-Match Identification Committee (FMIC), headed by Bangladesh Rural Development Board chairman Humayun Khalid, two and a half months after the start of the investigation.

"We officially opened the investigation report and saw it but we need to go into the details. So we will sit again on Saturday and make it public on Monday," said BFF senior vice president and chairman of the league committee Abdus Salam Murshedy yesterday. Having assured disclosure of all things in the investigative

report, Murshedy said that the FMIC have given their opinions and recommendations regarding the alleged fixed match and the league committee will give a decision based on those.

The FMIC first inspected video footage of the suspicious match played on April 25 2012 as well as other matches involving the two teams, newspaper articles of the match in question, and reviewed the report that penalised Sheikh Jamal Dhanmondi Club and Rahmatganj Muslim Friends Society for a 'compromised' match in 2011. Before drawing a conclusion they sought the opinion of an expert, BFF director BA Jubair Nipu who was appointed by the board. It has been learnt that the final report was based on his

expert view, which had found nothing wrong with the match in question. However, earlier in the investigative process Jubair expressed in the media that he thought there was something fishy about the match between Brothers Union and Rahmatganj. As per the bylaws, the decision of the BFF professional

league committee concerning the fixed match is final and binding.

If any match is proven to be fixed, the result and points of that match will be forfeited or nullified and additional six points will be deducted from the earned points of the teams concerned as per the bylaws.

SA stuns the favourites for rowing gold AFP, London

South Africa stunned favourites Great Britain and Denmark to claim their first ever Olympic rowing gold medal in the lightweight men's four on Thursday in front of a 25,000 crowd. All eyes were on the host

nation to follow up Wednesday's gold in the women's pairs, and Denmark, champions at the Beijing Games four years ago. But the South Africa four -

James Thompson, Matthew Brittain, John Smith and Sizwe Ndlovu -- gatecrashed their party in gripping fashion. The 29-year-old Ndlovu,

who took up the sport at school in 1997, told AFP of the enormity of winning South Africa's first Olympic rowing title.

"It was nuts," agreed Ryan Lochte, moments after he had vanquished the greatest Olympian of all time in the semifinal heats. So did Adrian who could hardly contain his joy at having

Adrian awaits many rewards. As for the Australians, their heartbreak continued into the last race of the night.

Allison Schmitt chased down Alicia Coutts to give the Americans gold in the 4x200 freestyle relay. Schmitt dived in the water about a half-second behind, but passed Coutts on the first return lap and won going away in 7:42.92. The Australians settled for another silver in 7:44.41, while France took the bronze.

Coupled with Stephanie Rice's failure to bag a single medal after her three in Beijing, London is rapidly turning into a nightmare for the Australians in the pool.

The Australians have come to expect the swimming competition to start the country's Olympic campaign off with a bang. Since Sydney in 2000 gold medals have come thick and fast for them, courtesy of some of the greatest swimmers of all time such as Ian Thorpe, Kieren Perkins and Grant Hackett. But these Olympics have been a reality check. Not since 1976 has the team failed to win an individual gold medal in the pool.

United States and South Korea lead the way on two golds apiece. China have won One newspaper summed it up best: "Weapons of mass the most medals overall. destruction are now weapons of mass deflation."

3rd judo gold for Russia

Russia's Tagir Khaibulaev beat the defending champion Tuvshinbayar Naidan of Mongolia to win the men's under-100kg Olympic judo title on Thursday.

Fighting in front of Russian president Vladimir Putin, Khaibulaev claimed his country's third gold medal of the judo competition with an unstoppable seoi-nage (shoulder throw).

Dutchman Henk Grol and German Dimitri Peters won the two bronze medals, beating Uzbek Ramziddin Sayidov and Hwang Hee-Tae of South Korea respectively. Shakib
