Earthquake jolts Sylhet region

UNB, Sylhet

A light earthquake measuring 4.3 on the Richter scale jolted Sylhet region yesterday.

The earthquake was felt at 12:36pm in Sylhet. The epicentre of the quake was along Indo-Bangla border, about 185km north-east from Dhaka, said regional Met Office and Seismic Observatory Centre sources.

There was no immediate report of damage or casualties.

Cellphones worth Tk 50 lakh seized in Ctg

Customs officials seized 450 mobile phone sets worth around Tk 50 lakh from the luggage of two expatriates at Hazrat Shah Amanat International Airport in Chittagong city yesterday morning.

The expatriates are Kamal Uddin, 26, of Sitakunda upazila in Chittagong, and Imranul Islam, 40, of Feni.

The cell phone sets were seized from their possession as they did not pay the customs duties for them, said the airport customs house Assistant Commissioner Mohammad Shahidul Islam.

Worker dies from electrocution

A garment worker was killed and two others were injured in electrocution in Chittagong early Saturday.

The deceased was Md Rubel, 25, while the injured were Atik, 25 and Ansar, 18. They were employees at Asian Washing, a garment factory, at Monsurabad area in Chittagong city.

Kazi Imran, an executive of the factory, said Rubel, a washing machine operator, got an electric shock when he tried to switch the machine on around 1:00pm.

The victims were rushed to Chittagong Medical College Hospital where doctors declared Rubel dead, police said.

CCC seeks Tk 2,000cr from UNCDF

Chittagong City Corporation (CCC) has sought Tk 2,000 crore as loan from United Nation Capital Development Fund (UNCDF) to implement its projects.

Domestic help 'tortured to death' Employers held

A domestic help was allegedly tortured to death by her employers in Pallabi area of the capital yesterday.

The deceased is Halima 12, daughter of Moslem Shikdar of Faridpur.

Police arrested the employers Imran Khondakar, a transpor businessman, and his wife Sheuly Begum.

Pallabi police said many parts of Halima's body, including back of the head and ears, carried marks of injuries and burns.

Abdul Latif Sheikh, officer-in-charge of the police station, told The Daily Star that Imran tried to remove the body. "When he (Imran) came

out of his apartment building early yesterday with a heavy sack, a security guard named Yakub asked him what was inside the sack. As Imran replied that there were motor parts, the security guard wanted to check it out," he added.

Imran did not allow the guard to do so and returned to his apartment, said the OC adding, the guard, later, shared it to locals who informed police of the matter.

Police recovered the body from a cot in the flat on the third floor of the building.

Neighbours alleged the couple used to torture the servant, said police.

Imran admitted that his wife often beat up the girl, the OC said.

The body was sent to Dhaka Medical College Hospital morgue for autopsy.

Morgue sources said Halima died from internal bleeding as she was hit on her chest.

India to ratify land boundary deal soon

Jairam Ramesh tells prime minister

Visiting Indian Minister for Rural Development Jairam Ramesh yesterday assured Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina of ratification of the Land Boundary Agreement 1974 and its protocol in the Indian parliament as soon as possible.

The Indian minister, who is now in Dhaka to attend an international seminar, gave the assurance when he met the prime minister at her official residence Gono Bhaban.

As the prime minister stressed the need for early ratification of the agreement and protocol, the Indian minister assured that the two instruments would be ratified in the Indian parliament very soon, PM's Press Secretary Abul Kalam Azad said.

Demarcation of land boundary between Bangladesh and India and exchange of the areas of adverse possession are crucial for a satisfactory resolution and implementation of the decisions taken during the visit of the Indian prime minister to Dhaka in September last year, Sheikh Hasina said. Abul Kalam Azad said Jairam Ramesh

urged the industrial entrepreneurs of Bangladesh to invest in the north-eastern states of India. Sheikh Hasina hoped that all pending

issues between Bangladesh and India would be resolved at an early date as both countries have domestic political compulsions. Some choices were difficult, but we have

taken several bold decisions on relations with India, she said.

BIRDEM BANGABANDHU PARISHAD Journos offered money for 'conveyance'

LIBERATION WAR People must recall Bangabandhu's role

Says Prof Anisuzzaman

Denying that Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman was the leader of the country's Liberation War is more dreadful than his killing, said noted educationist Prof Emeritus Anisuzzaman yesterday.

"The propaganda against Bangabandhu and the denial of his contribution to the Liberation War by a section of people after his killing are more outrageous," he said at a discussion.

Bangabandhu Parishad and Swadhinata Chikitsak Parishad of Birdem hospital unit jointly organised the discussion on National Mourning Day marking the 37th martyrdom of Bangabandhu at the hospital's auditorium.

Addressing as the chief guest at the programme, Prof Anisuzzaman also said people of all walks of life had took part in the Liberation War and the country's recon-

struction after independence under the

leadership of Bangabandhu.

People must recall the contributions of Bangabandhu to be respectful to the history, he said adding that following the ideology of the great leader and committing crimes cannot go together.

The criminals who were involved in committing crimes against humanity during the liberation war must be tried to establish the rule of law in the country, said Prof Anisuzzaman.

Cherishing the spirit of Liberation War and the Bangabandhu's ideology can be recalled by recognising his contributions to the nation, said Liberation War Museum trustee Dr Sarowar Ali.

Birdem hospital unit Bangabandhu Parishad president Prof Mir Nazrul Islam chaired the function, while Prof AK Azad Khan, president of Diabetic Association of Bangladesh, Awami Legaue leader Abu Naser, among others, also spoke on the occasion.

GRAFT CASE AGAINST MOUDUD Dispose of rule by Oct 7

SC asks HC

The Supreme Court (SC) yesterday directed the High Court (HC) to hear and dispose of by October 7 a rule issued on the legality of proceedings of a corruption case filed against former BNP law minister Moudud Ahmed.

The Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) filed the case with Gulshan Police Station on September 16, 2007, saying that Moudud amassed wealth worth more than Tk 7.38 crore through illegal means and concealed information about wealth worth more than Tk 4.4 crore from the commission.

Following a petition submitted by Moudud, the HC on January 29 this year stayed the proceedings of the case and issued a rule upon the ACC and government to explain why the proceedings of the case should not be quashed.

Later, the ACC in February filed a leave to appeal petition with the SC against the HC order.

A seven-member bench of the Appellate Division of SC headed by Chief Justice Md Muzammel Hossain, yesterday ordered for disposal of the HC rule after hearing the ACC's petition.

An HC bench led by Justice Musa Khaled will hear and dispose of the rule, according to the SC order.

Concern over 'communal conspiracy' expressed

Leaders of Samprodayekata-Jangibad Birodhi Mancha (anti-communalism and anti-militancy platform) yesterday expressed concern over conspiracy of creating communal conflicts by a section of people in the country.
