# Brazil scrape thru'

GB out on penalties

Brazil stayed on course for a first Olympic football gold medal but only after a nervy 3-2 win over a Honduras side reduced to nine men saw

Leandro Damiao equalised for Brazil after Mario Martinez put Honduras ahead. Roger Espinoza then restored the Central Americans' lead.

However, Neymar brought Brazil level again from the penalty spot before Internacional striker Damiao scored his second at Newcastle's St James' Park.

Honduras gave Brazil, five-times world champions but never Olympic gold medallists, a huge scare despite having midfielder Wilmer Cristiano sent off with just 32 minutes gone for a second bookable offence, with Espinoza collecting his second yellow card just before the final whistle.

Brazil will now face South Korea, who beat hosts Great Britain 5-4 in penalty shootout, in the semfinal at Manchester United's Old Trafford ground on Tuesday.

This was Great Britain's first men's Olympic football tournament for more than 50 years which ended in familiar fashion with Daniel Studrridge missing a penalty.

After extra-time failed to separate the sides, who'd finished all square at 1-1 at the end of 90 minutes, it was the Koreans who held their nerve to win the shoot-out 5-4.

And even though Manchester United and Wales great Ryan Giggs, playing in his first major international tournament smashed home his penalty to give Britain a 4-3 lead, a

hesitant Sturridge, stuttering in his run-up, saw his spot-kick blocked.

Ji Dong-Won gave South Korea a 29th minute lead with a swerving shot.

Then came two penalties for Britain, with Welshman Aaron Ramsey scoring one and seeing keeper Jung Sung-Ryong, who was injured later, saving the other.

Japan stayed on course for an Olympic football double as their men's team joined the women's side in reaching the semifinals following a 3-0 win over 10-man Egypt on Saturday. Goals from Kensuke Nagai, captain Maya

Yoshida and Yuki Otsu took Japan through against an Egypt side who played more than half the match a man down after defender Saadeldin Saad was sent off in the 41st minute. Japan will play Mexico in the semifinals after the Central Americans survived a

dramatic fightback by Senegal to win 4-2 in extra-time. Senegal came from 2-0 behind at

London's Wembley Stadium, in front of a crowd of more than 81,000. Mexico went ahead in the 10th minute when Jorge Enriquez headed in a free-kick

and made it 2-0 just after the hour through Javier Aquino. Moussa Konate, the tournament's top scorer, pulled a goal back in the 69th minute,

for his fifth goal this Olympics. And seven minutes later it substitute

Ibrahima Balde's header made it 2-2. In extra-time Giovani dos Santos restored

Mexico's lead before Hector Herrera, who will miss the semifinal through suspension, headed into an empty net.

### Dutch women in semis

Defending champions the Netherlands moved into the semifinals of the Olympic women's hockey tournament on Saturday by defeating South Korea 3-2 for their fourth successive victory.

The Dutch were made to work hard by South Korea before taking their tally to 12 points from four matches to head Pool A.

In the same group, China came back into the chase for semifinals with a 2-1 victory that stopped Great Britain's winning spree. The day finished with those three teams

locked on nine points and Germany who have still to play New Zealand, three points adrift after losing 3-1 to Argentina.

However, Argentina -- who play Australia on Monday -- have comfortably the best goal difference of the top three.

South Korea's Cheon Seul Ki converted two penalty corners to trouble the Dutch, who got all their goals in open play.

Cheon opened the scoring by sending a drag-flick into the top corner in the fifth minute, but the Dutch were back on level

terms in the 10th minute on Kelly Jonker's reverse deflection of captain Maartje Paumen's shot.

Ellen Hogg open field strike four minutes later gave Netherlands the lead and Carlien Dirkse van den Heuvel made it 3-1 one minute after half-time.

Cheon pulled another goal back from a penalty corner in the 64th minute

But it was China who seized control of the game through penalty corner conversions by Fu Baorong in the 41st minute and Zhao Yudiao six minutes later.

Crista Cullen pulled a goal back for Britain on a penalty corner one minute from full-time. Australia rode on Jade Close's early field

goal to beat South Africa 1-0 in Pool B and set the target in the group with nine points from four matches. Argentina maintained their recent

supremacy over Germany with a 3-1 win in the day's last game. Early goals by Sofia Maccari and captain

Luciana Aymar, set the tone for Argentina's third win out of four games.

# One final golden splash

pool. "It's tough to put into words right now," Phelps said. "I did everything I wanted to do.

"I finished my career the way I wanted to, and I don't care what anyone says, if I can say that, it's all that matters."

With the US men unbeaten in the 4x100m medley relay in Olympic competition, the race was a coronation for the man Serbian swimmer Milorad Cavic called "the king".

But breaststroke star Kosuke Kitajima added some drama to the occasion, seizing a narrow lead for Japan by the time Phelps dived in for the butterfly leg behind US backstroker Matt Grevers and breaststroke swimmer Brendan Hansen.

Takeshi Matsuda maintained Japan's advantage at the 50m mark of the fly, but Phelps delivered a classic final lap to seize the lead for the Americans and 100m free gold medallist Nathan Adrian was untouchable in sealing the victory in 3:29.35.

"It is one of the funniest ways to do it," Phelps said of closing out his

career with a relay.

"Being able to step up with these four guys and continue this streak is important to us.

"I just said before we went out, we've got to want to win, let's just go out and do it," Phelps said. Their smile-filled medal

ceremony was followed by a special presentation to Phelps, who received FINA's lifetime achievement trophy and walked one last victory lap round the pool.

"I have achieved everything I wanted," Phelps said. "If you can say that about your career, there is no need to look forward. Time to move on to other things."

In what he had vowed was his final race, the four-time Olympian took his career medals tally to 22. The 18 gold include the stunning eight gold in eight events he won in Beijing four years ago, and he also owns two silver and two bronze.

Although Phelps wasn't the same

swimmer he was in Beijing, he said he'd treasure his memories of London. "The memories from this week

will never go away," he said. China's Sun Yang offered a

worthy curtain-raiser to Phelps' finale as he shrugged off a heart-inmouth moment at the start to destroy the field and win the 1,500m freestyle gold in a world record time, and America's 4x100m medley women also won in a world record.

Sun shook off a heart-in-mouth "I am feeling sort of emotional, moment at the start, when he

slipped and hit the water as the other swimmers stood up before the

start.

He wasn't charged with a false start that would have ended his night, and after the public

address announcer instructed the crowd to maintain silence, a seemingly shaken Sun joined the rest of the field in returning to the blocks and powered to a win in 14:31.02, bettering the previous world record he set last year at the world championships in Shanghai.

"I thought I was going to be disqualified," admitted Sun, who said he couldn't hear the starter properly over the crowd noise.

"I didn't expect the false start and

disqualified," added the swimmer who beat the water in joy before breaking down in tears upon seeing the result on the scoreboard.

Once away, Sun was never challenged as he became the seventh man, and the first since Russian distance freestyle great Vladimir Salnikov in 1980, to win both the 400m free and 1500m free at the same Olympics. Sun's triumph in the 400m free

last Saturday made him the first male swimmer from China to claim Olympic gold and he earned silver in the 200m free. More than eight seconds back,

Canadian Ryan Cochrane took silver in 14:39.63 and Beijing champion Oussama Mellouli earned bronze in 14:40.31.

The US quartet of Missy Franklin, Rebecca Soni, Dana Vollmer and Allison Schmitt won the women's 4x100m medley relay in a world

record of 3:52.05. Franklin, 17, claimed her fourth gold of the Games as part of the formidable line-up. She, Vollmer and Soni had all set individual world

records here. Dutch speedster Ranomi Kromowidjojo posted an Olympic record of 24.05sec to win the women's 50m free, completing a 50m-100m freestyle double ahead of Aliaksandra Herasimenia of Belarus (24.28) and Dutch team-

mate Marleen Veldhuis (24.39).

#### Chinese clean-sweep in badminton

China's Cai Yun and Fu Haifeng sealed the first ever clean-sweep of all five Olympic badminton titles when they won the men's doubles final on Sunday.

Cai and Fu beat thirdseeded Danes Mathias Boe and Carsten Mogensen 21-16, 21-15, atoning for their disappointment at losing the 2008 Olympic final. China has already won the men's and women's singles, women's doubles and

## Jin's golden pistol double

South Korea's Jin Jong-Oh completed an Olympic pistol shooting double Sunday, winning the men's 50m pistol gold eight days after his triumph in the 10m pistol.

The 32-year-old sharpshooter amassed 662 total points to lead a South Korean one-two ahead of Choi Young-Rae, who finished with 661.5 points.

China's Wang Zhiwei took bronze with 658.6 points.


Jin was lying in fifth place after the morning qualifying dominated by Choi, while world number one Damir Mikec of Serbia failed to earn a spot in the final as he finished 16th in the first phase.

Jin, winner of the 2008 50m pistol title at Beijing took his tally of Olympic gold medals to three, with two silver from the 10m at Beijing and 50m at Athens in 2004.

He became the first shooter to repeat as 50m pistol gold medallist.

## Gelana wins marathon

Priscah Jeptoo, part of a Kenyan contingent eyeing a medals sweep after last year's one-two-three at the world championships in South Korea, took the nation's third consecutive silver in the event, five seconds behind Gelana.

Russia's Tatyana Petrova Arkhipova collected the bronze in 2:23:29.

Gelana, who ran the second fastest time of 2012 in this year's Rotterdam marathon, took charge of the race in the closing stages and 2011 world silver medallist Jeptoo did not have the strength to match her. The fancied Mary Keitany, who has won the past two

London marathons, was long part of the leading pack but slipped off the pace shortly before the 41-kilometre mark.
