#### Two electrocuted in capital

Two persons, including a woman, were electrocuted in the capital's Purba Badda and Naya Nagar Badda areas yesterday.

In Burba Badda, a woman was electrocuted while she was hanging a clothe on a clothesline which came in contact with an electric wire at her residence around 7:00am.

The victim, Achhia Begum, 48, wife of Mojnu Mollah, was taken to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) where the doctors pronounced her dead.

In Naya Nagar Badda, a construction worker came in contact with an electric wire while he was taking a bath near an electric water motor at around 1:00pm.

The worker, Abdur Rahim, 22, was declared dead

#### Expatriate 'kills himself' in Ctg

#### Wi-Fi in Rajshahi city soon

## Dhaka gets \$12.5m Rab arrests WB climate fund

The World Bank (WB) will provide US\$ 12.5 million to Bangladesh as grant to support communities in increasing resilience to the impacts of climate change.

To this effect, Economic Relations Division (ERD) Additional Secretary Arastoo Khan and acting head of WB Dhaka office Christine Kimes signed an agreement at NEC-II conference room in the capital yesterday.

The project will channel funds to NGOimplemented sub-projects to build the capacity of communities to increase their resilience to flood, drought and saline water intrusion risks through the implementation of community-based climate change adaptation activities.

This is the first and lone project to be financed by the Bangladesh Climate Change Resilience Fund (BCCRF).

The BCCRF has two windows - 90 percent of its funds are allocated to public sector projects, while 10 percent of the funds will be channeled through NGOs.

The governing council of BCCRF designated Palli Karma-Sahayak Foundation (PKSF) to be the implementing agency for the NGO window, and it will manage the US\$ 12.5 million grant for the Community Climate Change Project.

Speaking on the occasion, Christine Kimes said the project has the potential of fundamentally changing the lives of thousands of people by reducing their vulnerability to climate change risks.

# six robbers

Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) arrested six people, allegedly members of a gang that drugs and then robs people, from the capital's Mohakhali, Abdullahpur, and Bhogra bypass in Gazipur early yesterday.

The arrestees are Habibur Rahman, 40, Shamim Hossain 28, Moklesur Rahman, 36, Shahidul Islam, 22, Madhu Akand 38, and Saiful Islam, 32.

Ahmed Ullah Alam Mazumdar, captain of Rab-1, said

acting on a tip-off, a team of Rab-1 led by Lt Commander Daud Kawsar Mahmud detained Habibur at Mohakhali kitchen market around 12:30am. Following information extracted from him, Rab person-

nel rescued two victims, still unconscious, from the area and sent them to Dhaka Medical College Hospital. Later, Rab personnel caught the other five of the gang

from the city's Abdullahpur, and Bhogra bypass in separate drives that ended around 7:00am.

Rab also recovered drugs used to make people unconscious.

#### Caab driver held with smuggled drugs

Police arrested a driver of Civil Aviation Authority of Bangladesh (Caab) with smuggled medicines worth about Tk 10 lakh from the capital's Dakkhinkhan yesterday.

Atiqur Rahman, senior ASP of Airport Armed Police Battalion (AAPBn), said AAPBn personnel took position at the entrance of cargo godown of Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport.

When a microbus with the medicines came out from the godown around 2:30am, police asked its

driver to halt it. But the driver fled the airport with the microbus. Later, police chased the microbus and halted it in Dakkhinkhan area around

3:00am. They caught microbus driver Ali Hossain, also a driver of the civil aviation authority, and seized the

medicines. Others members of the gang managed to flee the

#### Enforcement of house rent control act

With a 15-point demand, including enforcement of Premises Rent Control Act, 1991, National Tenants' Council staged a sit-in and conducted a mass signature collection campaign in front of Jatiya Press Club in the capital yesterday.

The other demands include formation of a high-powered commission to regulate house rent, taking necessary steps to place a bill in parliament to hold a discussion on house rent and making it compulsory for landlords to provide receipts to tenants.

The signatories numbered over 1,000 and the council would start collecting more signatures from those who express solidarity with the demands from around the capital from September 1, said the council General Secretary Meer Mofazzel Hossain.

#### Young woman found dead

Says Sust VC

## Halting militancy needs equality-based society

Says Farooq Sobhan

Halting the proliferation of militancy requires a society to be free from inequality, deprivation, suppression and poverty, said Farooq Sobhan yesterday.

Lack of the rule of law, violations of human rights, ethnic, national and religious discrimination, political exclusion, socio-economic marginalisation and lack of good governance also contribute to create conditions conducive to the spread of terrorism, he added.

Farooq Sobhan, president and CEO of Bangladesh Enterprise Institute, was presenting a keynote at an international conference, "People's Empowerment and Development", in the capital's Ruposhi Bangla Hotel.

People should be empowered through the mitigation of critical domestic issues like poverty, inequality, deprivation and exclusion, he said, adding that Bangladesh wit-

nessed a rise in Islamist militancy between 1999 and 2005.

The counter-terrorism strategy in Bangladesh includes law enforcement and intelligence agencies, the judiciary, relevant stakeholders of the government, the media and civil society, added Farooq Sobhan.

Senior Secretary CQK Mustaq Ahmed said local militants had no links with international militant organisations. Militancy or terrorism can be created

based on a wide range of issues like religion and politics backed by insurgency and criminalisation, he added. He said there is a free flow of information in the country and thousands of non-
