Hasina's peace model goes to next UN session

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's peace model will be presented at the next UN General Assembly session for endorsement in October this year, Foreign Minister Dipu Moni said yesterday.

The model that speaks not only of economic development, but also of people's empowerment and "social inclusion of all segments of people" has been widely appreciated, she said.

Once adopted by the UN, it would be used as a global model for peace and sustainable development, Dipu Moni said at a press briefing on conclusion of a two-day international conference in Dhaka on "People's Empowerment and Development".

Representatives from the UN and 62 membercountries, and civil society members attended the conference organised by the foreign ministry, and held at Ruposhi Bangla Hotel.

Hasina had put forward the model at the UN General Assembly session last year. It addresses seven issues -eradicating poverty and hunger; reducing inequality; mitigating deprivation; creating jobs for all; inclusion of excluded people; accelerating human development and fighting terrorism in all its forms and manifestations.

Lauding the model at the global meet in Dhaka, Indian Minister for Rural Development, Drinking Water and Sanitation Jairam Ramesh said it is something that speaks of sustainable development.

It is "inclusive and applicable to all countries" whereas Millennium Development Goals that originated in the West is meant only for the developing countries, he said.

Ramesh called for distribution of economic benefits and incorporating all segments of people in the mainstream. sEE pAGE 6 cOL 5

Alim ordered killing of 9

Witness to Joypurhat war crimes tells tribunal

Former BNP lawmaker Abdul Alim had ordered the killing of nine Hindus in Khetlal upazila of Joypurhat during the Liberation War and their bodies were buried by the river, an eyewitness told the International Crimes Tribunal-2 yesterday.

Abdul Momen, a former student leader and the first prosecution witness in war crimes case against Alim, also told the tribunal how Alim in a meeting during the war asked his followers to loot the properties of the Hindus.

The 71-year-old witness also said Alim, the then Convention Muslim League leader, formed and led the Shanti Committee (a collaboration force of the Pakistan army) in Joypurhat and he himself recruited Razakars

(another collaboration force) at his home.

The three-member tribunal led by its Chairman Justice ATM Fazle

Kabir with members Justice Obaidul Hassan and Judge Md Shahinur Islam also recorded the cross-examination of the witness yesterday before adjourning the case proceeding until August 27. The defence had filed

Teachers lack skill, training

Govt report reveals teachers of 30pc schools unable to prepare question papers

Teachers of around 30 percent secondary schools of the country are unable to prepare question papers in creative method introduced at secondary level in 2009, revealed a government report. Planning and Development Unit of the Directorate of

Secondary and Higher Education (DSHE) prepared the report in March this year by monitoring 4,810 out of 18,404 institutions in nine regions under DSHE, namely Dhaka, Mymensingh, Sylhet, Chittagong, Rangpur, Rajshahi, Khulna, Barisal and Comilla.

The government has so far trained around 3.25 lakh teachers of different subjects in different phases in the creative method since its introduction in 2009.

The report showed that teachers of 1,443 out of 4,810 institutions cannot compose question papers in the creative method. These teachers buy question papers from different teachers' associations for their school exams, the report said.

Teachers of over 53 percent schools out of 274 schools in Rajshahi region collect question papers from external sources, while teachers of 251 out of 553 schools in
