## BB asks banks to open accounts for Padma bridge funds

Bangladesh Bank has directed all banks to open two accounts -- one for local and the other for foreign currency -- for receiving contributions to the fund for the Padma bridge project.

For receiving local currency, an account will be

opened with all branches of banks, while foreign and authorised dealer branches of banks will receive foreign currency, according to a circular of the central bank. "The banks will open accounts at all their branches on

behalf of the government and will maintain those till

further notice," said the circular. The BB issued the circular yesterday asking all banks to open accounts in line with a directive of the finance

After the World Bank on June 29 cancelled its financing commitment for the Padma bridge project, the cabinet last month decided to open the accounts to receive people's grants to construct the bridge with own resources.

The BB circular said the banks will deposit the money collected every month in the two accounts with Sonali Bank's local office.

Two accounts -- one for local and the other for foreign currency -- will be opened with the Sonali Bank's local office for receiving the deposited money from the banks.

The central bank circular said Sonali Bank will regularly transfer the money to two government accounts with the BB.

Any expatriate can send their grants through any bank abroad or authorised dealer branch of any Bangladeshi bank through their exchange houses.

The BB also said banks will send statements of the money they will deposit with Sonali Bank every month to the Bridge Division and the central bank.

The decision to collect the grants or contributions was taken as a huge interest was created among people, the

finance ministry directive said.

## BRAC reforms management

Sir Fazle Hasan Abed puts new faces on decision-making panel

Development organisation BRAC has redesigned its management structure as part of its efforts to institutionalise its various activities and facilitate the decisionmaking process.

The changes, which took place during June-July, gave new roles to young minds to enhance performance and effectiveness. For instance, a new designation -- senior director --

replaced the post of deputy executive director. Three current directors, Asif Saleh, Tamara Hasan Abed and Dr Babar Kabir, have been elevated to the position.

They are part of the newly introduced executive management committee (EMC), BRAC's supreme decision-making body, which also comprise current executive director,

managing director, chief financial officer and BRAC International's senior director.

Abed, the iconic founder and currently chairperson of the BRAC and BRAC International boards, is the chairman of the committee.

"A process of institutionalisation within BRAC has been going on for six to seven years. The new committee has been formed to promote collective leadership," Saleh said.

The EMC is responsible for all major strategic and policy decisions and alignment of the different arms of BRAC.

The move to free BRAC's governing body from the dayto-day activities and focus solely on governance follows the path of many organisations in Bangladesh which of late have become leader-centric.
