

The Photojournalist's Dilemma

ecently I attended the Foundry workshop in Thailand where working photojournalists from all over the world gathered. I returned with food for thought and admiration, as well as questions to ponder.

The photojournalist tells his story with photographs. Those who achieve global prominence are immensely brave, hard-working and creative. Often they go to dangerous or inhospitable areas, face war or disasters, and reveal untold stories about people's lives at great personal risk.

A good photojournalist's work shows me something new and unexpected. For example, James Delano's work on the Japanese facing their tsunami/earthquake/nuclear disaster is a memorable tribute to their heroic resilience, while Suthep Kritsanavarin's searing depiction of Rohingya refugees and Paula Bronstein's unblinking portraits of Pakistani acid victims are haunting. Ashley Gilbertson's photographs of the empty bedrooms of young, dead American soldiers will break the heart of any parent.

As one veteran photojournalist put it, "We are warriors." For whom? For the oppressed, the underdog, the tortured, the voiceless.

Meanwhile, the career of a photojournalist faces challenges and fierce competition. We live in a world where anyone at the right place and time can digitally capture a momentous photograph.

In order to establish himself, a photojournalist must do in-depth work on a subject - for months or even years. Picking the subject is tricky: it must be a unique story that fires the photographer's passion, it must grab the global reader's attention, and it must translate to a compelling visual narrative. With luck, his story will sell to a magazine.

I also encountered the photojournalist's dilemma.

On the way to lunch one day, an earnest young middle-eastern photographer told me he wanted to photograph Bangladesh. "Great! And what would you like to photograph there?" I asked.

"I have heard about the gangs operating around the universities and I want to work on them," he said.

I was taken aback.

True, photographs have had tremendous influence in the birth and growth of Bangladesh, particularly photographs of suffering.

But the hard work of millions of Bangladeshis is paying off and the nation is better off than before.

Yet, photographic coverage of Bangladesh in world press remains vastly negative.

What about the mothers who fight traffic every morning to take children to school, day workers who suffer through stifling heat in crowded buses so they can get to work, entrepreneurs whose hard work and ingenuity have made Bangladesh a successful garment exporter, farmers who are growing more food than ever and NGOs who have made great contributions to education and health?

Who is their warrior?

I don't see many photos of our beautiful Sundarban in the world press. But the first sign of a man-made or natural disaster, or a garments unrest usually gets front-page.

I can see the photojournalist's dilemma. Bad news, sad news, and news about conflicts sells. A living has to be made, bills must be paid.

But don't you think the people of Bangladesh have worked hard enough to earn an even-handed representation by the world's photojournalists?

Home-goers travelling on unfit trawlers

Shortage of BIWTC vessels blamed

Acute shortage of state-run vessels plying between Chittagong city and its nearby coastal islands has escalated the miseries of thousands of home-bound people ahead of Eid-ul-Fitr.

Only one out of four vessels of Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Corporation (BIWTC) now runs towards Hatia and Sandwip islands from the port city. The scarcity of BIWTC vessels is forcing

people to cross the channel by privately owned trawlers and motorised boats, most of which do not have any fitness certificates and clearance from the authorities concerned, travellers said.

People are being compelled to board the only BIWTC-run vessel to twice its capacity, putting their lives to risk, they added.

The state-run authority, however, has cared less for repair of its vessels that remained grounded for long, and arranging additional trips on the route. The mismanagement and negligence by

the higher authority have caused this situation, an official of BIWTC, preferring not to be named, told The Daily Star.

Earlier, BIWTC used to operate four vessels-- MV Alauddin, MV Matin, MV Manirul Haque and MV Baro Awlia--for transportation of people in coastal islands.

At present, the authority is operating only one vessel, MV Matin, with three trips a week as the rest others are kept in dockyards for repair and maintenance.

Finding few alternative means of communications, people board the vessel to twice its capacity, said Md Ibrahim, a com-

"The situation will turn even more volatile before Eid if the problem is not addressed urgently," he added.

Sources at BIWTC, however, said MV Manirul Haque, which went out of service one month back, is set to resume its operation by Tuesday.

Md Nurul Alam Akand, deputy general manager of BIWTC, Chittagong, told The Daily Star that MV Manirul Haque is now being repaired. "We are trying to make it operational as early as possible," he added.

According to BIWTC office, MV Alauddin has been kept in the Sitalakkhya River at Narayanganj dockyard since 2009 for repair

MV Baro Awlia, which was bought from China in 2000, was operational till June 22, 2011. It is now kept at Chittagong dockyard to have it repaired.

AL, BNP must hold discussion

Say eminent citizens

Several eminent citizens yesterday urged the two major political parties of the country -- Awami League and BNP -to find a way to hold a fair parliamentary election through discussions.

The call came at a discussion before an Iftar organised by Nagorik Oikya, a recently formed citizens' organisation, at a hotel in the capital.

"Whether the (next parliamentary) election would be non-partisan is a decision for political leaders," said the immediate past election commissioner, Muhammad Sakhawat Hussain.

"A fair election is not possible with parliament still not dissolved. We have gained such experience after holding several elections. There will be an influence on the election either by the lawmaker or his supporters," he said.

Barrister Rafique-ul Huq said although the prime minister proposed the formation of an interim government, the problem arises on the question of who the chief of that government would be.

"There will be no solution through arguments and television talk shows. The two major parties must find a solution to it through discussions. If one truly desires for a free and fair and peaceful election, then finding the solution will not be that hard," he said.

"The prime minister has proposed a way to hold the next election. BNP could propose a way too," he added.

Veteran journalist ABM Musa said it is the Awami League's responsibility to remove doubts over whether the next election will be held at all.

Nagorik Oikya Convener Mahmudur Rahman Manna said, "We do not know what the situation will be between the two political parties after Eid but Nagorik Oikya will weigh movement to press home several demands."

Language Movement veteran Ahmed Rafique, former state minister for information Prof Abu Sayeed, SM Akram Hossain and Mobasher Hossain also spoke at the discussion.

Bapex starts drilling gas well in Sunetra field

Bangladesh Petroleum Exploration and Production Company Limited (Bapex) started drilling an exploratory gas well in Sunetra Gas Field in Dharmapasha upazila in Sunamganj yesterday.

Bapex Chairman Dr Hossain Mohammad Mansur inaugurated the drilling of the exploratory well.

Local lawmaker Muazzam Hossen Ratan, Bapex Managing Director Mortoza Faruque and Sunetra Gas Field Project Manager Nurul Islam, among others, were present on the occasion.

At least three months will be required to assess the actual amount of gas in this gas field, Dr Mansur said.

"We hope that the gas field will be a milestone for energy sector in the country," he said. According to Sunetra Gas Field Project

Manager Nurul Islam, the size of this structure can accommodate about three trillion cubic feet gas.

The structure has been named 'Sunetra' as part of it fell under Sunamganj district and the rest in Netrakona.

A man was beaten to death allegedly by fellow villagers following a dispute over irrigation of paddy fields at Sahdhu village in Kaunia upazila yesterday. The deceased was Nawab Ali, 50.
