Popularly known as Kazla Power House Road, which connects Demra Road to Jatrabari Biswa Road, the road is so pothole ridden that businesses there are suffering as people are reluctant to go there.

The link road used to help ease congestion on Dhaka-Chittagong highway and Jatrabari-Demra Road in Jatrabari as vehicles could bypass the clogs during rush hours.

Rickshaws and auto rickshaws that have to cross the road charge higher fairs while breakdown of heavier vehicles has become a regular phenomenon on that piece of road.

Motorists complain of having broken axles, ruined shock absorbers, smashed radiators, and dislodged prop shafts on a regular basis.

The holes are so deep at places that they go under knee-to-thigh-deep water after a shower, locals said.

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# High prices spoil Eid shopping

With Eid shopping at fever pitch in the capital, many shoppers complain high prices are taking the edge off their joy ahead of the festivities.

Despite the pressure on their purses,

people continue crowding the shopping malls to make the best buys possible. "Our budget is limited. In the past,

"Our budget is limited. In the past, people used to be happy shopping ahead of Eid. But now they come to markets with a lot of tension," Rafeza Zaman Khan, who works at a real estate firm, told The Daily Staryesterday.

"The prices of garment items have gone up unexpectedly," she said while shopping at the city's Mouchak Market. "It's mostly the problem of the middle class."

Delwar Hossain, a lawyer who came to the shopping mall with his wife and two children, said, "The shop owners are asking for very high prices, at least 30 percent higher over the last year."

While bargaining for a sari with a seller, Arifa Akhter, a housewife, said, "The price of every item has increased... shopping is tough nowadays."

The shop owners are not satisfied either; they say sales are not up to the mark this year.

## Tickets vanish days before sale starts

With the Eid a week away, cabin tickets of private launches disappeared a day before the owners formally started selling those yesterday.

The ticket seekers who went to Sadarghat Launch Terminal yesterday had to return empty-handed as tickets of all launches, except for a handful, had been sold out earlier.

And those available were being sold at double or even triple than what the government has set for the Eid rush days, when around 8 to 10 million people leave Dhaka on launches.

Visiting the terminal on Thursday evening and yesterday morning, The Daily Star correspondents talked to officials and staff of over 20 launches in the guise of passengers, but failed to get a single cabin ticket at a fair price.

Several staff offered them one or two "extra cabins" which are designated as rest rooms for launch master and other staff. Meanwhile, they were also offered tickets at much higher prices.

Allegations are there that only those having connection with launch owners,

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
#### Teesta water deal soon

A historic American town with a population of two people will be auctioned off on August 15, the auctioneers Williams & Williams said Thursday.

The northwestern town of Garryowen, Montana, little over 7.7 acres, includes houses, a grocery store, a fast food restaurant, a shop and a post office.

"The town has a population of two, making it one of the smallest towns in the United States," reads the auction house's website.

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
