Rajuk to raze forests for housing

Trees, farmland in 1,600 acres area to vanish for Purbachal project

Around 1,300 acres of forest will be wiped out to make way for the Rajuk's Purbachal housing project in Gazipur. The district administration has already acquired around 1,600 acres of land in five villages under Kaliganj

upazila for the scheme that has no environment clearance from the Department of Environment (DoE). Nearly 10 thousand people, mostly farmers and fishermen, live in the area. For years, they have been preserving

sal trees on their private land. A DoE report in 2010 said the housing project would ruin the area, which is rich in biodiversity. "Most of the acquired land is covered by sal forest. The tree coverage

here is better than that in the Bhawal National Park." In a letter to Prime Minister's Office (PMO) on September 20, 2010, the housing and public works ministry said, "There is no forest or arable land in the acquired 1,589.8925 acres at Barakau and Parabartha mouja."

The letter was sent in response to an inquiry by the PMO. SEE PAGE 19 COL 2

BNP chief Khaleda Zia is likely to visit India and China soon to

discuss bilateral issues and also the next general election of Bangladesh, party insiders have said.

Dates of the trips are yet to be finalised but they may happen next month. At the moment, the party is making primary preparations for both the visits.

The main opposition party is trying to mobilise support from the international community to compel the government to introduce a nonparty neutral government to oversee the next parliamentary polls, insiders added.

UAE slaps visa 'restrictions'

The United Arab Emirates has imposed restrictions on renewal and issuance of work visas to the Bangladeshis, said recruiting agencies and visa seekers.

Bangladesh's Consul General Abu Zafar in Dubai said they had been receiving such reports for two weeks but the UAE authorities were yet to officially inform them

"We got some reports from Bangladeshi employers here that the authorities were rejecting visa applications. However, big employers of the Emirates have not made any such complaints yet," he told The Daily Star over the

"Unless we learn it officially, we cannot say it is a restriction on Bangladeshi workers," he added.

Over 1.7 lakh applications pending for delay in police report, slow printing

With 1.7 lakh applicants waiting for their travel documents for months, the government has decided to issue machine readable passports without police verification if the law enforcers fail to file reports on time.

Around 70,000 people have been waiting because police failed to file their verification reports within the stipulated time while the rest one lakh became victims of slow printing of passports by the authori-

The passport seekers had been waiting for several months to around two years for their travel documents, home ministry sources said.

The decision to go without the police verification reports was made during a meeting at the Prime Minister's Office on August 12. This means the 70,000 people waiting for their travel documents would get them soon.

Home Secretary CQK Mustag Ahmed, Director General Abdul Mabud of the Department of Immigration and Passport, and Brig Gen Refayet Ullah, project director of Machine Readable Passports, attended the meeting.

Brig Gen Refayet told The Daily Star that in the cases of people asking for passports on emergency basis, which require higher fees, the authorities would wait 15 SEE PAGE 19 COL 5

2 killed in New York shooting

Nine injured AFP, New York

A disgruntled former worker at a Manhattan women's apparel shop shot a former co-worker outside the Empire State Building before being killed by police yesterday.

In total, two people were killed and nine had non-life threatening wounds in the horrific, but brief shooting, Police Commissioner Ray Kelly told a news conference.

The FBI quickly ruled out terrorism.

The shooter was identified as "disgruntled former worker" Jeffrey

Rab to collect DNA samples

of suspects

The Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) will collect DNA samples of the suspects in journalist couple Sagar-Runi murder case for cross-matching after it receives forensic reports from the US.

Sagar Sarowar, news editor of Maasranga television, and Meherun Runi, a senior reporter of ATN Bangla, were killed in the early hours of February 11 at their flat in the capital's West Rajabazar. Their only child Megh was in the house then.

In two phases -- on June 12 and July 17, Rab sent some evidence to two US laboratories for forensic test and DNA profiling.

Although the tests were yet to complete, the laboratories had so far detected DNA profile of a person from the evidence found on Runi's T-shirt, said Rab sources, adding **SEE PAGE 19 COL 8**

KURIL FLYOVER Half of work done in 20 months

With almost half the work pending, Rajuk and the construction firm are giving assurance that the Kuril flyover will be completed within the stipulated time, which is December this year.

Abdul Baki Mian, director of the Tk 254-crore project, is one of the optimists. He recently said they would be able to open the 3.1-kilometre flyover for the public by the year end.

"We understand it will be challenging, but we are determined and working round the clock to meet the deadline," he said.

Mahbub Ur Rahman, development member of Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakkha (Rajuk), claimed that so far 55 percent work of the flyover had been completed. Asked, when it took 20

Revoke changes to Grameen Bank ordinance Moudud asks govt

BNP leader Moudud Ahmed yesterday asked the government to immediately return the power to the poor women by withdrawing the Grameen Bank (amendment) Ordinance, issued on Thursday.
