











Poet Abul Hussain felicitated

On the occasion of the 90th birthday of poet Abul Hussain, the family members of the poet organised a discussion and cultural programme on August 29, at Ruposhi Bangla Hotel in Dhaka. On August 15, the veteran poet turned 90. He is considered one of the pioneers of modern Bangla poetry.

At the programme, a documentary on the life and works of Hussain was screened. The documentary features the early and student life of Abul Hussain as well as interviews with noted personali ties like poet and literary critic Hayat Saif; Abul Hasnat, editor of Kali O Kalam National Professor Mustafa Nurul Islam; Nazrul exponent Dr. Rafiqul Islam; Professor Zillur Rahman Siddiqui; Professo Emeritus of Dhaka University, Dr. Seraju Islam Chowdhury; veteran poet and writer Syed Shamsul Haq; Shamsuzzaman Khan, director general o

Bangla Academy, and others. Hayat Saif said, "Simple language is the main trait of his poems. This feature made his poems more accessible and thus he got wider readership."

Abul Hasnat said, "Hussain was one of the key figures of the 1950s who created an individual tone in his poetry.'

Mustafa Nurul Islam said, "Hussain could depict the changing times in his poems. His poems often highlight his toric incidents."

Dr. Rafigul Islam said, "He is modern and urban by nature. His expression is also contemporary. As a nation, we are fortunate to have such a great poet in our

Dr. Serajul Islam Chowdhury said, "He is modest, reserved and insightful. His in-depth knowledge about contemporary poems is very remarkable. He has enriched Bangla poetry."

Syed Shamsul Haq remembered, "I am translations and autobiography. He took personally very grateful to the poet for his constructive criticism of my poems when I started. He taught us many delicate techniques for writing poems."

Naz Akther Samina Hussain shared fond memories of their father. Hussain was born at Doyara village, in Khulna district in 1922. His father's name is S.M. Ismail Hussain. He grew up in Krihsnanagar and Calcutta (now Kolkata). He did his Honours and Masters in Economics from Calcutta Presi-

dency College and University. Hussain started writing poetry in the late 1930s. His first poetry book "Naboboshonto" was published in 1940. He was one of the few Muslim poets who initiated modern trends in Bangla poetry. His style and tone are distinctive. His poems focus on the Bengali culture, traditions, relationships, romanticism, patriotism, nature and the Liberation War. He has 30 books to his credit. His poetry books include "Birosh Sanglap", "Shob Boshonto", "Hawa Tomar Ki Dushshahosh" and "Duhshapno Theke

Hussain's other literary works include essays on art, culture and social life; journalism as his first profession in Kolkata. He worked with the literary journals -- Bulbul and Nabajug. Besides writing, Hussain served in different local and international organisations in vari-

The poet has been honoured with many awards, including Ekushey Padak, Bangla Academy Award, Padabali Award, Nasiruddin Gold Medal, Mazharul Islam Kobita Puroshkar and more.

SELIM AL DEEN FEST 2012

Engaging, uplifting performance by Gautam Haldar

Two Indian troupes [from Kolkata] have been invited to perform at the Selim Al Deen Festival 2012. One of them, Nave Natua staged its production two improvised solo performances -- at the National Theatre Hall of Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy, on August 29. Officially it was a performance by the troupe but if someone said that the night belonged to Gautam Haldar, a

ubiquitous fun-loving performer it won't be an exaggeration. With his superb ability of engaging and communicating with the audience, Haldar stole the show.

The first act was an hour-long musical, directed and performed by Haldar. Four troupe members accompanied him with the instruments that ranged from santoor to Egyptian mandolin. Haldar roamed around the stage, tried to act like a comedian and sang compositions based on poems of Rabindranath Tagore, Shakti Chattopadhyay, Buddhadev Basu, Bertolt Brecht and Satyajit Ray. 

Nair told reporters ahead of the evening red carpet premiere which marks the opening of the festival: "We all know there has been an enormous schism between East and West in this last decade. I sought to bring some sense of bridge-making, some sense of healing, basically some sense of communication.'

Nair has said she took as her starting point the 1966 movie "The Battle of Algiers", acclaimed for its even-handed treatment of the Algerian war in the 1950s.
